Request Lower Age For Starting School

At the November meeting of the Onslow Intermediate School Board a delegation of parents attended and interviewed the members on the question of extending the age of children entering school. By law parents whose children are six years of age by midnight of June 30th are obliged to send them to school at the beginning of the next academic

year. However, the local school board has the option of extending that date under special circumstances, allowing children born later in the year to attend even shortly before their sixth birthday. Some years ago the Onslow School Board in line with several local boards did this specifying that the child who was six by August 31st midnight might enter grade I.

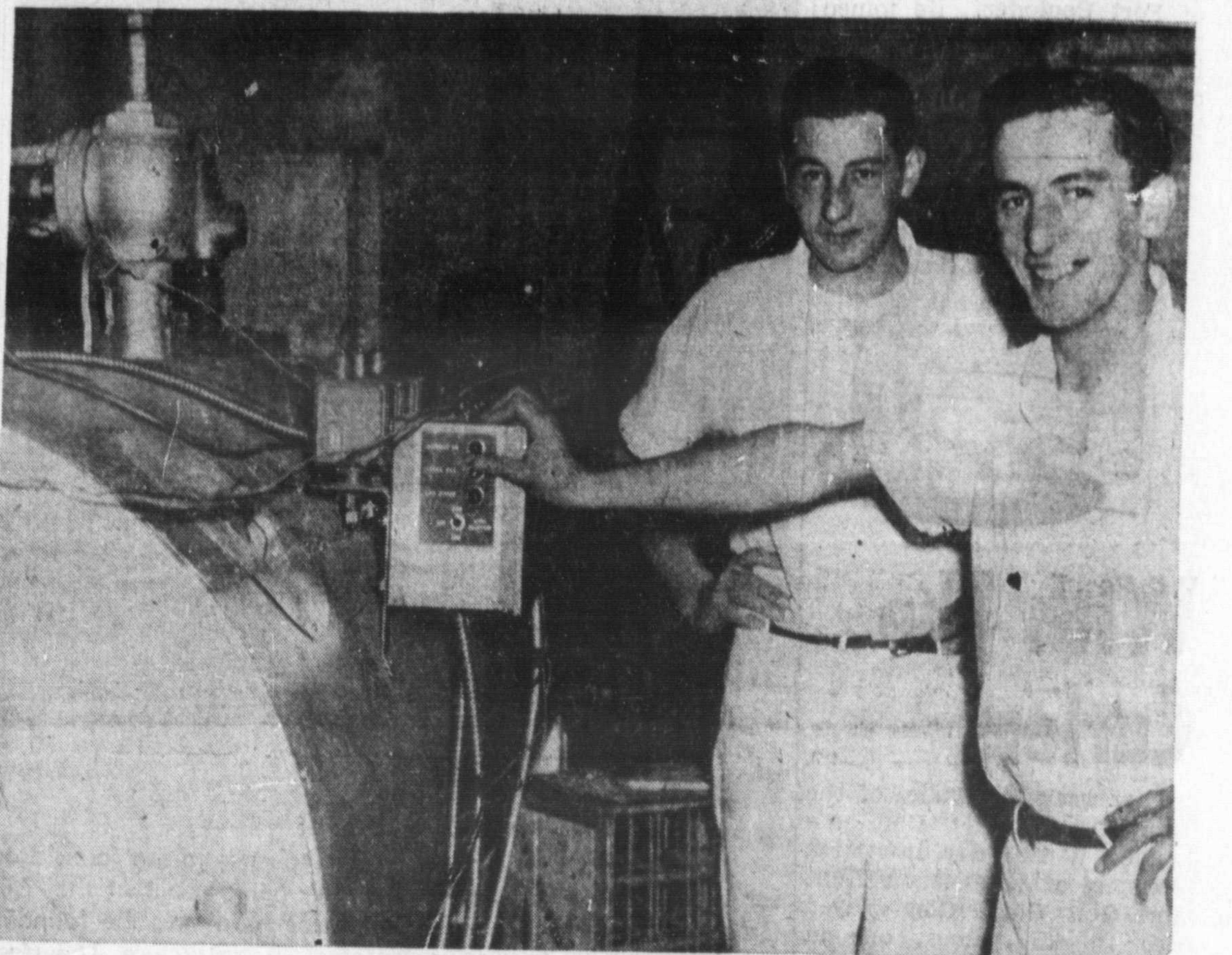

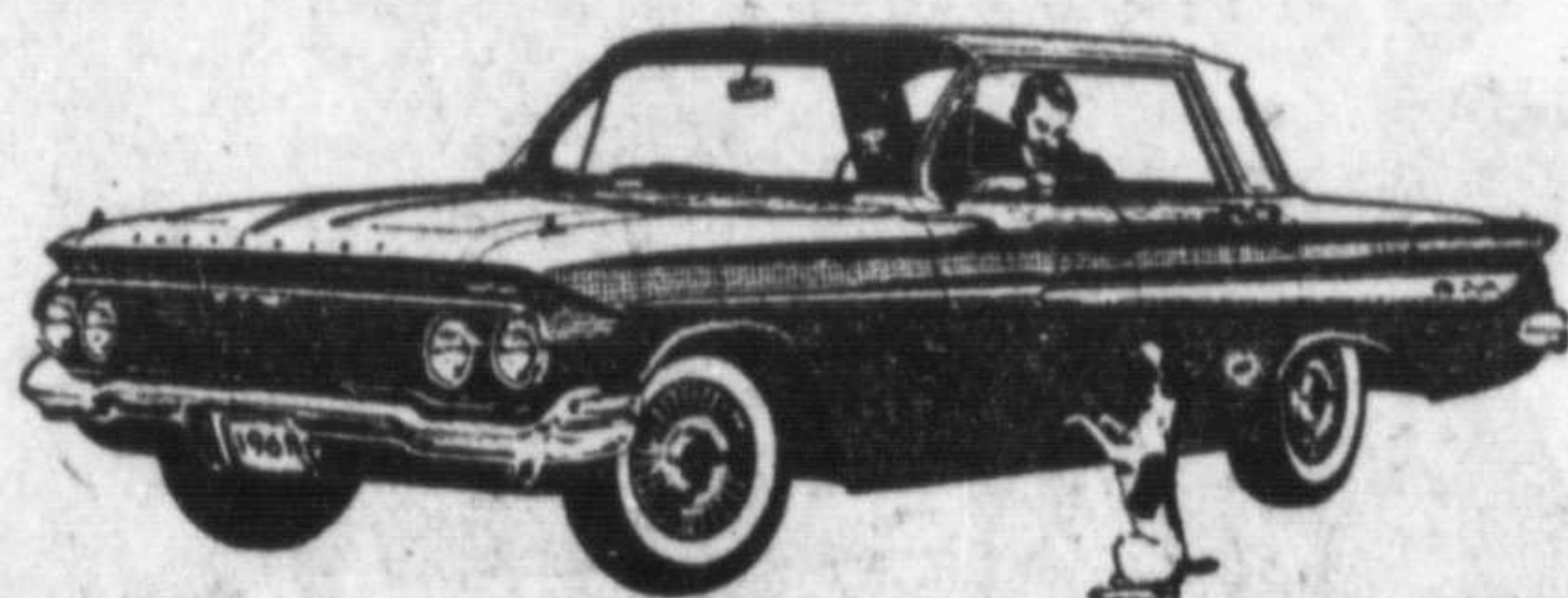

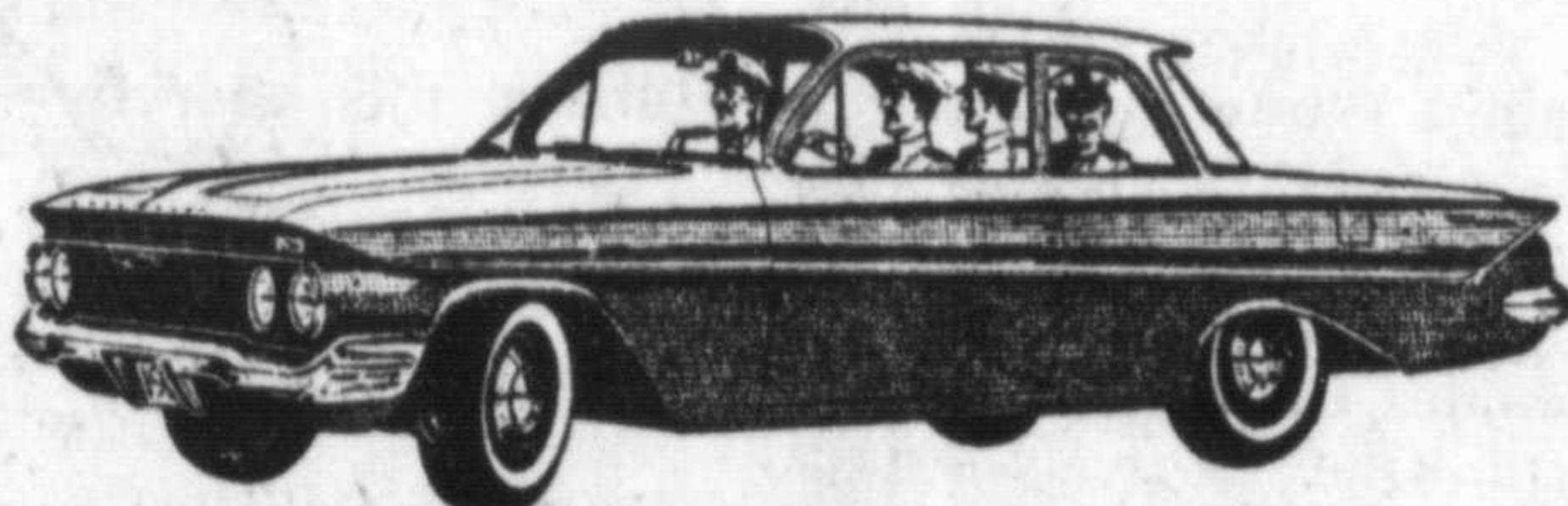

Court Report

The following appeared before District Judge Avila Labelle at Campbell's Bay P. Q. December 6th, 1960.

Albert St-Jean — Waltham, P. Q. For having driven a motor vehicle while impaired by alcohol in the Township of Alouettes Island, was sentenced to the time already spent in jail, namely 12 days.

He also was prohibited to drive a motor vehicle in Canada for a period of 3 months.
