Play ball at fair

One of the features of this year's fair was the baseball games played on Thursday, Saturday and Sunday.

On Thursday night, Huntingdon Midget "A" team, playing its last league game defeated Ste. Martine 5-3. After a shaky start pitcher Dwight Arthur settled down to pitch his usually steady game. Huntingdon had to come from behind for their victory, being down 3-0, after the first three innings.

On Saturday afternoon, a Mosquito all-star team lost to a team from Malone, 11-6. Despite the high score both pitchers Jody Johnston of Malone and Jacques Royal of Huntingdon pitched excellent ball in their stints on the mound.

Following the mosquito game, the Pee-Wees were edged out 3-2 by a team from Valleyfield. The closeness of the score was surprising in view of the fact that Valleyfield had three players on its team who played in the recent Little League World Championships in Williamsport, Pennsylvania.

The Midget "B" team was the only Huntingdon contingent to win on Saturday beating out their Valleyfield rivals.

Sunday marked what many thought was the most exciting game of all those played during the fair. The Huntingdon Atom team comprised of seven and eight-year olds edged out a team of eight and nine year olds from St. Timothee 13-12 in a hard-fought contest.

On Saturday the Midget "A" team started its quarter-final "A" series against Mercier in Mercier. They handily defeated their opponents 11-4. Winning pitcher Dwight Arthur coasted to a 10-0 lead after four innings, and only gave up the four Mercier runs in the sixth inning. The second game of the series was supposed to be played here on Monday but was cancelled due to rain.

Fire damage is set at \$100,000

It took 34 men from three fire departments over an hour and a half to put out a blaze at the Boulevard L'Oasis Company in Godmanchester last Friday at noontime. The plant was situated on Route 4 behind Cameron Steward Inc. farm equipment.

Plant manager Adrien Vachon of Huntingdon estimated damages at over \$100,000. The company, which is owned by Robert Mathieu of Quebec City, makes fibreglas swimming pools, and there were four swimming pool frames, four moulds used in making pools, and other materials in the plant when the fire started.

Mr. Vachon said that he and the other four employees left as usual for lunch at noon. Mrs. Georgette Girouard, who lives across the road from the building, said that sometime later she saw flames leaping out from the front portion of the structure. She phoned Mr. Vachon and then the fire department.

Some minutes later she heard an explosion. Godmanchester fire chief Bill Martin said there were three such explosions in all and they ranged from small to medium. Tom McNaughton, who lives in front of the building also saw flames coming out of the front of the building, but by the time he phoned Mrs. Girouard's call had already been received. Huntingdon assistant chief Cyril Stewart said the call was received at 12:20.

The Huntingdon firemen arrived first on the scene, and quickly disconnected the Hydro lines to the building. The nearest water source was a hydrant 1,000 feet away. The Chateauguay River, which is about the same distance was also used. Cyril Stewart said the building "was already gone" by the time the firemen got there. The Godmanchester firemen arrived a short time later, as did the volunteer brigade.

Godmanchester-Huntingdon fire union hopes dimmer

The possibility of unification between the Huntingdon and Godmanchester Fire departments has grown dimmer in the wake of a meeting held last Tuesday between members of both councils. Three members from each council and both mayors heard Chief L'Heureux of Huntingdon say that his men wanted one fire department and one chief under the new municipal building's roof. The chief explained that were the new departments to unite, the Godmanchester firemen would have to be evaluated, as he didn't know the quality of their individual work. The chief also went on to say that at present there

were two assistant fire chiefs, and with unification, there was a strong possibility that a third from Godmanchester would be added.

The Godmanchester council did not seem very keen about the proposed unification. Councillor Rennie accused Chief L'Heureux of attempting to plan the unification without consulting Godmanchester.

At one point he said, "You just heard your chief say that he was going to do the planning." Most councillors seemed to feel that the unification had come about two years too late, and that a more appropriate time would have been before

Godmanchester formed its own department.

Mayor Charles Reid pointed out that his municipality's firemen were very proud of their equipment and spent a great deal of time working on it but feared that with unification they might not be as enthusiastic. He said, "I'm

Havelock Saturday

For 100 years the annual fair at Havelock has been one of the most picturesque and delightful events in the western Quebec area. For those who don't relish the noise and smells of a midway, the blinding dust of a dirt race track or the stomach-turning sensation of amusement rides, Havelock this Saturday is the place to go.

There the most colorful event will be some fine young equestrians, both riders and horses decked out in their very best, and one can thrill to the kiddies three legged race or sack race, or simply view top quality domestic animals of all types as well as fruit, vegetable and handicraft displays.

One of the features of the fair is the farm style home cooked dinner provided by the Hinchinbrooke Volunteer Fire Brigade and their wives. More than adequate amounts of baked ham and roast beef with all the trimmings followed by one or two pieces of home baked pies make this a real bargain at \$2.00.

Youth Fair feature

Huntingdon Fair has come and gone for another year, its 114th according to its own records.

Organizers expressed their satisfaction with the four-day event and felt that the standards were well up to those of previous years.

Despite its critics (and the Fair does have some) a great many people enjoyed themselves in the arena, on the midway, watching the judging, touring the booths or sampling the refreshments.

Events for light horses drew enthusiastic if not always large audiences. The arena had a capacity crowd on Saturday night.

Disappointment was expressed in some quarters that entries in some

categories were sometimes thin - and a number of sections drew none at all. The reason for this state of affairs in the farm or garden divisions was obvious - the poor growing conditions of the past summer.

The younger generations especially enjoyed themselves. The Fair opened Thursday morning with a Junior Achievement program for young farmers. The kids were the outstanding attraction of the evening parade, with the decorated bicycles and carts. The Ormstown Rhythmettes and the Huntingdon Canadets entertained. The children's department exhibits provided lots of competition, the 1-11 program keen interest and a

number of youngsters outshone their elders in the light horse events.

The midway drew while it was operating, and the giant bingo which closed the Fair Sunday evening was well received.

Opening night at the Huntingdon fair emphasized the small fry. Youngsters played an important part in the opening parade with originally decorated bicycles and floats. After the fair was officially opened by Huntingdon MNA Ken Fraser, a horse and pony potato race featured some of the best young riders in the country.

The parade was headed by Huntingdon's own Canadets, who showed why they have been winning trophies in several parade competitions this summer. Next came a convertible containing Fair president Stanley Reid and Mr. Fraser. Other cars followed with Mayors Pilon of Huntingdon, Reid of Godmanchester, Wilson of Hinchinbrooke, Quenneville of Dundee, and Benoit of Ste. Barbe.

The Maple Leaf Grange had a float entitled "Seed-time Harvest", which depicted the settlers of old.

Also on Saturday night Henry Bonenberg and Claude Lazure were presented with plaques by fair president Stanley Reid for their many years of work at the fair.

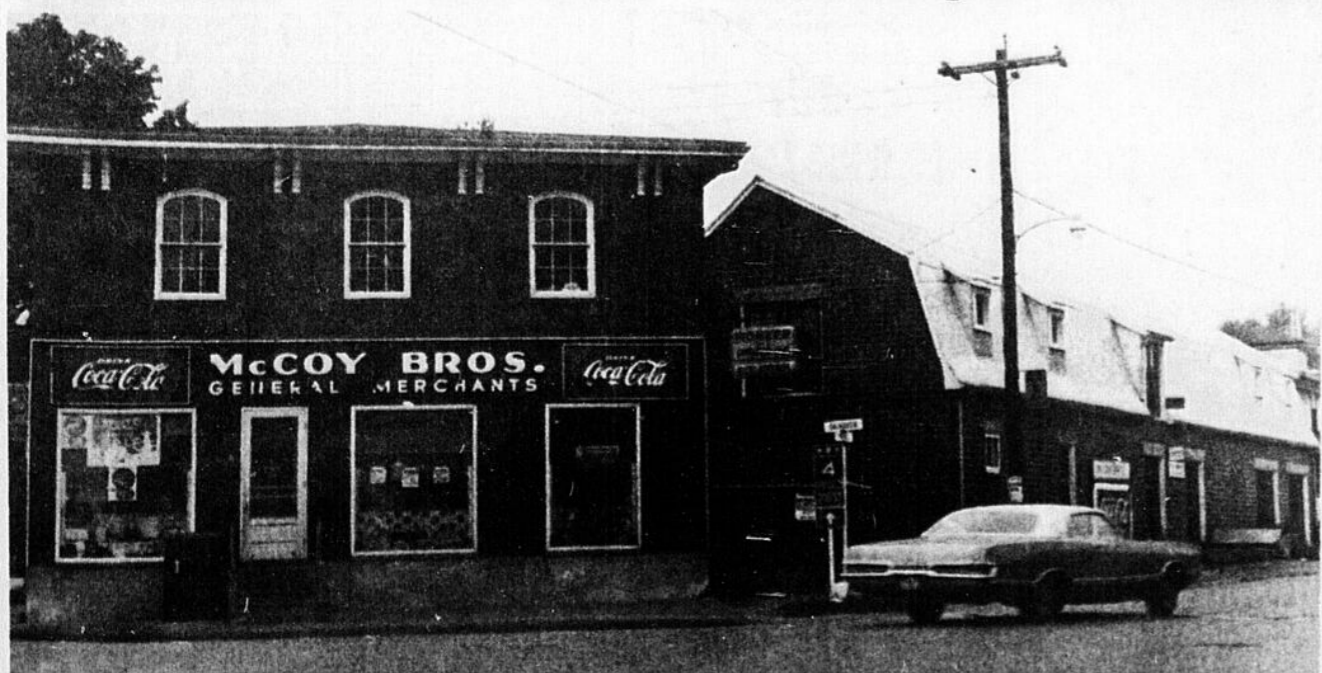

Huntingdon landmark will soon have new look

"McCoy's Store", a name almost as well known as the name Huntingdon, is soon to become little else than a memory to the generations of people from near and far.

The landmark, 100 years old next year, will remain intact but Jim and Dave McCoy are giving up retail merchandising in a few weeks.

A contract has been awarded to Maurice Perreault Construction Co. of Huntingdon to renovate the store and warehouse into apartments. The main store will consist of six, three on the second storey and three on the first. The warehouse on Prince St., erected in 1945, will be made into eight.

All of the apartments will be of the bachelor type. Electric heating will be

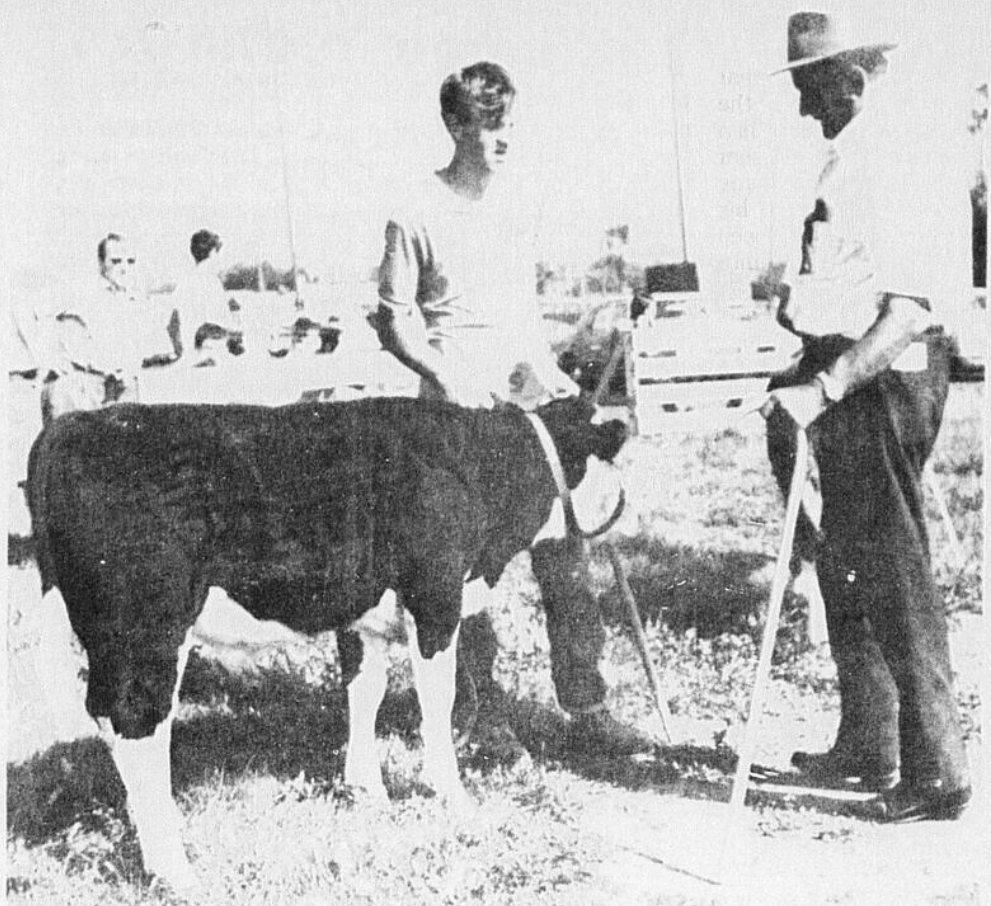

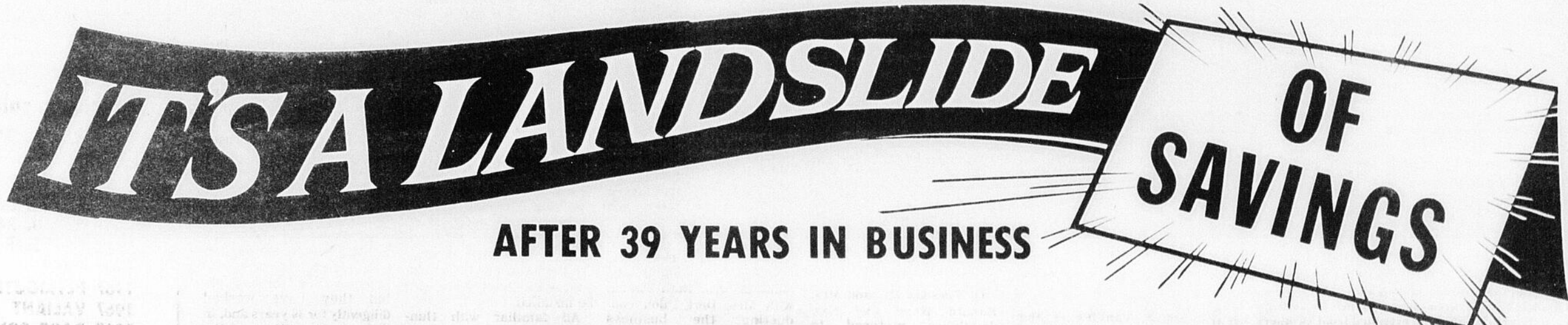

On the Huntingdon side, Mayor Pilon said, the unification has to come about sooner or later, and Dr. Gaw commented that it wasn't too late for unification.

Alderman Georges Lazure of Huntingdon said, "As far as I'm concerned, if Godmanchester doesn't come in with us, I don't think they should keep their trucks in our garage," and he was quickly seconded by others of the Huntingdon council.

Mayor Reid said he wanted to meet with the other members of his council before coming to any decision. Both councils stressed that if the unification didn't come about at this time, the same high degree of co-operation between the municipalities should continue. As a sign of this Huntingdon has already installed a special phone line in the new municipal building to answer fire calls for Godmanchester.





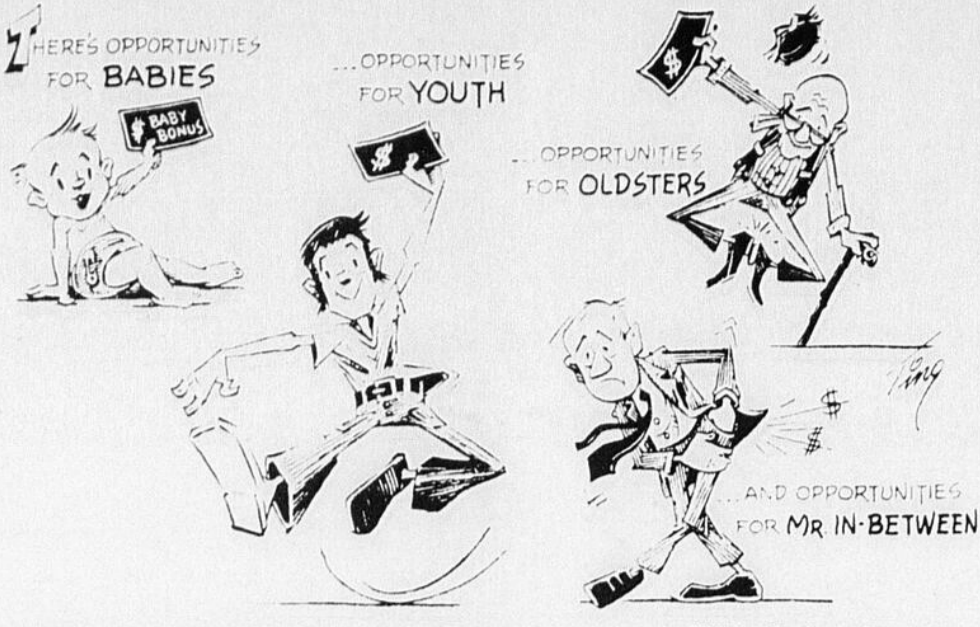

Trout River plaque site

The Chateauguay Valley Historical Society is pleased to announce that a metal plaque has been erected near Trout River Lines to mark the site of the 1870 Fenian invasion of Canada. The plaque was provided by the Historic Monument Commission of the Provincial Ministry of Cultural Affairs, and erected early this summer by the Chateauguay Valley Historical Society at the junction of Route 4 and the Sloan sideroad.

The inscription on the plaque reads as follows:-
Le 27 mai 1870, la milice locale, formée de volontaires, repoussa en ce lieu une bande de Feniens armés des Etats-Unis qui avait franchi la rivière à la Truite dans le dessein de conquérir le Canada.

On May 27th, 1870, at this site on the banks of the Trout River, a force of local Canadian volunteer Militia repulsed an armed invasion by Irish-American Fenians intent on capturing Canada. The Society is very pleased that the event has been so noted and wishes to thank all those who helped to obtain the plaque. The Federation des Sociétés d'Histoire du Québec was of special assistance in this regard.

Two years ago, in the spring of 1970, the Chateauguay Valley Historical Society held a commemorative service to mark the one hundredth anniversary of the repulsion of these Irish American Fenians who hoped to capture Canada as a stepping stone to liberating Ireland from British rule. The local volunteer Militia from Huntingdon, Hemmingford and Beauharnois were responsible for the defense of Canada against some two hundred Fenians who crossed into Canadian territory on May 27, 1870.

The Society hopes that this plaque will help recall the heroism of the local volunteers of one hundred years ago and encourage people to take a greater interest in local history. Requests for further information on the Fenian Raids would be most welcome. Feel free to contact any member.

At the start of the fire bystanders could be seen helping to move hoses, and when small bush fires started in the fields behind the building other bystanders armed with shovels helped firemen put these out. Godmanchester fire chief Bill Martin said the cause of the fire "is still under investigation." When asked if he knew of anything at the front of the building which could have started the fire, manager Adrien Vachon said, "I don't know what could have started it but with fibreglas you never know." Chief Martin said that 1,900 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose and 850 feet of 1 1/2 inch hose were used to combat the blaze. Some 37,000 gallons of water were pumped before the flames were finally squelched. Three engines and two tankers from the three departments were at the scene.

The fire was one of the worst in the area in quite a while. Chief Martin said it was the worst fire his department had handled in terms of damages since the Leblanc fire last November. Huntingdon assistant chief Vince Johnson said it was the worst fire he had fought in over a year and a half.

Recreation Policy Needed

Huntingdon's swimming pool has closed down for the year. It was a short season. The pool liner had to be replaced, and there were problems in getting the job done.

What of the future? The logical answer seems to be that the Town of Huntingdon must take over the operation -- and the financing -- of the project.

Experience to date indicates that the pool cannot pay its own way. Fees from annual memberships, charges for occasional use, and income from lessons cannot meet the operating budget. Besides the cost of routine maintenance and upkeep, there are salaries to be paid for lifeguards and other personnel.

For the major capital expenditure on the liner and to make up the operating deficit, supporters had to go around hat in hand again this year. This task was carried out largely by one public-spirited citizen who prefers to make his own contribution anonymous.

It doesn't make sense to expect the pool to operate on hand-to-mouth basis indefinitely, even if it could. An alternative would be a municipally-owned and operated facility.

Ideally the remainder of the island on which it is situated would be developed as a municipal park. Ormstown is already doing this. Eventually, if the Town is to have an enclosed artificial ice arena, the municipal authorities will have to own and operate this as well. The whole could come under a recreation director who would be a year-round municipal employee and who would be able to foster baseball and other sports activities as well.

All this would of course cost money-tax money. Just how much would have to be established.

One way of getting the idea off the ground would be for the Town council to appoint a committee of three or four leading citizens to study all the facets and make a report. The report would include a recommendation on the pool, on artificial ice, on a municipal recreation commissioner and an overall recreation policy; a breakdown of costs and ideas on what could be obtained in the way of grants; and some sort of a program of priorities for each development.

Then, it would be up to council to take whatever action the members saw fit.

As funds are collected and portions of the duties are paid the present Lord Macdonald donates the equivalent land to the Clan Donald Land Trust, to be held for the benefit of all Clan Donald people in perpetuity. Thirteen thousand acres have already been returned, to the Clan Donald.

The official opening of the Appeal was celebrated at the Ontario Science Center with the world premiere of Austin Campbell's movie "The Massacre of Glencoe" followed by a reception given by Mrs. David Stewart.

Huntingdon: \$100,000 de dommages dans un incendie

Vendredi dernier, les festivités de l'exposition agricole de Huntingdon furent interrompues d'une façon très coûteuse. En effet, un incendie se déclara sur l'heure du dîner à la Boulevard L'Oasis dans la municipalité de Godmanchester. Cette firme est située sur la route no 4, soit à l'arrière de la Cameron Stewart Inc., équipement de ferme.

Le gérant de l'usine, M. Adrien Vachon, de Huntingdon, estima les dommages à plus de \$100,000. Cette compagnie appartient à Robert Mathieu, de la ville de Québec, et elle fabrique des piscines en fibre de verre.

M. Vachon et ses quatre employés allèrent pour leur dîner vers les midi. Mme Georgette Girouard, voisine de cet établissement, vit des flammes sortir de la section avant de l'usine; alors, elle téléphona au gérant, M. Vachon; et ensuite elle fit appel aux pompiers volontaires.

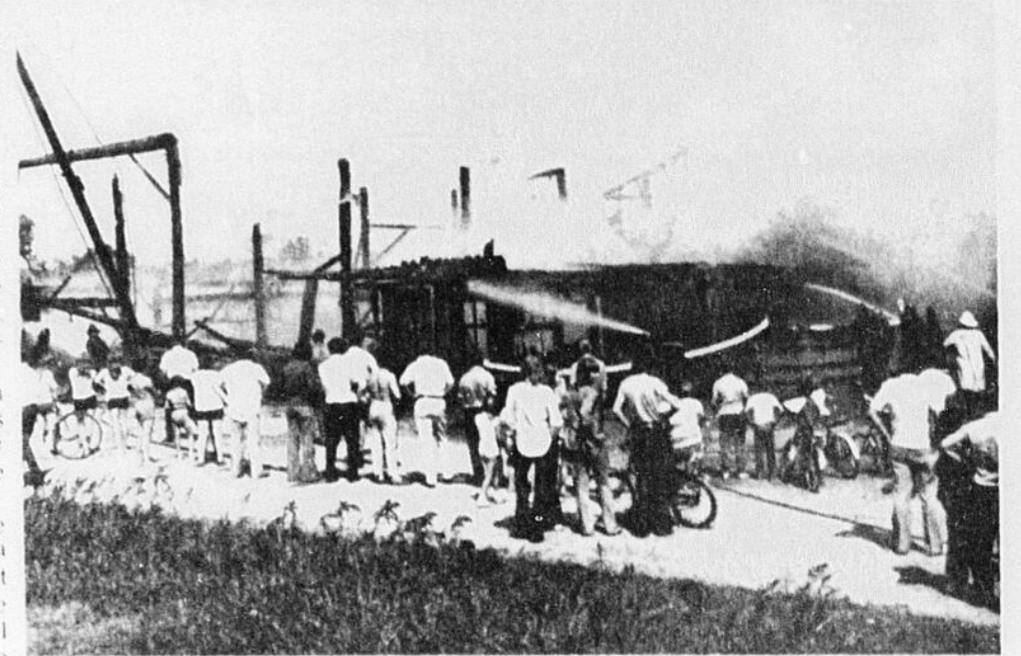
Trois escouades se rendirent sur les lieux: soit quelques 34 sapeurs volontaires vinrent com-

battre les flammes. L'assistant-chef de Huntingdon, Cyril Stewart, déclara avoir reçu l'appel vers les 12:20 heures.

En effet, plusieurs personnes présentes, au moment de l'incendie, sur le terrain de l'exposition, tournèrent les yeux vers le feu; ils pouvaient voir une fumée épaisse s'élever. Quelques sapeurs volontaires de Huntingdon s'occupaient d'un restaurant, et aussitôt qu'ils entendirent le signal ils se précipitèrent vers le lieu de l'incendie.

L'escouade volontaire de Huntingdon arriva la première sur les lieux, et débrancha les lignes de l'Hydro-Québec. Cyril Stewart déclara que l'édifice était presque brûlé, quand que les sapeurs se rendirent sur les lieux. Quelques minutes après, les pompiers volontaires de Godmanchester et de Hinchinbrooke arrivaient sur les lieux.

Pour plusieurs sapeurs de la région, ce fut l'un des pires incendies depuis quelques années.

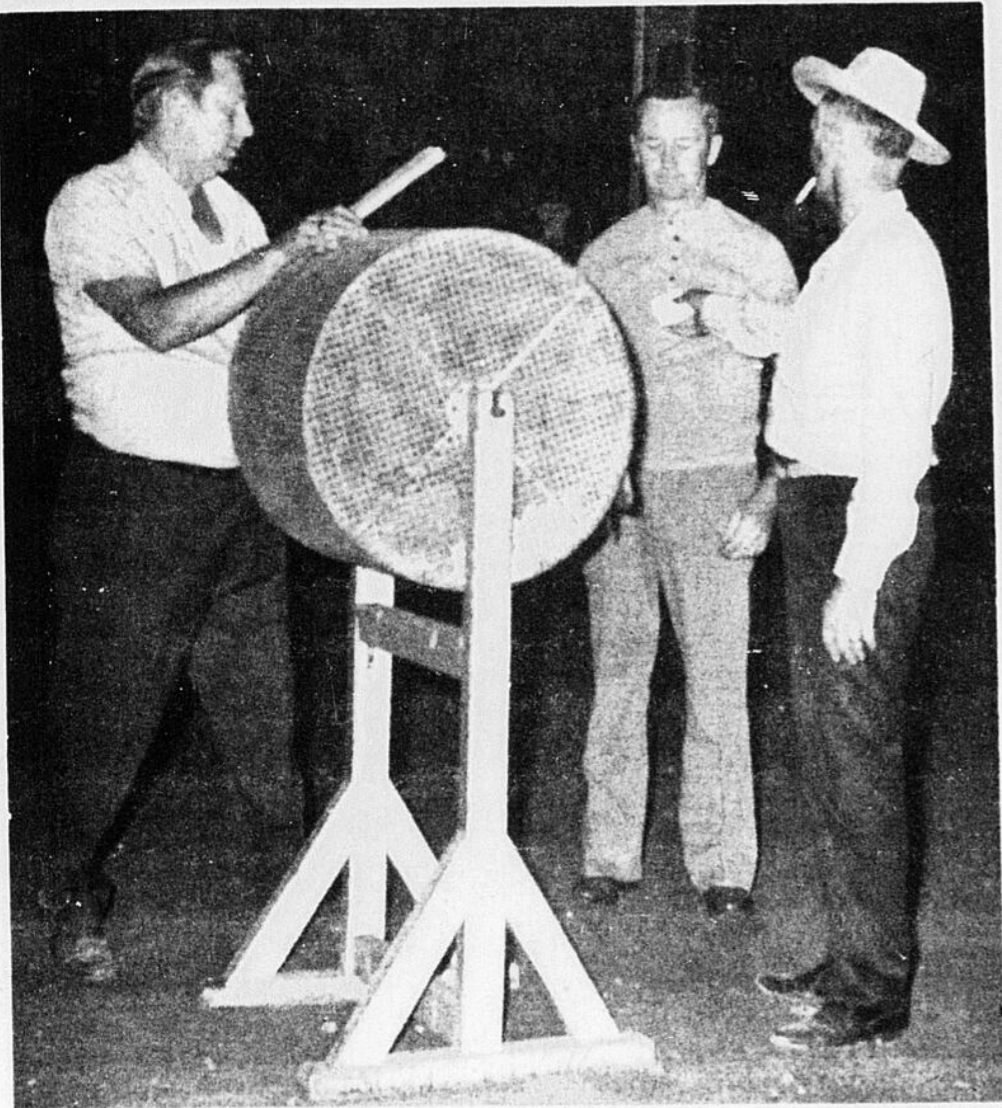
La direction de la nouvelle bibliothèque espère

Québec (le 29 août 1972) Le député libéral du comté de Beauharnois et adjoint parlementaire au ministre de l'Industrie et du Commerce, M. 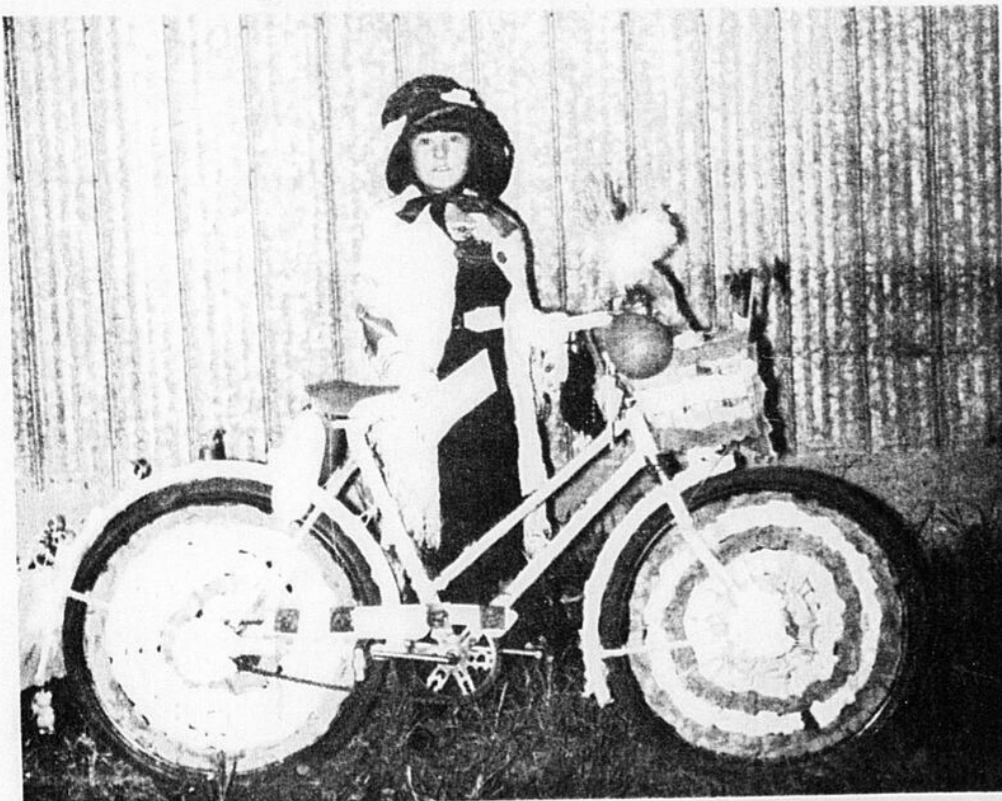
Dwight Arthur remporta la victoire.

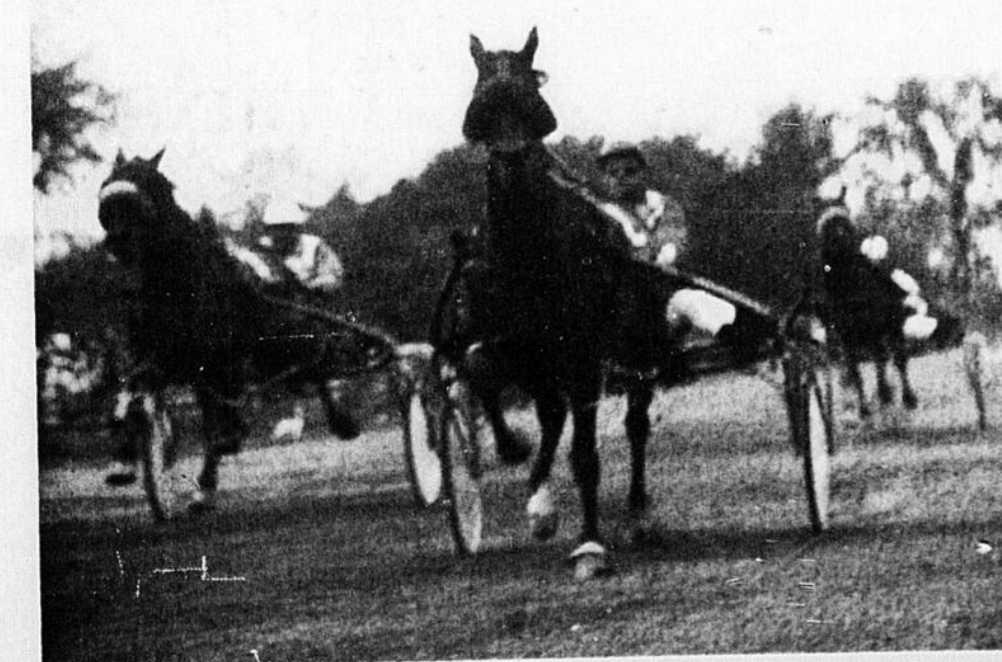
Ensuite, le PeeWee de Huntingdon subissait la défaite par le compte de 3 à 2

Le même arrêté ordonne que le faisan soit enlevé de la liste des oiseaux apparaissant dans l'arrêté en conseil du 10 février 1971, concernant l'interdiction de chasser certains oiseaux.

Enfin, le dernier arrêté en conseil spécifie qu'il y a lieu d'établir une période définie de chasse pour le faisan, étant donné que certaines organisations procèdent à des expériences d'acclimatation du faisan dans le Québec.

Ce nouveau règlement concernant la chasse au faisan a paru récemment dans la Gazette officielle du Québec.

\$1,000 in damages in three accidents

Vermont Rail service

Rail passenger service returns to Vermont and New Hampshire September 29 thanks to the decision of the National Railway Passenger Corporation - Amtrak - to route its New York City - Montreal passenger run through western New England.

The board of directors of Amtrak met in Washington to make the announcement, confirming reports that had begun circulating earlier this week that the New England route had been chosen over a competitive route up the Hudson River Valley in New York State.

New looks to mark 1973's automobiles

Most of the 1973 model automobiles will be going on sale this month. There will be lots of new looks, but only one new car.

The changes will largely be in the way the sheet metal is formed. The new car will be an Oldsmobile Omega. It will be based on the compact Chevrolet Nova.

There will be strong pressure on the manufacturers to hold down prices. The United States government has denied requests by General Motors and Ford to increase price tags. In Canada, the same pressure is on the government to curb inflation with an election coming up.

All cars will have energy-absorbing bumpers able to withstand front-end collisions at five miles an hour and rear-end collisions at 2.5 m.p.h.

The new car, the Oldsmobile Omega, retains the Nova's lines but has a distinctive grill. Oldsmobile says the Omega will be built to Olds' standards.

The Omega will have a 111-inch wheel base and will be offered in three models - a hatchback, in which the back window opens as in a station wagon, a coupe and a sedan.

The car will have a 250-cid. six-cylinder engine as standard equipment with a 350-cid. V-8 offered as an option.

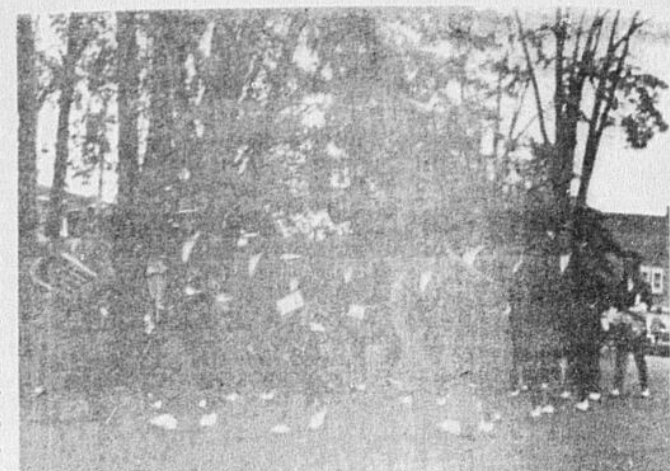
Another new model being offered by General Motors this year, called the Pontiac Grand Am, is apparently a version of Pontiac's intermediate-sized Grand Prix with some features of the

Firebird Trans Am. All of GM's intermediate-sized cars, including the so-called personal luxury models - the Chevrolet Monte Carlo and the Grand Prix - are being extensively restyled this year. Full-size cars will have a face-lifting, with front and rear changes designed to incorporate the new energy-absorbing bumpers.

Backing an industry trend toward fewer models, the Nova will be offered this year in a hatchback model as well as the coupe and sedan.

The full-size Ford and Mercury Meteor are being restyled, with new sheet metal and new front and rear. The sporty Mustang, Cougar and Thunderbird get new grills.

Chrysler, which has already unveiled its new models to the press, is changing the front and rear of its full-sized cars and

extending the use of the electronic ignition system that was introduced last year. Some hardtops and station wagons are being dropped. American Motors cars, also previously introduced, have new grills and tail lamps and minor sheet metal changes. Radial tires will be offered as optional equipment by several manufacturers this year. They will be standard equipment on the higher-priced Mercury Marquis. All manufacturers will also offer improved pollution control equipment.
