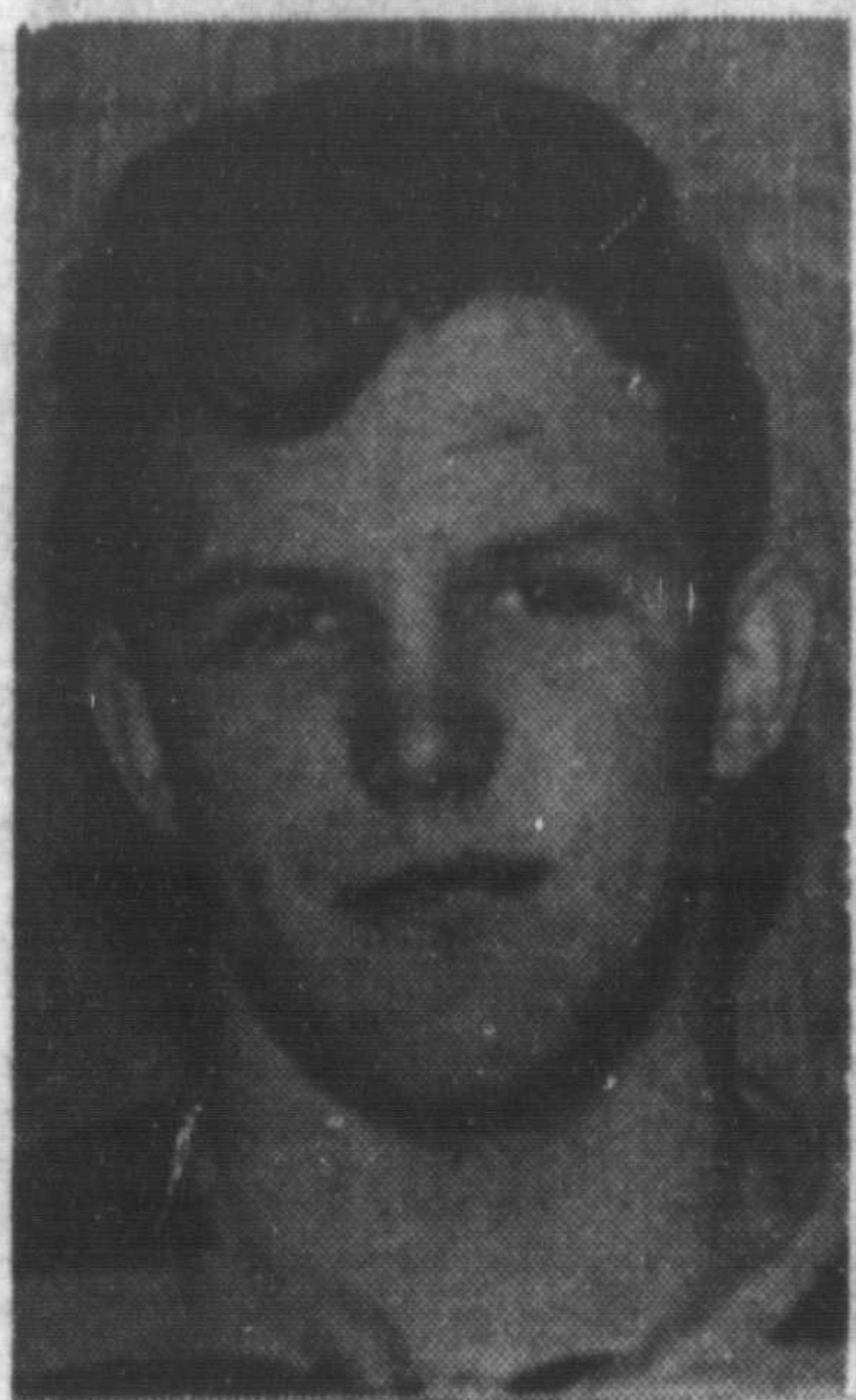

Shawville had thirteen hits in the game including a double by Bill Murray and singles went to Chamberlain, Bryan Murray with three, H. Smith with two, H. Sweetman with three, Royce Richardson with one Coulonge had a total of ten hits: J. Romain with one single, S Doyle with one single, M Francoeur with a single, Pare with one single, K Soucie with one single and G Gagnon with one single & the four home runs previously mentioned.

Stan Chagnon to open Shawville's 109th fair

Shawville opens its 109th fair on Wednesday evening, September 15, with a horse drawing competition, and the March Midways of Toronto in attendance.

Thursday morning's activity starts with the local calf club show. Beef shows are in progress all day and the horse halter and line classes will be judged throughout the day. Thursday evening, the fair will be opened by Stan Chagnon, Associate Deputy Minister of Agriculture. This will be followed by the calf club parade and a western games show.

Friday, the Dairy Shows Ayrshire, Holstein, and Jersey will

be judged throughout the day. There will be a horse show in the afternoon and the Connaught park stake race will be run on Friday afternoon. Friday evening will be the cattle parade, with the awarding of the different trophies, and a horse show.

The 4H club interclub competitions will be held on Saturday with clubs from Gatineau and Pontiac counties participating. Horse races will continue throughout the day and there will also be a horse show in the afternoon in front of the grandstand. The grand finale of the fair will see the Haymes Sisters and local talent in action.

Best year yet at Quyon Fair

Quyon Fair had its biggest year ever last weekend with an estimated 1700 spectators at the closing event, the horse drawing contest Saturday night. They cheered all contestants and acclaimed Cliff Lapensee as winner of both the light class and the heavy class.

Second in the light class horse drawing competition was Jim Barton, followed by Donald McLaughlin, Mr. St. Laffin and Ross Stewart. Following Cliff Lapensee in the heavy class were Irwin Stewart, Ken Greer, Ellard Seymour and Pat Sweeney.

Harness racing was another great attraction as this year's Quyon Fair. The Pontiac County Pace was taken in 2.14 by Bill Pyke with M. R. Young, Ivan Farr, A. Watchorn, B. Horner, T. D. Rollins in that order.

Bill Pyke also won the Invitation Pace in 2:12 with W. Demers second, Ivan Farr third and M. Plouffe, G. Plouffe and G. Goulet 4, 5 and 6.

The invitation special was won by F. Goulet followed by Ivan Farr, D. Plouffe, Wm Pyke and F. Fleury with a time of 2:13. Winners of each race were presented with cooler blankets donated by Andrew Donaldson of Ottawa.

Friday night's horse show saw a great number of entries and was watched by an encouraging crowd. Big winner of the evening was the Pinto Valley Ranch which sent its horses over on the ferry to take the O'Keefe Trophy for most points of the show. Their entries won the open saddle class, followed by Phil Thompsons Diamond T Ranch, Paul Balharrie and a second Pinto Valley entry.

Other Pinto Valley winnings were the potato race, followed by Earl Bean, Pinto Valley second entry and Raymond Davis & Sons; the musical chairs contest; and the barrel racing followed by Rolly McDougall, Phil Thompson and Sally Thompson.

Nap Graveline took top honors in the heavy horse show while Albert Quesnel came both first and second in the 5 gaited saddle horse class and first and third in single carriage with Hilliard Green coming second and Ira

Wilson coming fourth.

Earl Geddes, Roland Green, Earl Bean and Reuben Harris took 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th for the open road class. Bob Thompson, Thomas Smith and Ernie Smith were greasy pig winners and the most ridiculous outfit standing was Keith Trudeau, Blake Armitage, Marcel Beaudoin and Don Trudeau.

The Trudeau entries, consistent winners in all pony classes, also came first in the Friday night Parade Pony class followed by other big pony winners of the fair, Neil Hodgins, Cliff Dale and Ken Cruickshank.

Agriculture Dept. encourages family farm consolidation

The Quebec Department of Agriculture and Colonization is undergoing changes, as are certain other departments at Quebec these days. There are now three general directorates in the department. One is Rural Development, the second is Extension or Agricultural Services and the third is Research and Agricultural Education.

The Rural Development's object is to double the number of profitable farms in Quebec within the next ten years. To do this the Government is encouraging the consolidation of family farms. This will involve regrouping of farms which, as they are now, cannot be made to pay. It also means that operators of subsistence farms must co-op-

erate in this development.

Agriculture being essential to human survival, it is here to stay but the family farm must be able to meet the competition of large-scale agricultural enterprises such as corporation farms, farms attached to institutions, amateur farms, joint farming ventures and others backed by considerable funds.

The man in charge of regrouping subsistence farms into paying units is Henri Brunell. His directorate provides four services: Rural Engineering including drainage and improvement of the physical condition of soils, and roads in settlement areas; organization of farm lands; Farm Development including management, buildings

and machinery, soil conservation and improvement, crop improvement and establishment of young farmers; and Colonization which is the establishment of settlers, granting of land, subsidies and premiums.

The general director of the Extension services is Lucien Bissonnette. The government feels that if Quebec's agriculture is to play its proper role, and benefit from the increased markets for farm produce resulting from her industrial development, owners of farms must be persuaded to organize and manage their undertaking so that they will pay.

Mr. Bissonnette's directorate has three services; Extension

The mechanical brains that came up with a hundred percent failure on computing the school results for this district's grade 11 catholic students have really taught a lesson, and the great schmozzle effected by their protestant counterparts has helped to bear it into the minds of the pupils.

The lesson which no school child in this area can have missed this summer is that people cannot be replaced with machines.

There are no statistics available on how many teachers, who usually augment their school term salaries by computing exam results, in the summer were out of work because of the mechanical monster, but if the Department of Education has any sense at all it will quickly get in touch with those humans, and shelve the whole lot of computing devices.

It is quite possible that such machines might be devised to do the work but they haven't been yet devised. The ones in use were probably perfect in theory but when faced with the actual work of the students they bogged down miserably.

If the Department has the nerve to try with the machines again, better they should make a few dry runs during the year, simulating the real thing as closely as possible. They might for instance set up unimportant opinion polls for high school students and try to tabulate results with the robots. Nothing would be lost by the students but a half hour or so from time to time during the year while they filled out their questionnaires and the Department could program and tabulate to their hearts' content.

Then, if they ever get the bugs ironed out and their circuits straight, they might try again on some of the students' all-important marks. But not, please, with all their marks. Start warily Mr. Tremblay, with a few, a very few, at a time so if you flop again it won't upset everyone.

But we'd still rather see it done by people. We believe there's nothing in the world like people to do people's work.

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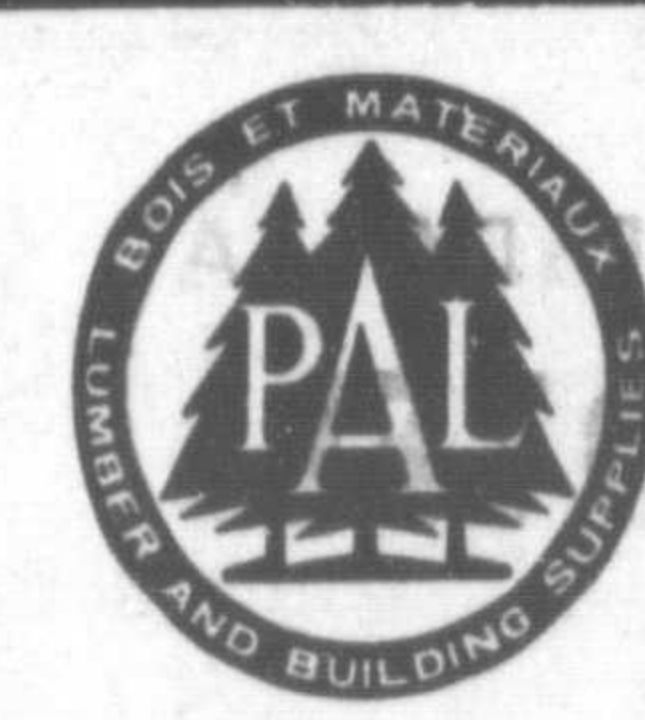
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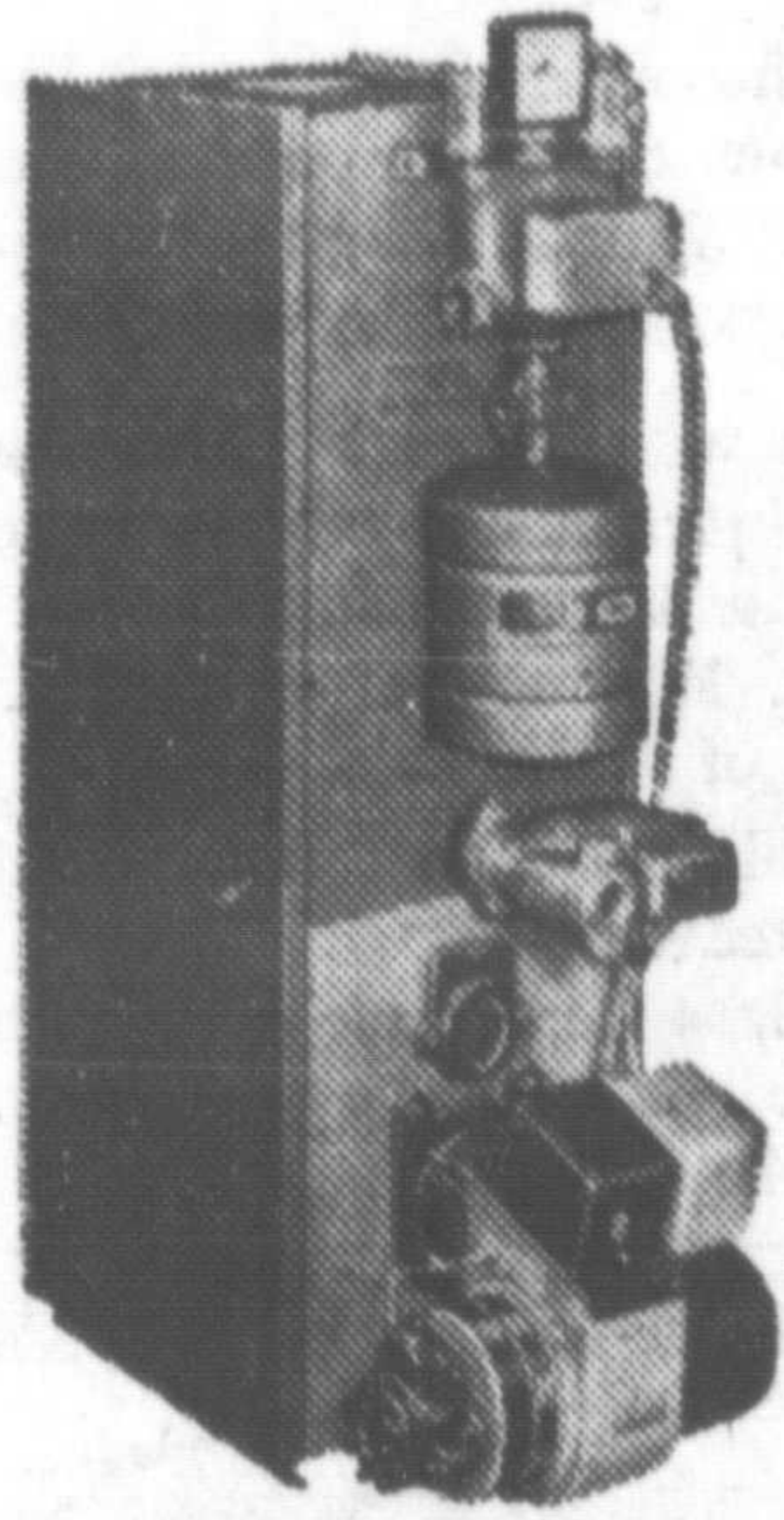

The General Directorate of Research and Agricultural Education is headed by Dr. George Gauthier His directorate works on the assumption that the many different skills now required by the farmer who must be something of a businessman, technician, carpenter, welder, trader and many other things, indicate his need for instruction.

Besides needing a good basic education and a sound vocational training he has to be able to master new methods and techniques based on the extensive research being carried on in the various sciences underlying agriculture.

The section comprises three services: Research and Scientific Information which strives to coordinate research conducted in federal, provincial, university and private agricultural research for the best possible use in production, protection, processing and so forth of farm products; Veterinary Training at the
