People who do not know where their foundings are to be found, what their surroundings are, or what fate is in store for them if they are left to sink or to swim may exclaim against the multiplication of institutions, but these ladies and others interested in the cause and have found that there is no room for them in existing institutions.

Others say that such an institution will encourage mothers to neglect and abandon their offspring. It seems to us that the certainty of the child being well cared for will save many a woman who has fallen from sinking deeper into crime and into being irretrievably lost.

A third objection to the establishment of a founding hospital is that it has a tendency to make vice easy. It has never been shown that there is more vice where founding hospitals exist than in those places where there are no such institutions.

THE BOARD OF REVISORS.

The Board of Revisors met yesterday morning at the City Hall, when there were present Aldermen Prefontaine (in the chair), Fairbairn, Berger, Malone and Mathieu.

Mr. C. J. Doherty appeared on behalf of the petitioners in the statute labor mandamus case. He asked that the names of the thirty-seven citizens who had been parties to the case be placed on the municipal electoral roll.

Mr. Doherty took exception to Alderman Grenier's statement that he wanted to increase the costs in the case. He considered it necessary that a writ should be issued in each case to prevent trouble.

The Board then adjourned until 5 o'clock. AFTERNOON SESSION. The Board of Revisors met at five o'clock last evening. The time was spent in signing the lists, authorizing those who had petitioned against the labor tax to

vote. Permission was signed for thirteen names and it was requested that there were about two hundred more to be inserted on the electoral roll. This only includes those who petitioned the Court of Review, the difference between those who paid the statute labor tax and those who petitioned for its abolition being somewhere in the vicinity of twelve thousand.

CONTRACTORS' AND BUILDERS' ASSOCIATION.

A Largely Attended Meeting at Their Rooms on St. James Street—The Affairs of the Association Discussed—A Previewing Outlook for the Welfare of the Organization.

A special meeting of the members of the Builders' and Contractors' Association was held last evening at their rooms, No. 99 St. James street. Mr. Louis Allard, the president, occupied the chair, and amongst the large number present were noticed Messrs. Rutherford, C. A. Cornellier, advocate of the Association, Wm. Cienfuegos, J. W. Brunet, E. St. Louis, John McLean, J. K. Ward, J. B. St. Louis, C. Dickie, W. Bernier, James Simpson, A. Lapierre, James Morrison, J. B. Drapeau, F. H. Crevier, A. Larence, P. Campbell, A. Valiquette, E. Plante, J. R. Savignac.

After a few remarks from the President, who welcomed the members to their new rooms, Mr. Rutherford was introduced to the meeting. He spoke of the great want that had been felt among the contractors and builders of an association of this kind.

Mr. St. Louis, addressing the meeting in French, said he was pleased to see such a large attendance as it undoubtedly spoke well for the success of the association in the future. It was encouraging to know that such influential men as Mr. J. K. Ward, Mr. Rutherford and Mr. Cienfuegos had become members of the association, and this alone was a sufficient guarantee of its welfare.

ST. PATRICK'S ORPHANAGE BAZAAR.

The bazaar in aid of the St. Patrick's Orphanage, which opened last week in the Albert Hall, is being very successfully carried on.

Mr. Eber, the Assistant City Attorney, advised the Board to place the names of all those who had filed their complaint against having their names not on the list within the prescribed day upon the list. An agreement had been made between the contending parties in the courts providing that the names of the petitioners should be placed on the list.

THE SHARON CASE AGAIN.

Extraordinary Charges and Counter Charges. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 7.—Decidedly the Sharon nightmare will not down. A few weeks ago, Sarah Althea's counsel George W. Tyler, was defendant in a criminal prosecution charging him with obtaining money under false pretences by conspiring with McLaughlin, his clerk, to sell a supposititious contract to Sharon's lawyers, in which Gunpel, an expert in handwriting, agreed to swear to the genuineness of the documentary proof of the marriage. The supposititious contract was to be stolen from Tyler's desk in his office.

General W. H. L. Barnes, leading attorney for Sharon, notified the jury that \$25,000 to McLaughlin for possession of the Tyler swore—as he did during the Sharon trial—that he prepared the contract and signed Gunpel's name to it, but the prosecution failed to prove that he did this for gain or to defraud.

CORRUPTION OF THE LAW.

Last week Crittenden began an action against Barnes for disbarment on the ground that he had violated his oath by corrupt practice in dealing with McLaughlin, and also in attempting to bribe Gunpel to testify that the marriage contract between William Sharon and Sarah Althea Hill and the "dear wife" letters were not genuine. It may be remembered that the expert upon the trial astonished and dismayed the defence, after they had employed the opposite expert, by testifying, as a lawyer testified, in the Supreme Court, that he told Barnes privately, more than once, that the papers in question were genuine. He was paid \$1,500 for his services, and Barnes offered \$5,000 besides if he would contact with each other, but was but one of many considerations which the contractors and builders should belong to this society.

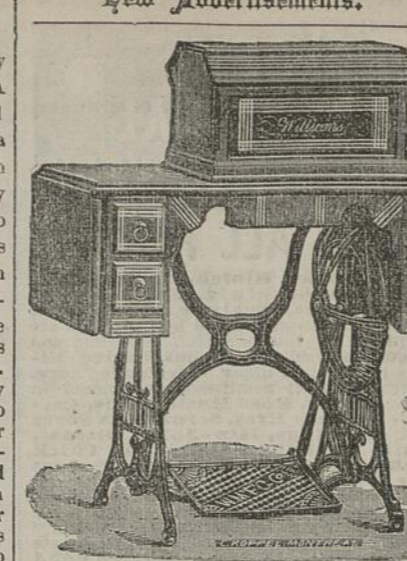
