"Well, Squire, how d'yo do?" "Well, Zeph, tolerable well, thank you," said we, pleased at seeing the honest, good-humored phiz of our Yankee friend enter the office last evening. There are times, during the hours of business, when even Zeph is obliged to put up with short answers, or none at all from us; but last evening, without an item of news foreign or domestic to distill upon, we felt disposed to indulge in a half hour's chat with him. "Fine weather, Zeph," said we. "A fettle grain the finest, Squire, I ever seed in all my born days—the forrest season, by a dern sight, I ever know. Why, a spring as airy as this would bring out the eye like all wrath in New Hampshire. Only think of havin' plantin' time right in the middle of January. Wouldn't the old parson a stared to have seen it when we lived along with him. Guess he'd really thought the millennium, be used to talk so much about, was a comin', sure enough." "That he would, Zeph. But how is business with you?" "Well, Squire, it's pretty tough gettin' along; rather hard scratching nowadays, I tell you; plaguy few shores a duin', and ever-so-many fellers oillers ready to dip right in and take a chance job or spec out of a body's mouth. Guess I get about my share, though. Every body amost is complainin' of hard times, and say that the rivers is all friz up, and all the money is friz up in the banks tu, and no likelihood of ary one on 'em thawin' out soon; but I recon we'll all make out to live though, and be jest as well off seven years hence, as the old savin' is. But—" "But, Zeph, what is that scratch on your face?" "Said we, interrupting him on discovering, for the first time, a mark which looked rather suspicious. "What! didn't you see that afore?" "No, I did not. How did you come by it?" "Well, Squire, I got it interferin' in a fight between tew gals; tew of these marchands, I believe that's what they call 'em, who got to clawin' away bright and airy this mornin' way down by the Lower Market. You see Squire, I was a loiterin' down that way arter I'd got my Pig and Whistle; mighty fine drink, Squire; I'm fond of wormwood bitters afore breakfast; well, as I said, I was loiterin' along, when all at once I heerd the condrandest racket jest on the outside of the market. Hello, says I, what's all that rumpus about?" "Well Zeph, what was it about?" "That's jest what I'm goin' to tell you as fast as I can. Well, out I started and when I got to the spot, there stood tew gals with baskets on their heads, and they met a jawin' and splutterin' away at each other like all possessed. One on 'em was about as yaller as saffron; the other was blacker; about the color of milk and molasses; a leetle more sweetin' than milk in her if any thing." "What was this difficulty, Zeph? What was the trouble between them?" "How in water should I know, Squire. Both on 'em was a jabberin' in Spanish, or French or some other outlandish lingo, and they talked so clear and fast that it would have took tew Frenchmen to

in town, (if they can be discovered,) we are confident would produce a less favorable result; "their faces know them no more," nor are their descendants discernible. Yet we hear constantly of an aristocracy enriching themselves at the expense of the community, of "aristocracies," and "family communities." There is a lying, envious, jealous and malignant spirit abroad, which has no pity on those who have misled to their ruin, and are still misled.

We shall confine our brief view of the residences of the placemen in former times in the vicinity of Quebec, and note down the description of persons who have succeeded them, which will, at once, show the democratic tendency of our society; every thing the trading and labouring classes of the community; and the nonsense of the declamations about placemen when they experienced no check from a popular elective Assembly, will be apparent. Our list embraces, we believe, without any omission, the residence of all sorts of placemen of any note, near Quebec, prior to the accessions of their successors to office, who we believe for the most part, have not yet been able to become proprietors of residences in town. We shall begin with Beauport and proceed to the Banquette de Quebec and the Papehes of Lorette and Ste. Foy.

List of residences of former placemen in the neighbourhood of Quebec, showing into whose hands the property has fallen:

1. Lt. Governor HALDIMAND's seat at the Falls of Montmorency; now the property of a Lumber Merchant.
2. The Hon. Mr. DUCHESNAY; in the hands of a lawyer connected with the family.
3. The Hon. LOUIS DE SALABERRY; still belongs to the family and occupied by some of them.
4. The Hon. H. W. RYLAND; occupied by his son who has succeeded him as Clerk of the Council.
5. The Hon. Judge DEBONNE, Canardiere; passed into the hands of an Auctioneer and then a Surgeon.
6. The Hon. HUGH FINLAY, Gros-Pin; purchased by his Barber, and subsequently by a retired tradesman or his son.
7. The Revd. Mr. HENRY, Minister of the Scotch Church; by the same.
8. DAVID LYND, Esq., Prothonotary; the Marine Hospital.
9. The Hon. Wm. GRANT, (*des Etoiles*); the son of an Agent of the King's Posts' traders.
10. THOS. SCOTT, Esquire, Collector of the Customs, Scott's Bridge; a Grocer.
11. Mr. RENAUD, Grand Voyeur; a Barber and his heirs.
12. SAM'L PHILLIPS, Esq., Clerk of the Assembly, (Old Lorette); a Prothonotary's Clerk and Advocate.
13. M. Le Comte DUPRE's, Banquette; a Lawyer, and then afterwards a Grocer.
14. Major HOLLAND, Surveyor General; a late Officer of the Customs.
15. THOS. ANSELME, Collector; purchased by a Deputy Provincial Secretary, and now held by a relative.
16. The Hon. Col. CALDWELL, St. Foy; passed into the hands of a Merchant, and since purchased by a grandson of Col. Caldwell's.
17. Lt. Governor CRAMAHÉ, Carouge; a Distiller, an Auctioneer, and latterly a Merchant.
18. The Hon. Judge MARANE; a Lumber Merchant.
19. Lt. Governor POWELL; a Perfumer, a Collector of the Customs, and then a retired Merchant.
20. The LORD BISHOP OF QUEBEC, Marchmont; a retired Blacksmith, finally purchased by Government and exchanged.
21. The Hon. Mr. CRAIGIE, Commissary General; Plains, divided into numerous lots.

All the above twenty-first named individuals are deceased. Many of them were the most influential men of their time; 18 died in the country. Only two of their immediate descendants hold any lucrative office; and none of them died wealthy. The list might be much extended; but it is sufficiently so, to show the value of the cry which is attempted to be raised about oligarchy, family compacts, aristocracies, &c.

ECCLIASTICAL INTELLIGENCE.—On Sunday last, after an examination of three days during the preceding week, an Ordination was held in the Cathedral Church of this City by the Lord Bishop of Montreal assisted by the Rev. Geo. Mackie, his Lordship's Chaplain, the Rev. Geo. Cowell, Chaplain to H. M. Forces, and the Rev. R. R. Burrage; when the following Gentlemen were admitted respectively to the Orders of Deacon and Priests:—

DEACONS.—Mr. T. Fidler, Theological Student, formerly Catechist in the Township of Clarke, Newcastle District, U. C.—Mr. Fidler is now appointed to Fenelon Falls, Township of Verulam in the same District, (the new Diocese of Toronto being, *pro tempore*, administered by the Lord Bishop of Montreal).

Mr. J. Flanagan, being one of five gentlemen in the Canadas who were preachers in different branches of the Methodist Connection and from conscientious conviction have latterly embraced the principles of the Church, two being now in Deacons' Orders, and three aspirants to Ordination. Mr. Flanagan has for a considerable time past been preparing himself for the Ministry of the Church, under the direction of a Clergyman in U. C. He is now appointed to Barton in the Gore District, Upper Canada.

Mr. N. Guerout, Theological Student, educated in the Institution established by the late Bishop of Quebec at Chambly: Appointed to the Rivière du Loup, and Protestant Settlements in parts adjacent, in the District of Three Rivers.

Mr. James Pyke, Theological Student from the same Institution, latterly acting as Catechist at Cornwall, U. C., where he is now appointed as Assistant to the Rev. Geo. Archbold, Rector.

Mr. Mark Willoughby, Agent of the Newfoundland and British North American School Society, who has been for some time engaged in preparation for the Ministry of the Church.

PRESTERS.—The Reverend F. G. Elliott, Minister of Colchester, Western District, U. C.

The Reverend J. McMaster, Missionary at the Gore, Ottawa River, L. C.—(*Mercury*).

The Reverend R. Lonsdale, late of Trinity College, Dublin, who was ordained in the Cathedral, on the 8th ultimo, has been appointed to the charge of Kingsley, St. Francis River, L. C.

The Rev. R. Anderson, B. A. of the same College, and late a Curate in Ireland, has been appointed to Upper Ireland and parts adjacent in the County of Meantick, L. C.

Both these gentlemen, as well as Mr. Fidler, Mr. Flanagan and Mr. Guerout, are upon the Missionary Establishment of the Incorporated Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts.

Mr. W. M. Godfrey, B. A. of King's College, Windsor, in Nova Scotia, has just arrived in Quebec with Letters Dimissory from the Archbishop at Halifax, (under the authority of the Lord Bishop of that Diocese, now in England,) to be ordained Deacon by the Lord Bishop of Montreal.—(*Id.*)

POSTSCRIPT.

The *Hart* steamer, from Montreal, arrived at 4 o'clock this afternoon, brought New York evening papers of the 7th instant, a Kingston paper of the 8th, and Montreal papers of yesterday evening.

There has been a most destructive fire at New York. The entire square bounded by Water, Fulton, Front Street and Burling Slip is a heap of ruins; the loss is estimated at a million of dollars, not one half of which is insured. Another occurred at Philadelphia about the same time, between Chesnut and Market Street; loss supposed about 600,000 dollars.

A violent hurricane occurred at Bermuda on the 11th September, which did much damage to buildings and vessels.

The *Montreal Gazette* of last evening contains the proceedings of the public meeting held on the 9th, to address His Excellency Sir JOHN COLBORNE.

The Resolutions passed unanimously and are highly complimentary to Sir John. They express a hope that he will use his influence in England to promote the union of the provinces and other measures for its permanent tranquillity, as an appendage of the British Empire.

"Montreal, Thursday afternoon, Oct. 10th.
"The *St. George* steamer arrived this morning, and left again at 2 o'clock this afternoon with the *Ocean Queen* in tow. The *Hart* is the only boat in port.

"The weather has been very fine to-day, after a fall of rain.
"The intelligence by the *Liverpool* is expected to-morrow."

Mademoiselle Albina Stella, who has given two vocal concerts at Montreal, arrived in this city yesterday, and we are informed intends giving a concert at the Albion Hotel, on Monday evening next. The singing of this lady created quite a sensation in Montreal, where such magnificent vocal music had never previously been heard. Mlle. Stella was for some time *prima donna* at the theatre of San Carlos in Naples, a fact which itself proves that she must be a *cantatrice* of great power. All the Montreal papers have been most enthusiastic in her praise. The editor of the *Ami du Peuple*, who is himself a foreigner, in an elaborate critique on this lady's singing, evinced much knowledge of the performance of the most distinguished vocalists of Europe, among whom he places Mlle. Stella in a very high position. We, therefore, expect a rich musical treat next week.—(*Transcript*.)

To the Editor of The Quebec Gazette.

Sir,—I have more than once expressed in my opinion, that all the confusion and trouble, which this country has witnessed in its political relations, may be traced to the partial and unequal distribution of honours and profit in the Colony. The privilege of recommending to the Executive Government the nomination of Officers in the Canadas, has been grossly perverted and abused. It has sown the seeds of dissension, which will never be eradicated from the breasts of Her Majesty's loyal Canadian subjects. It has laid the foundation for intrigue, speculation and all kinds of corruption. It has corrupted the electors, degraded the country and given power, emolument and encouragement to wicked and designing officials. I am induced to make these remarks from the nominations which have lately taken place in the first Battalion of Canadian Militia, in the County of St. Maurice. Without advertent to the partiality which has always characterized the nomination of officers in that Battalion since the appointment of the present Lieutenant Colonel commanding the Battalion, it will only be necessary to refer to the last number of the Official Gazette to offer abundant proof of what is herein advanced. It was to be hoped in the present excited state of the feelings of the Canadian population that all causes of discontent would be removed, and that the excitement which has been hitherto generally felt, would be allowed to subside. Yet, it would appear, that notwithstanding the desire which has been evinced on the part of the Canadian people to enter upon the performance of their duties as good and loyal subjects of the Queen, the olive branch is yet to be withheld from them, and they are to be treated as a people placed under the protection of the Government. It cannot be expected that any effort will prove successful to appease the passions or quiet the minds of the Canadians, till such time as the Government is determined to remove the causes which have produced the present lamentable state of excitement. The nominations in the first Battalion of Militia, in the County of St. Maurice are, in fact, dictated in a spirit of partiality, which is discreditable to the Government, and which is a source of grief and pain to all those who have been entrusted by his Sovereign with the recommendation of persons to fill offices of honor or profit in the country. What are the reasons which have induced the present Lieutenant Colonel commanding the first Battalion of Militia of the County of St. Maurice, to recommend to the Commander of the Forces, the nomination of Mr. John Couillard, gentleman, to be Ensign in that Battalion? Mr. Couillard is not a resident in the District of Three Rivers during the greater part of the year, but is actually in the employment of the St. Lawrence Steam-Boat Company, as Purser on board one of their boats. I demand what are the reasons which have induced the present Lieutenant Colonel commanding that Battalion to nominate Mr. John Couillard, gent., to be Ensign, who has been but two or three years in the country, and who is actually *Clerk* in the employment of the Lieutenant Colonel commanding the first Battalion of Canadian Militia, in the County of St. Maurice? I put these questions categorically because the public have a right to know and be informed what are the reasons why these persons have been nominated to offices of honor, to the exclusion of other more deserving and equally loyal persons, who might be found among Her Majesty's loyal French Canadian subjects in the County of St. Maurice.

With respect to the other appointments in the Battalion, although the individuals named may or may not be deserving of promotion, I cannot allow to pass unnoticed, the nomination of Lieutenant Edouard Vézina, to be Captain. Mr. Vézina has been lately appointed Clerk of the Court of Requests for the County of Yamaska. He is not a resident in the County of St. Maurice, nor do the duties of his office permit him to reside within the precincts of that County. By the nomination of the three persons who have been appointed to the command of Companies in that Battalion, an officer who has performed the duties of Captain in the last quarter of a century has been superseded by another person named in his place. I ask again, what are the motives which actuated the Lieutenant Colonel in adopting this proceeding? Was it not for the ostensible purpose of gratifying private malice and indulging personal feeling, that this measure was resorted to? Or if not, why that the same causes existing with respect to the Lieutenant Colonel commanding the first Battalion of Militia, in the County of Champlain, the same mode of proceeding was not adopted in his case? Is it because he is the son of the Lieutenant Colonel commanding the first Battalion of Militia, in the County of St. Maurice?

I notice these instances of partiality in the nomination of officers in that Battalion merely to bring them under the consideration of His Excellency the Commander in Chief, and I take the liberty of observing, that there are no fewer in the County of St. Maurice, men, who yield not to those persons who seem to be the objects of His Excellency's favor, in respect for the Government or veneration for the constituted authorities and whose conduct has been, at all times, characterized by obedience to the law, submission to authority and loyalty to the Queen.

COMMERCIAL.

REVIEW OF THE NEW YORK MARKET.
Saturday, Oct. 5th.
Our latest advices are those by the British Queen. Her departure has caused some sensation in consequence of the large amount of Specie taken out by her. Contrary to the expectation of many, the export has had no unfavourable effect on the Money market. We are now in the midst of the usual Fall trade. The season so far, has not been as favourable as was anticipated, and it is feared the sales will be quite moderate. The country is in want of goods, but they have only produce, and this produce is not yet turned into cash. The Exchanges are also deranged that it is difficult to get funds here, except at heavy losses. The prolonged sickness at the South, causes considerable interruption. Vessels bound there are detained in port, and will not sail till about the 20th. Our port is unusually crowded with shipping, and a very large portion of our freighting vessels are idle.

Stocks have advanced to-day, and the feeling in Wall street appears to be a little better again. The difficulty, however, of obtaining money is very great. The banks discount very sparingly, and there have been two or three failures of respectable houses, and the astonishment is, that there have not been quadruple the number. Houses at all extended cannot obtain facilities from banks, but are thrown into the street, where they are compelled to pay one and a half to three per cent a month.

Flour is a little firmer to-day. Sales at 5.75 @ 5.87 1/2 for common brands Western; Southern \$6.
Grain—Several parcels of wheat in market, and some sales at 1.20 @ 1.22. Oats 42 cts., which is an advance. Corn 72 @ 74, Southern.
Ashes—Sales to-day, of Pots at 5, and pearls at \$6.
Cotton.—Prices are steady and firm to-day. Sales of Uplands 10 1/2 @ 13; new 12 @ 13; New Orleans new 14 @ 14 1/2.

SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE.
John Dugas, pilot No. 237, who took down the *Buffalo*, returned to town this morning, and reports that he left her about 20 miles on this side of St. Paul's Island, going well with a fine breeze from the west. He also reports that the prisoners were all well and very quiet.

Edw. Pettigrew, pilot, No. 56, spoke the *Aurario*, of Gaspé Bay, with 700 top-masts, jib-boom, and bulwarks in a gale on 27th ultimo. She was going into the Bay to refit. He also reports four schooners wrecked on the coast thereabout, in the same gale.
—*Captain Robinson* of the brig *Ocean*, of London, spoke the ship *John Bell*, off the Magdalen River, on the 2nd Oct. a. w. l.

Miramichi, Oct. 1.—On Friday, the 19th Sept. Capt. Gibson, of the bark *Blessing*, when off St. Paul's, fell in with the schooner *Rival*, from Quebec to Belfast, water-logged, and took off the Captain and crew. Capt. Fitzsimmons, speaks in the highest terms of the kindness and attention shown them by Captain Gibson.
[Capt. Hooper, of the brig *British Queen*, of Exeter, at this port, reports, that when off St. Paul's Island, about twenty miles, he fell in with the above named schooner, took her in tow, and on the 22nd ult. left her at anchor in the entrance of Sydney, (Cape Breton) harbour, in eight fathoms water, in charge of the mate and one seaman. She was stripped of all her sails, running rigging, &c.]—*Ed. Gleason*.

The schooner *Rival*, 194 tons burthen, was built by Mr. Oliver, of Quebec, this summer, and cleared on the 30th August, for Belfast.
Halifax, Sept. 30th.—Arrived—Schr. Joseph Smith, Babin, 24 days from Quebec, salt. Oct. 1st—Schr. Albion, Bellefontaine, 20 days, from Quebec, salt.
Picton, Sept. 24th.—On the evening of the 5th inst., H. M. Ship *Andromache*, struck on an unknown rock, off Entry Island, one of the Magdalen (not the Pearl rock); and it being the top of high water at the time, she remained 10 hours on shore, but got off without material damage, after throwing a few shot overboard, and starting a quantity of water. She remained perfectly tight, the water being, fortunately, very smooth at the time.

The rock lies a quarter of a mile due E. by N. from the high rock or islet of the N. E. Point of Entry Island. It has 11 feet water on it, with four, five and six fathoms between the islet—close outside of it there is a depth of 7 fathoms. The rock is not laid down in the recent or any previous survey, and was unknown to the pilot.
We quote the above paragraph from the P. E. Island Herald of Saturday. The *Andromache* has since arrived here, and her pilot, Mr. John Prowse, has just called to inform us, that a large vessel was recently wrecked near Entry Island, loaded with iron, bound to Quebec. He supposes that it was upon this wreck the *Andromache* struck, and in corroboration of this opinion, he brought to our office, two ship-masters who make the following statements:
Eusebius Forest, master of the schr. *Happy Return*, states that he is well acquainted with the shoals and rocks about the Magdalen Islands, and that he has been fishing round the shores for 3 years, but knows nothing whatever of the rock or shoal in the above mentioned extract, and he is confident no such exists.
Allan McDonald of Picton, pilot, states that he was formerly a ship-master, and has been in the habit of trading about the Magdalen Islands and is intimately acquainted with the surrounding coast, but knows nothing whatever of the shoal or rock at the said Entry Island, on which the *Andromache* struck.—(*Observer*.)

We are sorry to state that the Labrador fishery, so far as this port is concerned, is a complete failure. The schr. *Willing Lass*, arrived here from Labrador, spoke schr. *Success*, of P. E. Island, on Sunday night of Port au Fort, short of water, and loss of Captain—supplied her.—(*Id.*)
