3 Aldermen Are Sworn To Office

The number of seats in the Westmount City Council was increased to six Monday when H. G. Seybold was sworn into office.

Also sworn in were A. S. Bruneau and Michael Garber who succeeded former aldermen T. W. Bassett and A. Turner Bone. The latter two resigned recently. Council also announced the appointment of the following commissionerships.

Ald. Bruneau, Light and Power; Ald. Garber, Health and Welfare; Ald. J. C. Cushing, Public Works; Ald. A. Powis Jr., Police and Fire; Ald. G. G. Ryan, Finance; and Ald. H. G. Seybold, Parks and Recreation.

The three new aldermen were elected to their seats by acclamation.

Mr. Bruneau has been a Westmount resident for 23 years, and received his early education at the High School of Montreal. He received an Arts degree from McGill University in 1913, and received his law degree in 1917, the same year he was admitted to the bar. He was in active professional service until retiring in 1950.

Mr. Bruneau was a lecturer in Commercial Law at McGill in 1929, he became a professor in 1933 and was acting dean in 1950.

He saw active service in World War I with the Princess Patricia Canadian Light Infantry, and has served on the board of directors of a number of corporations.

Mr. Garber has been a local resident for 30 years, and graduated with Arts and law degrees from McGill. He was appointed in 1930 by the provincial government as one of seven Jewish School Commissioners to negotiate a contract with the Protestant School Board.

Mr. Seybold, vice president of Drummond McCall & Co Ltd., received his engineering degree from McGill in 1933. He served in the Royal Canadian Navy during World War II, with the rank of Commander, and was awarded the Order of the British Empire.



French Teaching Methods, Progress Topic of Talk

The progressive steps being taken in teaching French in local schools was ably demonstrated at a meeting of the Roslyn Home and School Association Tuesday, by Miss Donald Smith, supervising assistant of French in the Westmount Elementary Schools.

Miss Smith used a tape recorder to let some 300 parents hear for themselves the modern methods used to teach youngsters a new language. The recordings were of songs, questions and answers discussions and short plays.

Two other speakers were also included on the evening's program. They were Mrs. Leona Korol, remedial reading specialist for Roslyn School, and Ralph Start, a grade 6 teacher at the school.

Mrs. Korol spoke on methods of teaching reading, and traced the system from kindergarten through primers and more advanced reading.

The first stage involves Reading readiness, where the teacher finds out whether the child can see well enough to distinguish between two different letters and also whether he can hear well enough to distinguish between two similar words.

She then went on to the "think and do" books, where the actions in the pictures must be described. Finally, there are primers and readers, where the children have learned to read simple sentences and are beginning to learn how to recognize the meaning of words without the aid of pictures. Supplementary reading material is available in all grades, she noted. Periodical achievement tests are given to evaluate the child's development in reading.

Mr. Start gave a brief resume of the methods of teaching spelling. The program consists of

Maj. Gen. J.G. Ross, 94; Gets 2nd Decoration

Maj.-Gen. James George Ross, 94, Canadian Army veteran, received his second decoration within two years on Monday when he was presented with the Canada Armed Forces Decoration (CD) at his home in Westmount.

The presentation was made by Maj.-Gen. J. P. E. Bernatchez, CBE, DSO, general officer commanding, Quebec Command. Two years ago Gen. Ross received the Coronation Medal.

Gen. Ross, who is nursing an arm which he broke in a fall recently, enlisted as a private in 1879. He finally became Paymaster General of the Canadian Overseas forces in World War I.

Educated in Montreal, he was for many years senior member of P. S. Ross and Sons, chartered accountants. He joined the Canadian Artillery originally, rose to the rank of sergeant, was given a commission in Victoria Rifles of Canada in 1884, and retired with the rank of captain seven years later.

In 1898 he rejoined the army, being commissioned in the 5th Royal Scots of Canada, now the Black Watch (R.H.R.). He became adjutant in 1905, received his majority the following year, and was promoted to lieutenant-colonel and to command the unit May 11, 1909.

When World War I broke out, he volunteered for active service and was seconded for special duties as Chief Paymaster, Canadian Expeditionary Forces. Later he was appointed Paymaster-General of Overseas Military Forces of Canada.

He was promoted colonel in 1917, brigadier-general in 1918 and was awarded the CMG (Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George) for his

services. On retirement he was granted honorary rank of major-general.

System To Curb Speed Effective

A "simple down-to-earth method" has been credited with the success of a month-old campaign to cut down speeding along Cote Ste. Antoine road by Westmount Chief of Police, R. A. Byford.

"Instead of hiding and trying to trap the motorists, we let them know we're out looking for them," he said. "Policemen are in full view and this way motorists are warned before they try anything."

Since the crackdown started, speeding violations in Westmount have dropped 17.5 per cent he said.

Dr. A. Lloyd Smith Honored By Dominion-Douglas Body

Dr. A. Lloyd Smith, minister of Dominion Douglas Church for 25 years, was honoured by the congregation Sunday night after evening service. More than 500 members crowded the church hall to pay tribute to Dr. Smith.

Presentations on behalf of the congregation were made to Dr. and Mrs. Smith. A silver tea service was presented by Mrs. Hollis Marden, a bouquet of flowers by Sandy Downes, and a holiday trip to the west coast by Ewart A. Everson, clerk of session.

Stephen Beck presented Dr. Smith with an illuminated address which expressed the gratitude of the congregation for his service to the church with the hope that it would be continued for many more years.

It was pointed out in the address that when Dr. Smith was appointed 25 years ago, it was believed "the whole church would be encouraged and led forward by your spiritual insight. That faith has been justified."

"Your . . . ministry has taught us . . . admiration (for you) as a man, deep affection as a friend, and high esteem as a dedicated servant of Jesus Christ.

"With thankful hearts we ask you . . . and Mrs. Smith . . . to accept this expression of our loyalty and our warm regard and our gratitude."

Last night a photograph of the minister was presented to the congregation by Dudley Townsend on behalf of George Nakash.

Dr. Smith was called to the church in 1931 after serving as minister of Grace Church, Brompton for six years. He is a graduate of the University of Toronto, and won the Governor-

General's Gold Medal in 1913. He gained his B.D. in 1915 and was ordained in that year and married Evelyn Cloke.

His first pastorate was at Elm St. Methodist Church, Toronto. For a time after this he was financial secretary of Victoria College and assistant secretary of the Home Mission Board of the Methodist Church. He received his doctorate for distinguished service to Victoria College.

Besides his regular pastoral work at Dominion Douglas, Dr. Smith is an executive member of the General Council of the United Church, vice-chancellor of the board of governors of United Theological College, president of the Greater Montreal Council of Churches, and co-chairman of the council's mission which will be held in this city in the autumn.

Most Active Year In Unity History Reported By Club

The increasing growth and popularity of Unity Boys Club activities were reflected in the report of club director Maurice Mariasine at the annual meeting Wednesday as Westmount Rotary lunched with the club.

J. G. Lawson New Prexy

J. G. Lawson was elected president of the Unity Boys Club at the annual meeting Wednesday at the club house. The meeting was held in conjunction with the Westmount Rotary Club's regular luncheon meeting.

W. W. Allison is the new v president and other officers include John Squier, honorable secretary and D. T. Youngson, honorable treasurer.

Directors are Mr. Allison, W. F. Close, E. A. Everson, J. E. Frosst, W. F. Kenwood, Mr. Lawson, Ernest Mills, W. G. Moxley, D. B. Ross, W. J. Tawse and Mr. Youngson.

Mr. Moxley, retiring president, was in the chair and paid tribute to the Rotary Club and the Welfare Federation, without whose help, "we would not be able to operate."

He pointed out further that the biggest difficulty in operation of the club was the shortage of staff for junior positions. Stating that the senior positions are taken care of by university courses in physical education, he advocated formation of training schools, with concentrated courses, for junior instructors.

In the financial report, Mr. Youngson said that receipts for the year amounted to \$20,441 and expenditures reached a total of \$20,345, leaving an excess of income of \$90.

Among the guests were R. G. McIsaac, president of Montreal Boys Association. In a brief address, Mr. McIsaac, referred to the co-operation between the two organizations and gave credit to the work of the Unity board of directors.

In "the most active year of our organization's history" Mr. Mariasine said that 377 groups conducted 1,796 sessions with a total participation of 58,268, for a daily average of 211. These figures represented an increase over previous years.

A total of 585 children renewed their memberships and 262 members were enrolled to bring the year's total to 847. Of this number there were 518 boys and 329 girls.

Mr. Mariasine outlined the wide diversification of the club's program. Included were arts, crafts, group clubs and social activities. Approximately 486 members took part in the exclusive sports program on the 35 teams participating in hockey, basketball, baseball, softball, volleyball, gymnastics, track and field and boxing.

The teams succeeded in winning seven trophies in competition. Championships included American "B" Little League Baseball, for the second consecutive year, city of Montreal Biddy Basketball, city and provincial Junior Ladies Basketball, the Unity Boys district table tennis, the Westmount track and field and the Termite and Pee



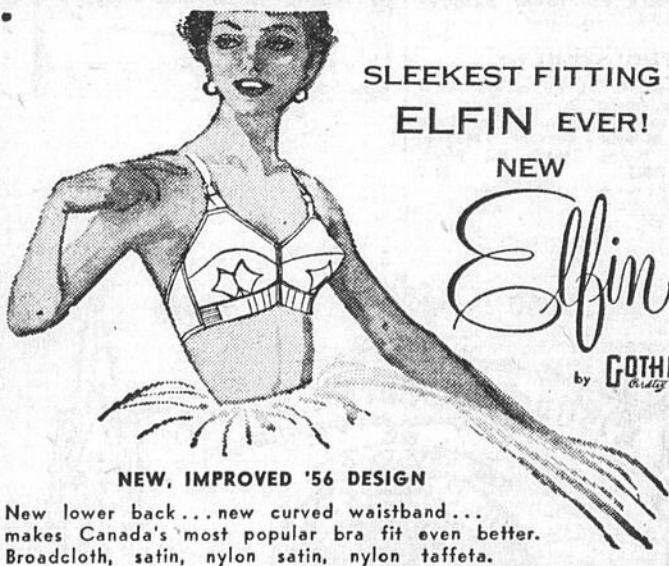

Dorothy Sproule's Book 'The Cloud And The Fire'

"The Cloud and the Fire," the seventh volume of verse from the inspiring pen of Dorothy Sproule, more than maintains the worthy standard we have come to anticipate in her work. The title is both apt and oppor- tune, for never in human his- tory has the world had greater need for the infallible guidance afforded by the daily cloud and the nocturnal pillar of fire. And never has a tortured humanity, stalked by the increasingly bestial ghoul of war and hounded on all sides by the ravaging forces of doubt and irreligion, had more vital necessity for such intrepid singing as that of Dorothy Sproule.

This latest collection of poems, reprinted from dozens of periodicals, anthologies and newspapers, appears in artistic format, and represents the cream of the author's recent literary creation. The book contains some three score poems, widely differentiated as to theme, treatment, and form, but, one and all, vital chords in "A song unmarred by saddened notes," a fugue of faith triumphant, "A finite gleam toward all infinity."

The following brief lyric vividly imagined and charmingly written, is in its delicate simplicity, characteristic of the spirit of abiding grace which permeates the entire volume:

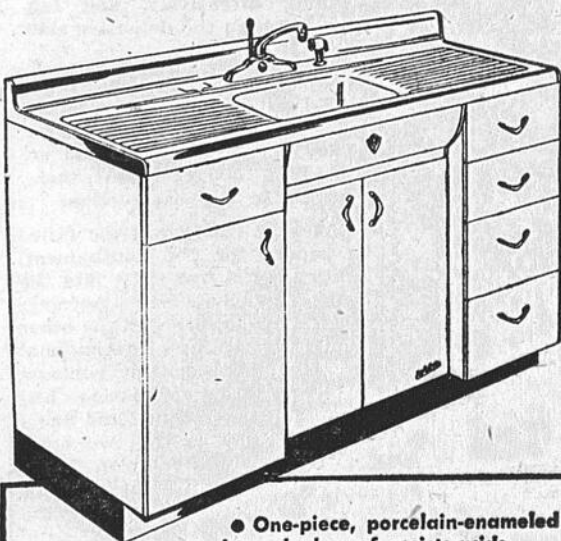

to knot the count.

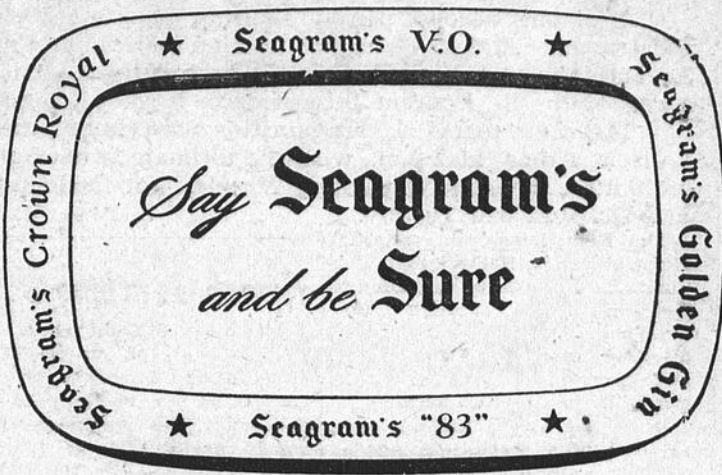
