

German Right Wing Has Been Broken Turning Movement of Allies Developing Rapidly

FRENCH RETAKE FORT AT ST. MIHIEL LINE OF DEFENCE AT ANTWERP ATTACKED AUSTRIANS LEAVE HUNGARY TO ITS FATE

TURNING MOVEMENT OF ALLIES IS DEVELOPING.

Paris, Sept. 30. 2.52 p.m. — (Special) — According to the official bulletin on the war given out in Paris this afternoon, the turning movement of the Allies north of the Somme is developing rapidly. A German attack on Tacy-le-Mont has been repulsed with heavy losses.

FRENCH RETAKE ST. MIHIEL.

London, Sept. 30. — (Special) — The correspondent of the Times at Nancy, France, telegraphing under date of Sept. 26, gives an unconfirmed report that the French have retaken St. Mihiel, a fortified encampment on the Meuse twenty miles southeast of Verdun, and also that they have captured the Prince of Bavaria at Nancy.

BERLIN'S OFFICIAL ACCOUNT.

Berlin, via London, Sept. 30. — (Special) — A report given out at army headquarters to-day says: "There has been general fighting on our right wing in France, but nothing decisive. The centre is quiet. The French advances in the vicinity of Verdun and Toul have been renewed."

GARIBOLDIS GET COMMISSIONS.

Paris, September 30. — (Special) — Among the nominations published in the official journal to-day, says the Bordeaux correspondent of the Havas Agency, are those of Giuseppe Garibaldi as Lieut.-Colonel, Ricciotti Garibaldi as Captain, and Santo and Brino Garibaldi as Lieutenants, all of the first foreign regiments.

FORBIDDEN TO FIGHT AGAIN.

Rome, via London, Sept. 30. — An official statement, issued in Berlin and received here, says: "Prince Oscar, who has heretofore been reported as ill in a hospital at Homburg, is pronounced by specialists to be suffering with a heart affection from which he will recover, but it is said that he must not resume his place at the front, as he could not stand the strain. "Prince Joachim, who was recently wounded, is expected to be able to return to the front in October. The

other sons of the Emperor are all well."

JUNCTION IS EFFECTED.

London, Sept. 30. — It is officially announced at Vienna, according to a Rome despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company, that a junction has been effected between the new German army and the remnants of the Austrian army which fought in the Galician battle. The new combined army is taking up a position, and already has been in contact with

the Russians along the Carpathian-Tarnow-Cracow front.

COMMISSARIAT FAILED.

London, Sept. 30. — According to a Rotterdam despatch to the Daily Mail, private information from Berlin says that before the retreat to the western frontier, the German commissariat broke down completely. For a fortnight a majority of the Germans lived on bread and water. So great was their suffering that large numbers entered the hospital with nervous breakdowns, and many became insane.

GERMAN RIGHT WING BROKEN

ENEMY IS BEING PURSUED BY THE ALLIES.

London, Sept. 30. — While the French and British official announcements indicate satisfaction with the situation along the battle front in France, and confidence in the outcome, an unofficial report from Paris declares that the German right has been broken and is being pursued by the Allies. This report also declared that the Germans have been surrounded in the Somme department, and that Peronne had been recaptured. The official press bureau at London while making no objection to the publication of these reports, declined to take any responsibility for the correctness of them.

ALLIES IN HOT PURSUIT OF VON KLUCK.

The news of General Von Kluck's reverse was received here at 12.20 a. m. this (Wednesday) morning by the Exchange Telegraph Company as follows: "Paris, Sept. 29. — 'It is stated here to-night (Tuesday) that the German right wing has been entirely broken and is now being pursued by the Allies. All the automobiles in northern France have been requisitioned for the purpose of pursuit. "Armored motor cars with mitrailleuses are also being used to pursue the retreating enemy. "The official communication issued at 3 o'clock demonstrates unmistakably that the Germans have been surrounded in the Somme department, the French front extending further east. "It is officially stated that Peronne has been recaptured."

WORST IS OVER; BEST MAY BE HOPED FOR

In the light of the above news the following censored despatch forwarded by G. H. Ferris, war correspondent of the London Daily Chronicle, to his paper, is regarded as significant.

Paris, Tuesday, Sept. 29. — At last! The pale gleam of to-day's sunshine is nothing to the smile that irradiates faces of those who know. It has been a bitterly long wait for good news and the relief is extraordinary. The public must still wait a little for details, but out dutiful censors will hardly deny me the satisfaction of stating that the worst is over and the best may be hoped for."

LONDON CHEERFULLY CONFIDENT.

London, Sept. 30. — Though the closely drawn censorship has not permitted the publication of any definite news beyond that contained in the official bulletins concerning what is happening in France, nevertheless there prevails throughout the military clubs and other good sources of information a spirit of cheerful confidence. Information from quarters which have always been reliable show that confidence is not baseless, nor unjustified.

"NOTHING NEW," SAYS PARIS BULLETIN.

Paris, Sept. 30. — The French official communication issued last night says: "There is nothing new in the situation."

ALLIES "WELL HOLDING THEIR OWN."

London, Sept. 30. — The Official Press Bureau issued the following regarding the operations in northern France: "There is practically no change. The allies' left have had some heavy fighting, but they are well holding their own."

HUNGARY LEFT TO ITS FATE

AUSTRIAN ARMY HAS ABANDONED COUNTRY AND NATIONAL GUARDS LEFT.

London, September 30. — From the latest events in Galicia and along the Carpathians the conclusion drawn is that the Austrian army has abandoned Hungary to its fate and has left the route to Budapest to be defended by the Hungarian national troops," says the Petrograd correspondent of the Daily Telegraph. The despatch continues: "The Austrians continue to retreat before the pursuing Russians, and appear to have given up not only the defence of their country in general, but also to have decided to abstain from further independent action. They are simply hurrying on to Cracow to join the right wing of the Germans and apparently intend to become a mere component part of the German army."

"Having passed the most difficult part of Egeek Pass in the Carpathians after dislodging the Hungarians from three positions, the Russian troops have only some ten to fifteen miles to descend before reaching the Hungarian plateau, where there is not a single fortress or fortified position except such as may be hastily improvised in the form of earthworks by the Hungarian defenders."

ATTACK ON ANTWERP

GERMANS BEGIN ON THE FIRST LINE OF DEFENCE

Amsterdam, via London, Sept. 30. — The Germans have commenced their attack on the first line of defence of Antwerp, according to despatches received by the Amsterdam papers. Moll, which is an important railway junction near the Dutch border, was occupied by the Germans on Sunday, and the Germans, who have recaptured Malines, began a bombardment of Liege, directly in front of Antwerp. They also continued their bombardment of forts Warin and St. Catharine. It is believed that heavy Austrian artillery is being used.

Liege, according to a message to the Handelsblad, has been under shell fire since early morning. The shells at first hid in the cellars, but subsequently.

HEAVY GALE IS SWEEPING OVER NORTH SEA

DR. MIGNAULT GAVE A GIFT OF \$50,000 FOR NEW CORPS—RECRUITING TO START SOON

Montreal, Sept. 30. — It is regarded as altogether likely that Colonel Joseph Landry, of Quebec, commander of the 5th Militia Division of Canada, will be the commanding officer of the new French-Canadian regiment, the formation of which was authorized by the Government on Monday. It was announced yesterday that recruiting offices would be opened in a few days.

MR. LORENZO PRINCE, who with Dr. Artur Mignault has been actively engaged in promoting the project of forming the regiment, said yesterday on his return from the capital, that the delegation had received a warm welcome from the Prime Minister, who expressed his entire approval of the plan. Sir Robert Borden had also thanked Dr. Mignault for his gift of \$50,000 for the regiment.

Colonel Hughes had made complimentary remarks on the patriotism of the Canadians, pointing out that 2,400 of these had been included in the first contingent to go overseas. He added that seventeen thousand more men would be required for the second contingent and that he was glad to think that among them would be an exclusively French-Canadian regiment.

BRITISH GUNNERS WENT TO DEATH

London, Sept. 30. — A Reuter despatch from Paris says: "Thirty gunners of a British field battery have fallen. Knowing that they were going to almost certain death, they called out: 'Good-bye, fellows' to their comrades on the reserve line. Two minutes later every man was out of action."

"Thirty more went to the front with the same farewell greeting. The German shells were falling thick behind the battery, and killed or wounded every man serving the guns. "Eventually the persistence and accuracy of the British fire proved effective, and the British infantry advanced and took the opposing position at the point of the bayonet. "Similar incidents occurred along the whole western wing, Tuesday, enabling the Allies to hold their own against repeated furious onslaughts of the Germans, who were attempting to break through."

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TRAULERS BARRED FROM EAST COAST

BRITAIN ISSUES ORDER WHICH WILL AFFECT DUTCH AND DANISH FISHERMEN.

Grimsby, England, Sept. 30, via London. — Beginning to-morrow, according to orders issued yesterday by the British naval authorities, no neutral trawlers will be allowed to fish on the east coast of England, but they may continue their operations on the west coast. This order will affect a large number of Dutch and Danish trawlers now using Grimsby as a fishing base.

AUSTRIAN SHIP TORPEDOED.

London, Sept. 30. — (Special) — A despatch to the Times from Milan gives under reserve a report that while two Austrian warships were attempting a sortie from Cattaro one of them was torpedoed.

GERMANS CLAIM FLEET NOW READY

Copenhagen, Sept. 30. — Travellers arriving here from the Kiel Canal say that the Germans are busy placing new ordnance, which the Krupp works have been experimenting with for the past two years, on the armored cruisers and dreadnoughts. The canal is described as being crowded with warships, including the largest battleships. The arsenals are busy day and night, and long trains arrive continuously with immense guns for the ships. The Germans are reported as declaring that the whole fleet will soon be ready to fight.

RUSSIANS CAPTURE KAISER'S STOCK

London, Sept. 30. — (Special) — A despatch to the Star from Petrograd says that among the remarkable war trophies arriving at Smolensk is the entire stock of Emperor William's famous pedigree cattle and stud horses captured by the Russians from the Emperor's estate at Rominten, in East Prussia. They were taken to Moscow and presented to the Russian Agricultural Institute for distribution to agricultural breeding associations.

SEIZED IN MEXICO CITY

Mexico City, Sept. 30. — (Special) — Four hundred and eighty bars of bullion, valued at 2,000,000 pesos, were seized by the Government officials yesterday at Buenavista railway station. It was claimed that the bullion was being secretly shipped out of the country by members of the Cientifico party. Six mining companies have put in a claim for the bullion.

UNIONS FORM AN ALLIANCE

Strikes Over Work Which One Union Should do Will be Averted

WORKERS REPRESENTED AT CONFERENCE REPRESENT 500,000 WORKERS IN THE STATES AND CANADA.

New York, Sept. 30. — (Special) — It was announced here last night that the delegates of six international unions in the building trades have completed the forming of an alliance by which strikes over disputes involving the work one union should do will be averted. The six unions are the Bricklayers' and Masons' International Union, the Journeymen Stonecutters International Union, the International of Engineers, the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, the Plain and Ornamental Operative Plasterers' Society and the International Hod Carriers' and Building Laborers' Society of America. They represent more than 500,000 workers throughout the United States and Canada.

BRITAIN AIDS BELGIAN REFUGEES

Six Thousand Have Already Been Placed in Private Homes in Country

THREE THOUSAND MEN ARE IN LONDON DEPOTS AWAITING DISTRIBUTION.

London, Sept. 30. — Britain has come to the relief of the stricken Belgian refugees with such spontaneous magnanimity that the refugees' committee has been forced to decline many of the flood of offers of shelter. Six thousand Belgians have already been placed in private homes, while three thousand are in the London depots awaiting distribution. Five hundred came in yesterday and three thousand others are scattered in lodging and boarding houses, for whose keep the Government has assumed responsibility. Two local committees are engaged in the refugee work and additional committees are being formed in various parts of Great Britain. Up to this time offers from 100,000 persons to care for the refugees have been received and the committee has found it necessary to issue a circular saying it had a superfluity of offers. For a time the tide of refugees arriving in Great Britain reached as high as 4,000 a day. Seventy tons of clothing and other supplies have been donated for the unfortunates.

BRITISH STEAMER RELEASED BY U.S.

Washington, Sept. 30. — Following a protest by Sir Cecil Spring Rice, the British Ambassador, Secretary of State Bryan directed that the British steamer Chancellor be released by Government officials at Galveston, Texas.

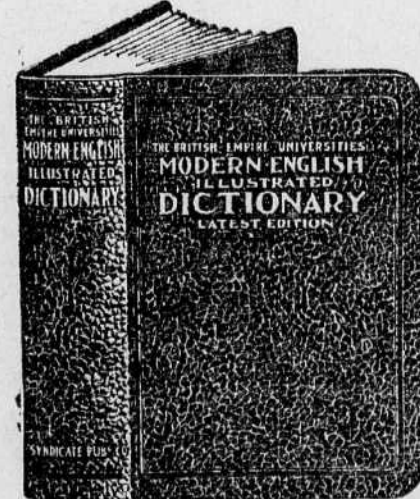

LIFE AMONG THE ESKIMOS

Rock Forest Man Has Spent Many Years in Arctic Regions

WAS ACQUAINTED WITH STEFANSSON—RE-VISITS HIS FORMER HOME NEAR SHERBROOKE

A longing desire to revisit his birthplace at Rock Forest after many years' absence has caused Mr. James E. Nagle to make a journey of some five thousand miles. He arrived in Sherbrooke this week from the Arctic regions where he is engaged in the fur trade for the Northern Trading Co.

Mr. Nagle is in charge of the company's depot at Fort Arctic Red River, 1900 miles north of Edmonton, and where the only other white men are a Hudson Bay clerk and a Missionary. He has many excellent credentials including one from Stefansson, the explorer who had charge of the Government Arctic expedition and who stayed with Mr. Nagle for three weeks last February when he and his party were looking for the lost "Karluk." When leaving Stefansson told him he was going to Victoria Land, and that he was unable to hire Eskimos to go with him on account of the drifting ice, but he felt confident he would reach his destination as if the ice floes drifted it would be in that direction.

In Nagle's opinion the explorer is still drifting on the ice somewhere in the Arctic ocean.

Mr. Nagle, who is in robust health says he thoroughly enjoys his life in the north. He built the store and Eskimo-fashioned house out of driftwood, the windows being made of ice. The temperature is 65 to 70 below zero in winter time and in the summer 10 to 15 below. He says that these Eskimo tribes who have come under the influence of the Missionary have developed a high moral character—they are honest and peaceable—and "don't kill their babies any more."

Travelling with dogs and sleigh, trading with the natives for furs, which he takes in exchange for groceries, dry goods and anything else in his store, Mr. Nagle describes as a good open healthy life and says he would not exchange it for anything. Sometimes when away from home they are overtaken by fierce wind and snowstorms and have to seek shelter in hastily built snow-houses, otherwise they would perish.

The Eskimos are capital hunters, and fishers and live principally on frozen raw fish, all, blubber, beaver, moose meat, and caribou. They never see beef, mutton or vegetables but get tea and coffee from Edmonton.

Mr. Nagle leaves Sherbrooke in a day or two to visit his mother and sisters, in New Bedford, Mass., and intends returning to his Arctic quarters in November. He informed the Record that he saw a great improvement in Sherbrooke since he was here 13 years ago and was almost overwhelmed with emotion as he described his visit to Rock Forest on Monday to "see the house where I was born and the other house we moved to." He is a son of the late Parker W. Nagle, of Sherbrooke, at one time Government Timber Agent for Quebec Province, and has three cousins in Ottawa—one a Government surveyor, one a doctor and the other an official in the Crown lands department. He has some interesting Eskimo relics in his possession, one being a set of crib-boards, made out of pure ivory walrus tusks by the natives with their knives.

One almost incredible fact in connection with the people in the far north is that they know nothing concerning the present war, as they only receive mail twice a year, in February and July, and are far removed from any telephone or telegraph zone.

WILL REPEAL HOME RULE

SIR EDWARD CARSON OUTLINES HIS ULSTER PROGRAMME AFTER THE WAR.

Belfast, Ireland, Sept. 30.—Sir Edward H. Carson, leader of the Irish Unionist party, outlined the Ulster programme of the future in addressing the Unionist Council yesterday. "I propose," he said, "when the war is over, to summon a provisional government, and I propose that their first act should be to repeal the Home Rule Bill so far as Ulster is concerned. I propose in the same act to enact that it is the duty of the volunteers to see that no act, or no attempt to an act, under that bill should ever have effect in Ulster."

"Meanwhile, let us throw ourselves as we are throwing ourselves, wholeheartedly into the patriotic action that the time demands in supporting the Empire."

SERGEANTS OF 53RD REGIMENT

Send a Last Good-Bye to Sherbrooke Friends Before Leaving For the Front

CAPT. SAMPSON AND LIEUT. ADAMS ARE HIGHLY ESTEEMED BY ALL RANKS OF "F" COMPANY. Valcartier Camp, Sept. 24

Dear Mr. Editor:— Just a few lines, according to promise, from the Sergeants of the 53rd Regiment. We are leaving tomorrow morning, presumably for England, but no information can be obtained here. However, we thought that through your columns we might send a last good-bye to the people of Sherbrooke.

We have had some remarkably good training here, and also some remarkably bad weather, wet and cold, but we managed to get a fine oil stove and lamp in my tent, and Sgt. Patterson, Sgt. H. Tate, Sgt. T. Hall, Sgt. G. Edgell and myself are gathered together after the day's work, fairly comfy. A large packing case with a blanket over it makes an excellent desk, and we have each decided to write a portion of this letter. I may say that our company is now considered one of the finest in the brigade, and our sergeants second to none, so much so that we are in danger of losing them, as other companies are anxious to have them transferred, which would be to their benefit but greatly to Capt. Sampson's loss. For instance, Sgt. Patterson has just had an offer to be promoted Color-Sgt. of "A" Coy., but after some discussion amongst ourselves he decided to refuse the honor and remain with us for the present. Just now Sgt. Tate is lying on my blankets (he is very often there). Sgt. Edgell is giving us a solo on the piccolo. Sgt. Davidson is feeding our mascot (a little kitten) which I got this afternoon. Sgt. Hall is making a most discordant row on the mouth organ, and Sgt. Patterson is discoursing fluently on military law, and between them I can write no more, so I am handing this serial over to Sgt. Patterson to add his quota.

SGT. PATTERSON.

I do not think that I can add much to what Col.-Sgt. Wilson has said, except that we are to be the last battalion to leave the camp, which I think is a good thing for us, as we are much better here than waiting on board ship for three or four days, as I guess we will all have had enough of life aboard ship by the time we reach the other side. The boys are a little restless and eager to be off, as since we have been here we have had so many rumors as to when we were to go that they are glad to have something definite at last. The bugle has just sounded "orderly sergeants," and as I am orderly sergeant for "F" Coy., I will hand this over to Sgt. Tate to add his share.

SERGEANT H. TATE.

To go on with my little share, must say personally I like the work (and it is real work being a sergeant, too) fine, and it is naturally a pleasure to serve under two officers such as Capt. Sampson and Lieut. Adams. We were shifted around so much it is a wonder we didn't lose each other. However, from reports I guess they are just as anxious to stick with us as we are with them. Capt. Sampson must surely look the part, as one of my section continually remarks "My, but doesn't Capt. Sampson look like a colonel," so you can see what the men think of him. If we are lucky in our commissioned officers, we certainly are fortunate in having two veterans for senior sergeants, such as Color-Sergeant Wilson and Sgt. Patterson, as there is nothing they can't post us on. The Battalion Quartermaster says "Wilson is a corker," and the Sgt.-Major told the Captain that Patterson was "a peach." They both are old soldiers and should know. Col.-Sgt. Wilson and Sgt. Patterson naturally have their share of fun at our expense, as we are pretty new at the work. I will now hand my pencil over to our company orator, Sgt. Hall.

SGT. HALL.

I must say that all the boys are happy and are very pleased with the Baluchava caps the ladies of Sherbrooke sent them. We are having a good time down here, but believe me, we will have to make up for it when we get to England, or wherever we are going, for nobody seems to know as everything is kept secret and all our mail is being stopped at Quebec. Now all the boys are in high spirits, and all like Capt. Sampson and Capt. Adams. I cannot say much more, as I must hand it over to our mascot for his little story.

SGT. EDGELL.

Well, as I'm the mascot I must be a cat, so me for "cat tales." Just now there is some row in the tent. Jack Patterson is trying to blow himself on the piccolo, and it's not music. It's time to eat jam and hardtack, called cart-wheels, strikers, war medals and other complimentary names, but really good. I tell you, we do like jam; it's one of the best eats we have. A few personals will not be out of place, so here they are. Color-Sgt. T. W.'s hair "ain't what it used to be," says Sgt. Jack Pat. Is developing quite a corporation. Sgt. Tate has "something" on his upper lip (it's out of sight), while Sgt. Tom Hall wears two pairs of puttees to make the calves show their good feeding. In addition, I might say that Sgt. Edgell has developed quite a good appetite, and usually a round dozen war medals disappear at each meal. That for mine, and the "Colors" will shut up the shop.

Well, so long for the present, and look out for our next letter from Europe. Send us a copy of your paper sometimes, on behalf of the boys.

LATEST TURNING MOVEMENT DEVELOPING

Paris, Sept. 30. — (Special) — The text of the official statement is as follows:

First—On our left wing north of the Somme the section continues to develop rapidly. To the north between the Oise and the Aisne the enemy has delivered a vigorous attack on Tracy-Le-Mont, northeast of the forest of the Aigue. They were repulsed with heavy losses.

Second—On the centre there is relative calm along the entire front, which extends from Rheims to the Meuse. Between the Atrogonne and the Meuse we have made slight progress.

In the moore district there has been severe battles. Our troops have advanced at several points, notably to the east of St. Mihiel. On our right wing in Lorraine and the Vosges there has been no change.

AUSTRIAN SORTIES FAIL.

In Galicia the efforts at sorties made by the Austrian garrison at Przemyśl have failed. The Austrian armies continue to retire in disorder, losing numerous prisoners, artillery and war material.

PENETRATES INTO HUNGARY.

At Mount Duxto, south of Przemyśl in the Carpathians, a Russian detachment has defeated a Hungarian brigade and penetrated into Hungary.

LETTER RECEIVED FROM LONDON

Miss Bacon Writes of War Time in World's Metropolis

TELLS HOW GERMAN PEOPLE HAVE BEEN MISLED

Miss Bacon, formerly of Sherbrooke who has been abroad for some months, and, at present, is in London, writes to a friend as follows:

"Our plans are unsettled, but we are just staying on, being quite comfortable, and our passage is engaged for the 17th of October."

"Some people tell us we are unwise, as, if the naval battle comes off, as expected any day, crossing would be dangerous and, perhaps, impossible—Who can tell!"

"I have no time to write war talk, though, of course, we read and talk of nothing else, but one thing I do wish to tell you that might be of interest to the papers."

"We have seen a good deal of many Americans coming from the Continent, have talked with them in ship offices, on the street, in crowded places, anywhere—everywhere."

"Besides all this we have had a number in our comfortable pension, among them five people from Munich (not together)."

Son and Daughter of Mr. Peters, West Bolton, Had to Make a Quick Exit

OWNER OF HOUSE WAS BADLY BURNED ABOUT THE FACE AND HEAD IN SAVING GOODS.

West Bolton, Sept. 30.—(Special)—Early Tuesday morning the house of Mr. H. Peters was burned to the ground. The origin of the fire is a mystery. Mr. Peters hearing a noise about four o'clock got up and on going to the woodshed found it in flames. He awakened other members of the family and nearby neighbors who were quickly on the scene and helped to save a small portion of the contents on the first floor, but his winter supply of provisions which was in the cellar and what was in the chamber was all consumed.

His son and daughter who were upstairs had to escape from the flames in their night clothes.

Mr. Peters in trying to save his effects was badly burned about the face and arms, his hair being all burnt from his head. A doctor was called at once.

Mr. Peters is a German who has resided here the past ten years and has the deepest sympathy of all his neighbors.

There was a small insurance. He was repairing the house, all the paint being burned as well.

An automobile driven slowly by Dr. Tupper frightened the horses. They started up the hill by the Presbyterian Church and through the yard of the Canada Paper Company and ran into a fence. They were caught and led back to the store, when one of the horses, valued at \$230, dropped down dead. It was very fortunate that no other vehicles were met, or there might have been a very serious accident.

COWANSVILLE LADIES WERE IN WAR ZONE.

Cowansville, Sept. 30.—(Special)—Mrs. Cotton and her daughter, Miss Kathryn Cotton, who recently returned from abroad, were in Munich, Bavaria, when the European war broke out. They witnessed the mobilization of the bulk of the first German army and say it was a wonderful sight, but do not care to witness it again. They fortunately, instead of taking letters of credit, had arranged to have her son, Dr. Thos. Cotton, remit to them monthly by draft. This was much better when they had to start for home in a hurry. Being Canadians, they even then were near being detained until after the war, but being acquainted with the American Consul at Munich, he, at the suggestion of Mrs. Cotton, secured a passage from Munich to the Hague as companions and maid to an elderly lady, from Maine, who was returning home ill and of course needed care. The party were sent to the Hague in magnificent parlor cars and being "Americans" were shown every courtesy and furnished with quantities of German literature for the friends at home.

This on their arrival in London they were asked to leave with the authorities there. From the Hague they took boat for London and on enquiry there were first told they could not get reservations on outgoing boats until the last of September, but fortunately the next day some other parties changed their plans, and Mrs. Cotton's party were given their places, sailing from Liverpool the 11th of September. On board ship for a day or two it was a little difficult to get proper attention, owing to most of the old stewards having been pressed into service on war vessels and their places taken by new hands, but they soon learned the work and nobody suffered. The voyage home, which took ten days, was simply delightful, the sea being most of the time so calm there was scarcely a ripple on the surface. Arriving in New York, they were met by Dr. Cotton and came home via Montreal, arriving in Cowansville in good time and looking well, but not anxious to go back.

GERMANS RIGHT WING BROKEN

Recently fled to Antwerp, being joined by fugitives from the surrounding villages. It is reported that many houses have been destroyed and some of the inhabitants killed and wounded. One shell fell on a hospital killing nine persons.

RUSSIANS NOW HOLD RAILWAYS

MAY CUT OFF CRACOW AND MARCH ON BRESLAU.
London, Sept. 30.—A message from Vienna, dwelling on the Russian advance through Galicia, says that the Russians are in possession of all the railways in the district of Przemyel and are advancing rapidly in two lines, "says a despatch from the Rome correspondent continues."

"The northern column of Russians has made an assault on Tarnobrzeg, the last obstacle between it and Cracow, and distant from the latter place only sixty miles. The southern column, after occupying Sanok, had advanced westward with the intention of cutting off the retreat in that section of the Austrian army which is being driven southward."

"Indications are that the Russians do not intend to capture Cracow, but to leave it cut off and surrounded and then to advance towards Breslau, hoping to join the Russian centre now in Poland."

GERMANS AND AUSTRIANS BEATEN BY RUSSIANS.

Paris, Sept. 30.—An official communication issued at Petrograd and received by the Havas Agency says: "In the region of Ossowetz and Druskeniki, on September 28th the Russians attacked the Germans furiously. A new attempt by the Germans to cross the Niemen failed and a violent combat took place for possession of the northern routes of the forest of Augustowo. This town is occupied by Russian troops."

"In Galicia the Austrian rear guard has suffered another defeat near Douklo and abandoned their cannon and 400 waggons."

"In the region of Krosno, Galicia, the Russians have taken two hundred prisoners belonging to 22 different regiments."

BRITISH WAR ON BARBAROUS DOCTRINE.

Cardiff, Sept. 30.—The British Empire declared war on the barbarous and brutal doctrine cynically avowed by Germans, that nations have no rights unless powerful to enforce them, declared Chancellor Lloyd George in a speech here. He quoted instances of where nations raised untrained troops, mentioning particularly, the war of the revolution, when raw troops impelled by the zeal of devotion defeated the highly trained.

RETREAT WAS INEVITABLE.

London, Sept. 30.—The Daily News military expert, writing yesterday, says: "Last night's Paris communiqué and the one this evening are on the whole satisfactory. If we were anxious on Saturday about the German movement in the Woerth direction against the Verdun-Toul defensive line, we have now been fully reassured. Had the movement been a serious one it would have developed before now, but it is clear that it is dragging and may now be regarded as a feint than as a determined effort to cross the Meuse in force."

"What seems probable is that when Von Kluck asked for reinforcements, the German general staff had nowhere to draw on except Lorraine, and the offensive power of the German armies on the eastern frontier had to be sacrificed to the vital necessity of keeping the right wing of the German army from losing hold of its communications with Belgium."
