A TRAVESTY ON LEGISLATION.

A majority of the distinguished gentlemen who manage the municipal affairs of the city of Montreal at the City Council have apparently a very hazy conception of the functions and obligations of a municipality. The vote yesterday on the proposition to let the scavenging service out to contractors was either a piece of sheer humbug or an act of abdication.

The gentlemen who compose the Health Committee came down to the Council with a report, asking that the scavenging be done by contract. They have spent a year wrangling over the price of hay and oats, only to find, after a month's trial, that the ostensible head of the department can do the purchasing to better advantage than the aldermen could.

Now it has gone round, the aldermen fell back upon their rights, and insisted upon the Health Committee retaining the work so that the patronage might go round. Now it has gone round, the money has been exhausted, the horses have developed a "lock jaw" epidemic, and the aldermen who compose the committee profess to be tired of the undertaking.

It is anything but a commendable theory that our municipal administration is corrupt from top to toe, it would be found in the persistent silence of even the admittedly good aldermen in face of these dangers. Their silence shows plainer than speech that they know how pervading are the malignant influences, and what it means to enter the lists against the corrupted and the corrupters.

"If illiteracy and ignorance explain the adverse vote in Quebec, what about the hostile majority in Toronto?" This is the pertinent but rather disturbing query of a correspondent of the Toronto Globe. We suggest a symposium on the subject. To think of Toronto being accused of illiteracy and ignorance!

Probably it is too much to expect that anything will be done to safeguard the interests of the citizens in case the gas and electric light companies decide to amalgamate, as it is now believed they will, but if the city were ever blessed with a mayor and council who placed the good of the city first at all times, something might be done to secure the citizens the advantages that ought to be derivable from the ownership of the streets.

THE DECLINE OF JAPAN.

Japan is disappointing to the prophets. It has not yet appeared as a great factor in international politics, though it was expected to be of vast aid to Great Britain in enforcing the "open door."

In the first place, western political institutions have not proved a success in Japan. The limited monarchy, which the Mikado himself, confident in the ability of his subjects for self-government, had not proved the wisdom of the western ideas is a failure.

Japanese politics would put any American politician to blush. Ballot-box stuffing and bribery are carried to an unprecedented extreme. For instance, of 300 votes cast in a recent election it is estimated that 300 were secured by bribery.

In diplomacy the Japanese have been a failure. Successful in war with China—and how could it fail to be successful, when they have the aid of western methods, against a country ruled by a weak-minded emperor and with a power behind the throne intent only upon making money at whatever sacrifice of the national welfare has shown itself unable to retain the fruits of that victory.

And so in the controversy over the partition of China and the struggle for the eastern trade, Japan, in spite of its paramount interests, has been thrust contemptuously aside and ignored. Her only resource is to fight, and the Mikado's statesmen know well enough that that would be the result of such a struggle.

There is an industrial crisis in Japan today. The people are poor. The manufacturers and merchants are without money. The banks are hard pressed. Already there is talk of resort to the old methods for supplying the people with work. But the treasury is becoming empty and there is no money to throw into such a bottomless pit.

They seek \$5,000 damages from the following named contractors: The Phoenix Bridge Company, Sooyamith Co., New York, and Ontario Co., and New York City Co. The writ will follow with a question of jurisdiction. Murphy was a Canadian, lived in Canada and signed his contract here.
