

Gala Three-Day Ayer's Cliff Fair Opens This Thursday

110th Annual Fair Has Variety Enough To Please Every Taste

Ayer's Cliff — The 110th annual fair of the Stanstead County Agricultural Society opens here on Thursday, and continues Friday and Saturday with one of the most gala programs of midway and stage entertainment ever brought to an Eastern Townships Fair Grounds.

The Stanstead County Horticultural Society will hold their 45th annual show in conjunction with the fair.

The fair program consists of judging in all fair classes, harness racing, special attractions for kiddies, cattle, horse, and machinery parades, square dance competitions, band music, and one of the wildest and woolliest rodeos ever to come out of the wild and woolly west.

As regards entries in the judging classes this year, secretary-treasurer of the Agricultural Society, Mrs. M. B. Corey, says that this year entries are at least as numerous as last, and officials expect that by opening day Thursday, the entry list will have swelled much larger.

Secretary of the Horticultural Society, George Drummond reports that entries in his department are far better than last year, especially in flower sections. He explains that last year, flowers

were not very good, and the ladies made up for the lack of blooms by swelling the entry list in the ladies' department of the Agricultural Society. However, he notes, this year, flowers are blooming early, and the flower department is correspondingly larger.

The Ayer's Cliff Fair this year will take in more territory than has been the case in past years, with the addition of Bolton Township to the areas in which farmers are eligible to compete as exhibitors.

Friday is also Red and White day at the Ayer's Cliff Fair—a day set aside for Ayrshire breeders in the district and their guests. Seven breeders, including three guest breeders are expected to show for this special event.

Early Thursday, the T. Greene midway, with a host of thrilling rides and fascinating fair concessions will be in full operation. Opening day is also Children's Day, and all children under 14 years of age will be admitted to the grounds free of charge. Special attractions will be given on the midway for the kiddies, and a children's pony race will be run off in front of the grandstand on Thursday night as part of the evening's entertainment.

Thursday evening, a big night of stage entertainment is planned, with a lot of the very best in local talent expected to take part in the proceedings. Arthur "Scully" Langevin and his Majorettes from Beebe—perennial favorites at the Ayer's Cliff Fair will open up the program in front of the grandstand, followed by Don McNally's hilarious skits, and colorful folk dances by a group of Dutch immigrants.

A rousing square dance competition, open to all comers, to the music of Gagne's Orchestra will

complete the evening. The event is sponsored by Canada Packers.

Harness racing will be carried as part of the fair program Thursday afternoon only.

Friday afternoon, on the stage in front of the grandstand, Jackie Wescott's famous rodeo, sponsored by Geo. Hamid of New York will stage its opening performance, followed by a full performance in the evening. The Rodeo will also be staged on Saturday afternoon and Saturday night. With 60 head of cattle and horses, and more than 30 cow girls and cowboys in the cast, this is one show that no one will want to miss.

The music of the Canaan, Vermont, High School band will be heard at the fair all day Friday and Saturday. In addition, cattle, horses, and farm machinery parades will be staged on the track Friday and Saturday afternoons.

Junior Department activities will get underway on Thursday at 1 p.m. Consisting of calf classes, judging and showmanship competitions, the program which continues on Friday will be participated in by the Island Brook, Waterville, Lennoxville, St. Herminine Gilde, La Patrie and Hatley calf clubs.

Judging begins on Thursday morning in the horse, Holstein, Guernsey, swine, poultry and ladies' departments, and in the Horticulture department in the opening afternoon. Milk grades, beef grades and sheep will also be judged opening day.

Friday, judging will continue in Ayrshires, Canadians, Short-horns, Herefords, Jerseys, and Anguses. Judging in the Jersey classes will wind up competition on Saturday.

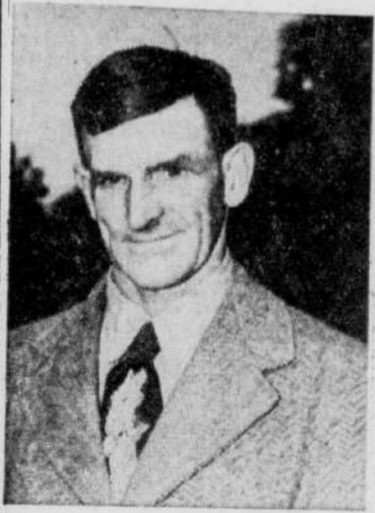

Three Brothers Vie For Ayrshire Honors At Ayer's Cliff

Johnston Brothers To Match Ayrshires

Massawippi—Once upon a time there were seven brothers Johnston, each with Scottish blood in his veins.

One became a laborer in Ontario—the rest all became cattle farmers. One became a Shorthorn farm manager; one became a dairy grade cattle raiser; one became a Hereford farm manager.

The three of them — Alex, Douglas and John—stayed right in the Eastern Townships, and now raise Ayrshire cattle on three separate farms. Naturally, when Ayer's Cliff Fair time rolls around, there's keen rivalry in the air. And this year will probably be no exception. All three are taking pure-bred red and white Ayrshires to the Ayer's Cliff Fair which starts Thursday.

Alex, who owns a small, 71-acre farm near Stanstead, is the oldest of the three at 53. He's the only one of the brothers who can boast that he was born in Scotland.

But although Alex is the oldest of the three brothers in the Eastern Townships, John, the youngest at 35, owns a large 150-acre farm some three miles from this small centre, is the oldest breeder, and, say both Douglas and Alex, the best, too.

Douglas, at 42, is between the two brothers as far as age goes. And as far as Ayrshire breeding goes too. He now has some 46 head of cattle on his 83-acre farm near Stanstead, all descendants of the Johnston home herd from the old Fernhill farm at Georgeville. Both Alex and John bought their cattle from other sources.

Douglas and Alex both credit John, "the young 'un" with starting the family on breeding pure-bred Ayrshires. Their father came over from Scotland in 1907 and settled near Beebe. He moved to the Fernhill farm in 1924, and started raising grade cattle—cross breeds.

Then the Calf Clubs came

along. John was the only one young enough to join at the time, and he needed a pure-bred calf in order to become a Calf Club member. So his father bought him one — naturally, a Scottish Ayrshire.

And that started Mr. Johnston, Sr., off on breeding pure Ayrshires instead of grades.

All three Johnstons have come back to raising their own cattle after absences of varying length. John worked at the Butterfield machine factory in Rock Island until five years ago when he bought his present farm site. Douglas used to be a specialist in field crops, not Ayrshires, until he took over his father's farm in 1943. In 1947, he sold Fernhill, brought 18 head of cattle to his present site, and started breeding anew. Alex didn't start raising cattle on his own until six years ago, after having worked as a manager of Ayrshires for Howard Murray, in Magog, for over 13 years.

Now, the competition is close and keen every year. Last year, John took both the male and female grand championships at Ayer's Cliff, as well as 10 other firsts. Alex won half a dozen firsts with only eight entries, while his daughter, Joan, a member of the Hatley Calf Club, won the calf grand championship and the showmanship championship. Douglas won about 16 firsts, and the junior female grand championship.

Though fair competition is close among them, John takes top honors as cattle trader. He literally bought a grand championship from his unsuspecting brother Alex. Two years ago, he persuaded Alex to sell him a cow called Elmsdale Spot. She had never showed before, but last year, she won the grand championship at Ayer's Cliff for her new owner.

John still chuckles over this deal. "I don't think she'll win this year," he says. "But take a look at this bull! He's a cinch."

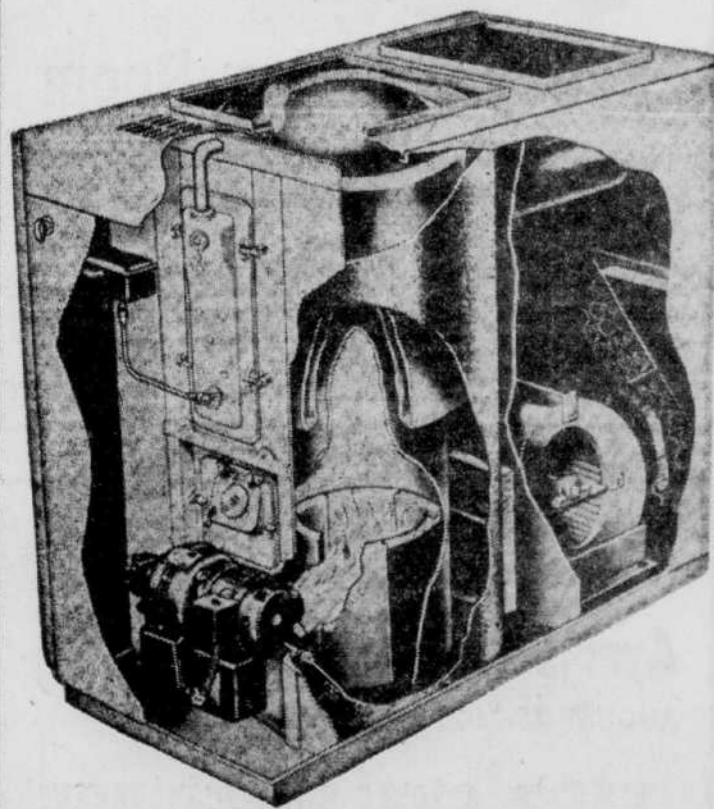

Newcomer Makes Debut At Ayer's Cliff

Holstein Breeder Gets Chance To Show Stock

Austin — Now that Allen Dowbiggin has been permitted to enter the Ayer's Cliff Fair, starting in Ayer's Cliff on Thursday, he's going to go and have some fun.

"I don't care too much whether or not I win," says Holstein breeder Dowbiggin, "though, of course, it would be nice to pick up a few ribbons. I'm really just going for the pleasure."

This is the first year that Dowbiggin has been able to enter the Ayer's Cliff Fair, although last year he entered both Sherbrooke and Brome Fairs. His 300-acre farm, amid rolling Bolton Township hills overlooking Lake Memphremagog some two miles from this tiny settlement, was outside the territorial limits of the annual Stanstead County exhibition, until a new ruling this year included the

small township. It's likely he'll be the only exhibitor to benefit.

Dowbiggin is a city man — born and bred, he says, in the canyons of Montreal. But he always had a hankering to be a farmer, and soon set loose for Ontario where he landed jobs on various cattle farms.

It was there that he learned a smattering about dairy cattle breeding. "I handled Guerneys," he remembers, "and showed many of them at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto, at the Canadian National Exhibition, and in Ottawa and London." It was there, too, that he met Mrs. Dowbiggin, over three years ago. Both of them graduated from Macdonald College, Ste. Anne de Bellevue, with diplomas in Animal Husbandry, and both decided that they wanted to own a Holstein farm.

So now they share spacious Egremont Farm, a smaller section of land besides, 48 head of pure-bred Holsteins, and a 17-month-old son, Stephen, who, Mrs. Dowbiggin says, also wants to be a dairy cattle breeder.

The Dowbiggins have only owned Egremont for 2½ years on their own. Previous to that, they belonged to a syndicate of breeders headed by E. G. Smith, of Austin, in which they worked for two years. They started out on Egremont with a total of 30 head of cattle, and hope eventually to keep the farm even with about 50-60 head.

It takes time, says Dowbiggin, to build up a prize herd, but his is a good beginning. The herd sire, hulking, gentle-as-a-lamb Grand Rang Ray Apple King from the famous Grand Rang

farms at La Presentation, Quebec, is the son of Grand Rang Pipinette, a high quality Holstein cow who produced 150,000 pounds of milk in eight years, and in one single year, produced a high of 24,000 pounds of milk and 1,019 pounds of butter fat. This is a Dominion Honor Roll record.

Although Mr. Dowbiggin learned his trade with Guerneys and Mrs. Dowbiggin was brought up on an Ayrshire farm, they decided to raise Holsteins, because, as Mr. Dowbiggin says "we have to make money."

"The Holstein is the only money dairy cow there is, as far as I'm concerned," emphasized Mr. Dowbiggin. "They give a lot more milk than the average pure-bred cow. For instance, my own herd had a yearly average of 10,000 pounds of milk per cow, with 6 cows tested last year. This is a very high standard, and can be matched only by other Holstein herds."

"The stock themselves bring more money on the average because they are bigger and heavier than other dairy breeds. Holsteins have to be fed well, of course, but they make up for what they eat.

As for preparations for his first venture to the Ayer's Cliff Fair, Mr. Dowbiggin has no worries about that. "The herd is in good condition," he says, paying tribute to his wife, who, he says, was "very helpful" in keeping the herd that way.

"I keep them inside with sacking over them to make them sweat off the old, coarse hair. This also makes them shiny and slick. I feed them grain, beet pulp and hay, keep them clean, and let them fatten. I teach them to lead—especially the calves, and then the day before taking them to the fair, we wash and clean them."

After Ayer's Cliff, Dowbiggin Holsteins will go on to Sherbrooke and Brome. HUGH DOHERTY.

Sheep Raising Proves Fascinating Hobby

Two Bishop's College School masters in Lennoxville have managed to acquire quite a reputation for raising sheep—quite on the side, they both assert. In fact, during fair time, their reputation is so good that Ayer's Cliff Fair officials have changed a class for them.

From September to June, Hugh Doheny teaches history at E.C.S. and Fred Pattison teaches mathematics. They both admit that neither maths nor history has anything to do with sheep raising, but from June to September again, their 80-acre Stonecroft sheep farm near the school occupies a great deal of their time and thoughts.

They have raised Border Cheviots since 1952, and recently added some rather rare Northern Cheviots. It is this last breed that necessitated the class change, because, in previous years, Ayer's Cliff Fair officials had allowed no class for Northern Cheviots. Now they can be shown in the same class with the Border Cheviots.

Fred Pattison insists that they should be granted a class of their own, as they are at larger fairs like Sherbrooke. "They are a distinct breed, quite apart from the Border Cheviots," he asserts. "Look at their long noses and long ears. They are much bigger than Border Cheviots, too."

Both breeds are just a hobby for the partner-masters. Hugh Doheny says they went into sheep-raising "just as a whim" and it has grown from a small flock of 20 to a considerable flock of some 60 sheep. It is now a sizeable whim.

Neither the Border nor the Northern Cheviot is a particularly good wool producer and the partners sell few animals for market purposes. They breed sheep as a hobby, and it is, they say, in no sense a business.

They also enjoy working on the farm. They built the barn which now houses the sheep with some assistance, grow their own feed, and have it harvested. At Cookshire, Sherbrooke and Ayer's Cliff, their sheep have become well-known.

Last year at Sherbrooke, a

Stonecroft Farm ram won the male grand championship, and was also the grand champion at Ayer's Cliff. Pattison says, "last year at Ayer's Cliff we had no competition, but this year, we expect things will be a bit tougher."

In winter, say the partners, sheep-raising is a comparatively easy thing, and doesn't interfere with their teaching in the least. "There's not much to do but feed them twice a day," laughed Pattison, who was born in northern England, but claims that his birth place has nothing to do with his penchant for sheep-breeding. Doheny is a native Montrealer.

This year, the partners will take six Border Cheviots and six Northern Cheviots to the Ayer's Cliff Fair, which starts on Thursday and continues Friday and Saturday.

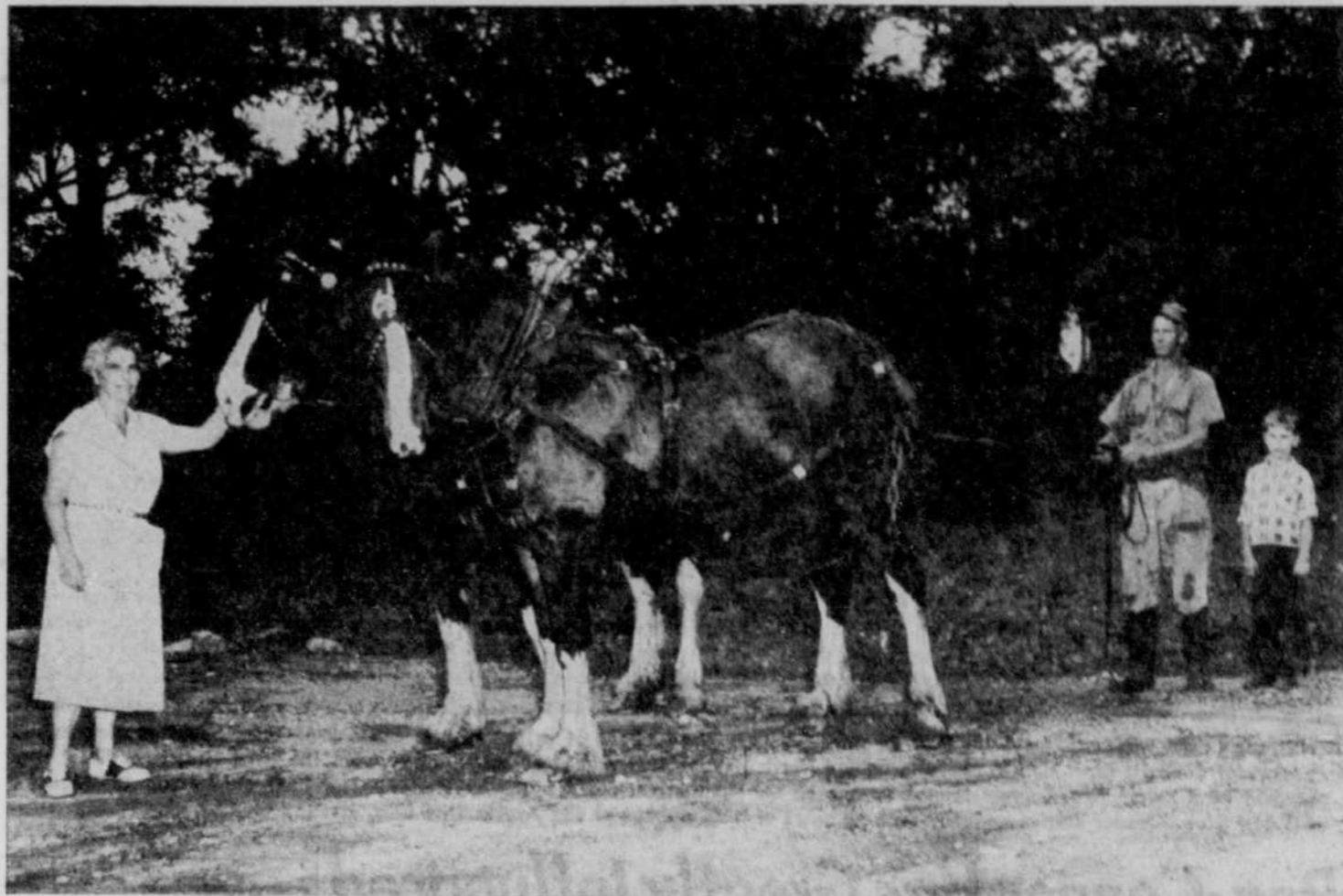

Springmount Farm Uses Its Clydsdales For Work And Show

By HUGH DOHERTY

Massawippi — Four of the best Clydsdale draught horses in the Eastern Townships are the working backbone of the 430-acre Springmount Farm some two miles from here.

They plow the spacious fields; seed them, gather the harvest and pull it to the barns. In the spring, they collect all the sap and draw wood; in the winter they help keep the farm roads open.

But when show time comes, then these graceful 1,600-lb. workhorses are decked out in exhibition ribbons and shown at the Ayer's Cliff and Sherbrooke Fairs, where they annually sweep every Clydsdale class entered.

The four horses — two geldings and two mares who always work in matched pairs — belong to the Misses Elin Beit-Speyer and Eleanor Rosenthal, who bought this farm high in the rolling hills above Lake Massawippi in 1942. The Clydes, Scottish in origin, and all 14-year-olds, came to the farm in 1947, and have been sweeping show classes ever since their arrival in the Eastern Townships. It is expected that they will again dominate their class at the Ayer's Cliff Fair, opening Thursday, and continuing Friday and Saturday.

The geldings, King and Major, came from Winnipeg, and though purebred Clydes, are not shown at Sherbrooke because they are not registered. However, they will be at Ayer's Cliff again this year as in previous years.

Bonnie Nobleman and Nellie Nobleman, two half-sisters from near Toronto, are the aristocrats of the farm, along with the hundred-odd purebred Jerseys that also bring back the lion's share of ribbons for Springmount farm at Sherbrooke and Ayer's Cliff. The mares were shown at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto in 1950, and both placed in their classes. Last year, Bonnie was the grand champion Clydsdale mare at the Sherbrooke Fair, and Nellie followed up with the reserve championship.

As for sweeping honors at the Ayer's Cliff Fair, Miss Beit-Speyer explains that there is so little competition, that it will be a relatively sure-thing. Usually, the four Springmount Clydes are the only ones entered in their class at Ayer's Cliff.

Other heavy horses may work as well and show as well as Clydes, but few, claims Miss Beit-Speyer, can match the breeding advantages of Clydes. In Ireland, and in Ontario, the very finest hunting horses are always obtained by breeding a Clyde with a thoroughbred. This produces a powerful, but graceful horse unsurpassed for elegance, speed and stamina. Miss Beit-Speyer has proof of this at the Springmount Farm in the form of a beautiful three-year-old chestnut hunter, Springmount Noble Time, the son of the farm's own Nellie and a now-dead Sherbrooke thoroughbred, F. Stagmaier's Tim-O-Shank. He has just been broken in, and doesn't hunt yet, but Miss Beit-Speyer is highly enthusiastic about his future.

The Springmount teamster, Alvin Harrison, says that the Clydes are easy to handle, and yet extremely hard workers. He works the two black geldings in one team, and the two mares in another, alternately — one in the morning, and the other in the afternoon. Last spring, the two pairs seeded 80 acres of farmland — a Spartan piece of work.

Miss Rosenthal has no reservations as to the excellence of the Springmount Clydes. "They have stamina," she enthuses, "they are well-gaited, and the most stylish of heavy horses. They're wonderfully gentle and clever, and can work single or double as we wish."

"They'll do anything you want them to do," she concluded.

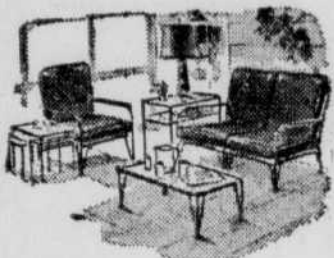

Reg. Conner Has Greatly Influenced Holstein Breeding In Townships

North Hatley — Because he joined the Hatley Heifer Club when it was first formed in 1924, Reginald G. Conner, who breeds Holsteins near this Eastern Townships resort village, now has his own small herd of some 20 head.

Every cow in the herd is a direct descendant of the two-year-old heifer Holstein he bought as a member of that first club — Jean of Mountain-dale. Conner says that if it hadn't been for the heifer club, he probably wouldn't be breeding Holsteins today. That would have been a loss to breeders in the district, for in addition to being a past president of the Holstein - Freisian Breeders' Association of Canada, Quebec Branch, and vice-president of this year's Ayer's Cliff fair, which starts Thursday and continues Friday and Saturday, Conner has been a perennial Holstein winner at the annual Stanstead County exhibition.

The present Hatley 4-H Calf Club, comprising some 45 members in the district, is the descendant of the original heifer club. Conner, a leader of the present Hatley Calf Club, recalls that the original heifer clubs were different from today's organizations.

Their purpose, first of all, was to help young breeders build up herds of their own. Today, the aim is more one of instruction and character training for potential farmers. Breeding is an incidental outcome of today's 4-H Clubs.

When the Hatley club was first formed, there were 14 members in it, and Reg Conner was president. Whereas today, members of the club can only show calves — that is, animals of any breed under one year —

members of the original club showed two-year-olds, and there was only one breed per club. The Hatley club started as a Holstein heifer club.

Funds were provided by the Department of Agriculture for the original members from Ayer's Cliff, North Hatley and East Hatley to each purchase a heifer. Conner recalls that his was bought from Winchester, Ontario. Members were expected to pay the purchase price back to the government over a period of time.

To build up the members' herds from the one heifer each

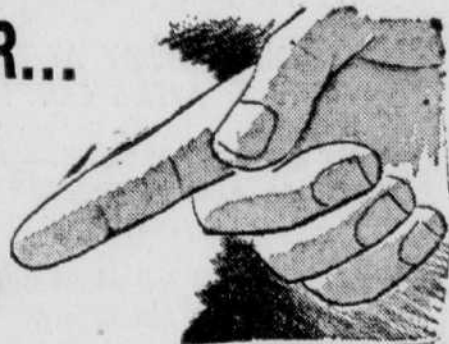

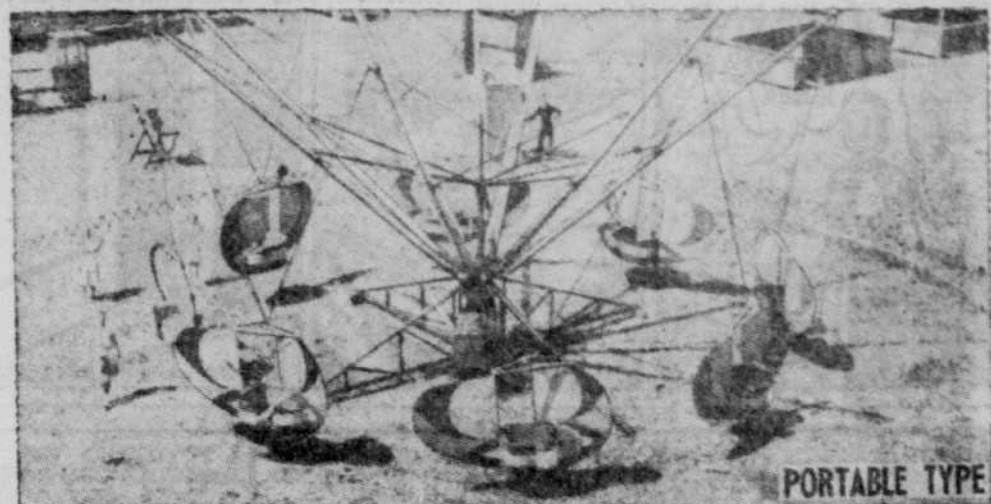

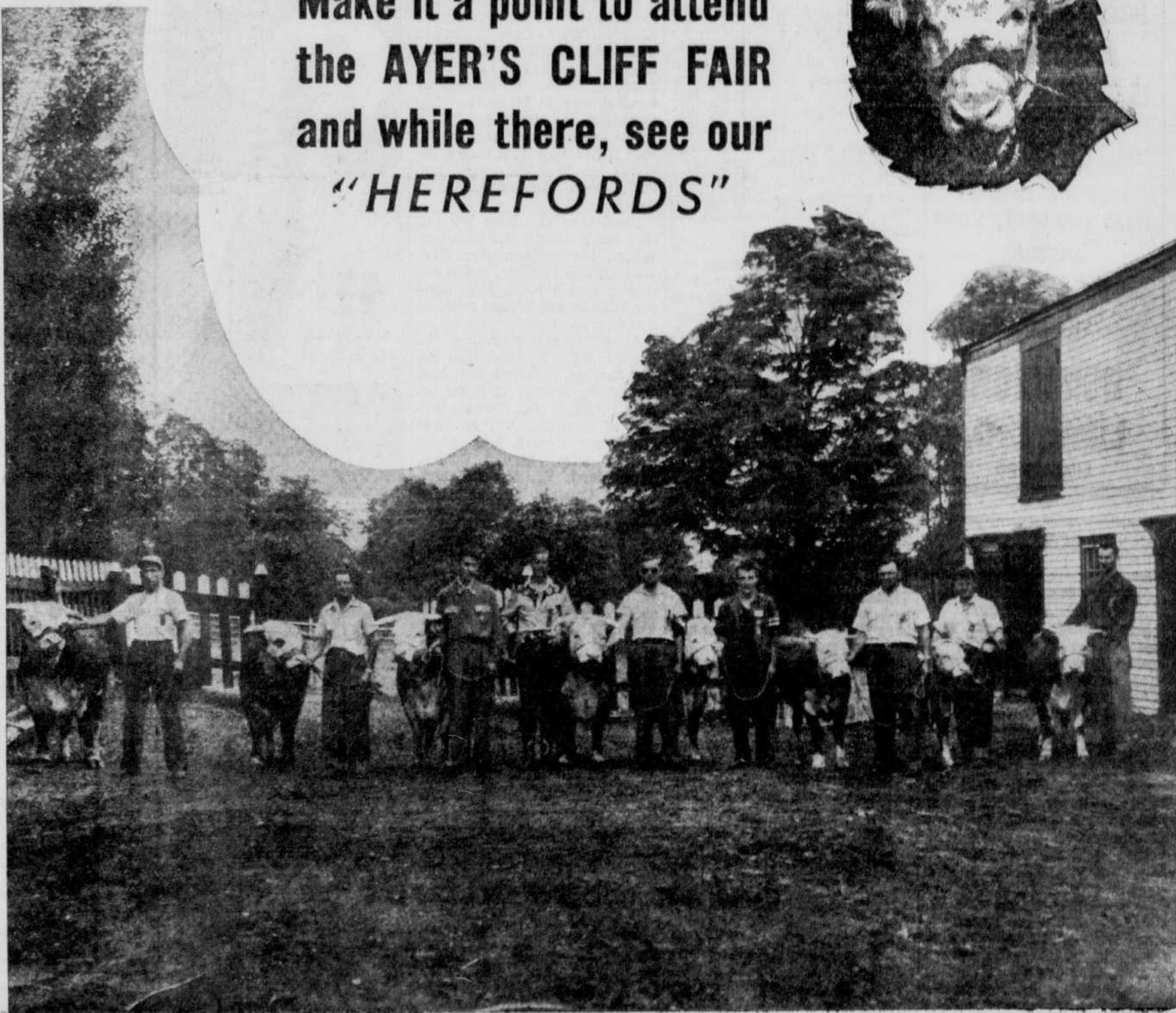
