## Apartment house in Aylmer for independent elderly citizen's

The Aylmer Arms at 166 Main Street, Aylmer (or what some Quebec politicians now like to call Lucerne) are a new concept in retirement living. Rev Don Rutherford of the United Church, who used to minister to the flock at Campbell's Bay, has been working on the concept for many years and last week the doors opened for inspection.

There are about a hundred apartments on six floors. Some have two bedrooms and a living room, some have one bedroom and a living room, and the rest are bachelor apartments with just one bed-sitting room. Each apartment also has a good kitchen and complete bathroom and in every bathroom there is a panic button to push in case you slip in the tub or get into any other difficulty. An attendant will be on duty at the apartment building at all times to answer a call for help.

The rents are very reasonable because the whole venture is non-profit and is essentially financed by the Federal Government. The grounds around the building are at

present in upheaval because construction is still going on but Rev Rutherford has told THE EQUITY that apartments will begin to become available later this summer and more important, that reservations are now being accepted. He would welcome inquiries from Shawville people, and others in the Pontiac.

The Aylmer Arms is not a chronic home for sick people. Far from it. Each unit is self sufficient but the whole establishment is organized with older residents in mind and only retired, or semi retired people will be accepted. A food kitchen in the church, which can be reached by an adjoining areaway, will provide meals for any resident who is not up to, or does not wish to, cook for himself, or herself. It is not likely that vacancies will remain for long at the Aylmer Arms so if anyone is interested they should see Don Rutherford without delay. As a prototype, the Aylmer Arms seem to present an ideal setup to be examined, studied and copied by others in the area.

## Social Sciences Exhibition at Pontiac High School

In Shawville last Wednesday night the parents and friends of students in the Pontiac Protestant High School were treated to a fascinating display of charts, tape recordings, models and other graphic and electronic devices to demonstrate the skills and knowledge of students in the History and Geography classes.

Teachers involved in the exhibition were Department Head Frank Andai, Fred Shaver, Paul Bird, William Smith, John Kennedy, Ruth Schock and librarian Mayfred Dods, as well as art teacher Carol Bretzlaff whose students displayed their work on all available wall space and in the front foyer.

Asked to judge the History and Geography displays were David Conrod, Margaret Campbell, Carol Bretzlaff and Rosaleen Dickson. Junior Department winners were Greg MacIntosh with his project on Weather and Stephen Laycock with his erupting volcano demonstration. Second prizes went to Diana Andai's model and taped explanation of a river system and to a musical instrument display by Helen Soucy, Diane Armitage, Carol Ann Foley and Gwen Smiley. Third prizes went to Robbie Steeves for a project on Ottawa River travel and to the Women's Vote exhibit by Connie Maheral, Sharon Lang, Carol MacLachlan and Wendy Hodgins.

In the Senior Department Amber Davis, Susan Garrison, Heather Smiley and Lynn Wentworth won the only Multimedia Category prize for an extensive display of books, essays, posters and taped interviews about the Communist leaders of the world entitled "Workers of the World".

In the category called Dimensional, meaning graphic and not electronic, the winners were Rayma Hayes and Ann Hobbs, with a large portfolio of examples of Canadian Art. Second prize went to Diane Krose whose project told of the early schools at Thorne won first place in Montreal later in the week in competition with 400 entries from 120 schools. Diane's project will be explained by her and some of those from who she obtained source material on the Pontiac Now TV show next week.

Tied for third place in this Senior Dimensional category were the furs from wild animals trapped and prepared by Carl Elliott and Royal Soucy, and the model of an early Canadian seignury by Cheryl Sylvestre.

A number of research papers were also displayed for a total of over 300 exhibits.

## Open House at McDowell Elementary School

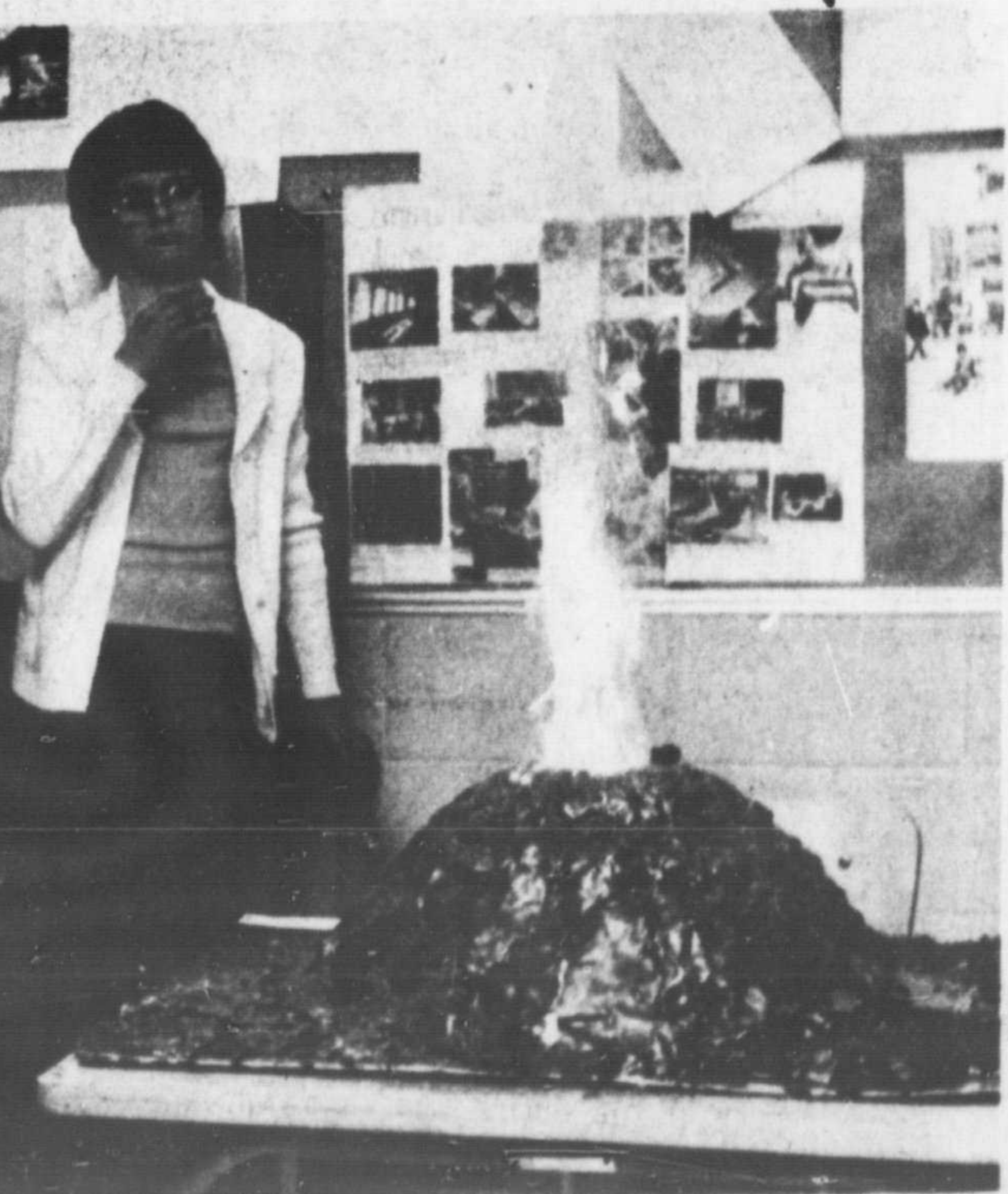

On Monday evening, April 7th, Open House was held at Dr S.E. McDowell Elementary School. Following their visits to the classrooms parents had been invited to attend a meeting in the auditorium concerning the building of an "Adventure Playground" at the school.

The meeting was called to order by Mr W Tipping. The members of the School Committee were introduced by Mrs Gwen Wentworth, chairman, and she outlined their activities during this year. Mr Tipping then introduced our guest speaker Mr Al McDonald of Bedford, Quebec, who is the Educational Development Officer for the Language Arts for our district. Mr McDonald has had much experience with this type of playground and ably entertained and informed the audience with an illustrated talk. He explained that an Adventure playground is one with equipment assembled from readily available materials such

as tires, poles, etc. which lend themselves to creative and imaginative activities. He stressed the close relationship between a child's mental and emotional development and his or her body co-ordination. Pictures of different pieces of equipment were shown and helpful ideas for their assembly given. A short question period followed after which Mr Tipping thanked our speaker.

## Mine test results under study

A press release received this week from Mr Fred Metcalfe informs us that Trade Qualification Examinations for Hilton Mine employees, which were held in November, 1974 and January 1975, were an instrument to evaluate an individual's knowledge in his trade.

The number of failures in one trade were in no way a reflection on the individual's ability to his trade, more or less, failure was due to the fact that:

- a) The Questions were not understood and/or
- b) The type of equipment used in the examinations was different than what the individual was accustomed to, states Mr Metcalfe.

The Hilton Mine manpower committee in conjunction with Regional Quebec manpower are in the process of assessing the results of those individuals who failed. Committee members are Fred Metcalfe, Bob Hortie, Lee Hodgins, Terrence Mulligan, Wm Black, Roger Sylvestre and Jean Gignac.

On completion of this study Canada Manpower and Quebec Manpower will be able to determine what courses will be necessary to assist the individuals in their preparation for a rewrite of the examination. Mr Metcalfe hopes that if at all possible such courses will be held at a location in Pontiac suitable to the employees.

In view of the fact that the closing of Hilton Mines is approximately one year away Mr Metcalfe feels it is fortunate that the studies conducted so far are before the fact and not after the fact. The Management of Hilton Mines, Local 5656 of United Steel Workers of America, Federal and Quebec Manpower have been working together to the advantage of the employees, says Mr Metcalfe, and he feels that even though individuals concerned may consider that little or nothing is being done on their behalf, one cannot fault this thinking because the employees are concerned with their future. Such studies are time consuming and constitute only a portion of the work load of Manpower. Results cannot be attained overnight, he states. When the studies have been completed, which according to Mr Metcalfe, will be shortly, the decisions pertaining thereto will be published.

## Fatal fire in Quyon

Emmanuel Moore, 62, of Quyon, was pronounced dead on arrival at the Pontiac Community Hospital in Shawville. His body was found at the bottom of the cellar stairs in his home when firemen arrived there to put out a blaze which had been reported by neighbours at about 4:30 p.m. on Sunday afternoon.

A half hour before the fire, Mr Moore was talking to a neighbour, Mrs Jim Daley, on the telephone and suddenly said he must hang up because he smelled smoke.

When the firemen found Mr Moore they rushed him to the hospital on a cot in the back of Laurie MacKechnie's station wagon.

Mr Moore's home was on First Street off the Station Road. Damage is mostly confined to the effects of smoke and water. The fire is thought to have originated in an upstairs closet.

Dear Mrs Dickson,

Last Monday evening Dr S.E. McDowell School held their spring open house. The Parents Committee presented Mr McDonald, Reading Consultant, to speak to us on playground materials. He explained to us how many energetic and interested parents, teachers and kids can transpose old tires, big rocks, fill from construction sites and left over paint into a "utopia" for kids.

For the first few minutes the thoughts going through my mind could be described by, mess, clutter, untidiness, broken bones, torn knees, and missing teeth! However as Mr McDonald continued and shared his experiences with us my thoughts changed. These I would like to share with you and your readers.

Our children saying they have nothing to do can be put in the past. We can begin to save the part cans of paint from our spring painting, our worn out car ties, scraps of wood, pieces of rope or cable, perhaps our local telephone or hydro offices will supply us with large poles. Then on the designated day we can go out in full force.

We'll put posts in the ground and assemble swings, slides and monkey bars from a given number of tires and cable or rope. We'll use the boards to make a style for the children to climb on, we'll put tires together to form a tunnel to crawl through. We'll take the construction site fill, make a big hill and plant grass on it, a big rock and they'll all be "kings of the castle". We'll bank up a serviceable rink next fall for winter skating on the ball field.

We'll ask the older kids to help, some from the highschool too. Kids don't destroy what they help build and they won't let it come to harm by the hand of someone else.

When we are finished we will look back on the wonderful fellowship of the day, gained between teachers, parents and kids. Our kids will be able to be themselves. Instead of the playground supervisor having to say "don't" and referee fights, they can say "have fun kids, its all yours".

I haven't forgotten the cut lip, torn pants or perhaps even the broken arm. We'll kiss the lip, patch the pants, and about the arm! "Better to have climbed a tree and broken an arm than not to have climbed a tree at all."

As parents and teachers, when we are asked to save, help and be proud, let's all get out and pitch, they are our children and happy busy children are good children and we love them all.

**In the Beginning**

**The Pit**

To many people Hilton Mines is the great pyramid of rejects over 200 feet high which can be seen from many points along Highway 148 or from the top of Ghost Hill near Breckenridge or from Champlain Lookout in Gatineau Park.

To others Hilton Mines is the giant crusher that cracks 5 ton hunks of rock like peanuts, reducing them to workable size. Many want to see the mill where everything is further ground to powder, subjected to great heat and chemical treatment and finally pelletized ready to go out by rail.

But to me, Hilton Mines is the pit. Certainly that is where it all begins. So when Charles Dickson and I visited the mine recently, he with his camera and I with my note book it was the pit we went to see.

We were met at the gate by Albert Bertrand, pit foreman on duty and taken in his truck, first to the lookout spot where we could get a bird's-eye view of that awesome looking hole. Then we drove around to the entrance and down, down those circular, winding turns to the 700 foot level at the very bottom.

The pit, an irregular shaped hole embracing 50 acres or more at the top, its very difficult to say, narrows in, of course, with every level to allow for roadways and to prevent slides.

Understandably, no one is permitted anywhere near the pit during the twice-a-week blasting operation. Only one man is in there at that time, when from the safety of the 6 inch thick jaws of a ponderous shovel he triggers the blast. Some 50 holes, 7 inches in diameter and about 35 feet deep, drilled in a 20 foot pattern, each one loaded with 450 pounds of explosives, receive the spark simultaneously and respond with an ear splitting roar. The result of the blast leaves enough ore to keep the shovels, the trucks and the crusher going for several days.

On the day of our visit there was no blasting but a body of some 400,000 tons from the previous blasting was being loaded on the big Euclid trucks by a shovel with a strength and capacity that defies description. Each truck carries about 45 tons and it takes only a few minutes to load it, then it winds its way labouriously up the winding road out of the pit and on to the crusher. A pencil and an agile mind could soon figure out just how many truckloads were in that body of freshly blasted rock.

At the present level the ore has a recovery ratio of approximately 30 per cent, although some individual sample are much higher.

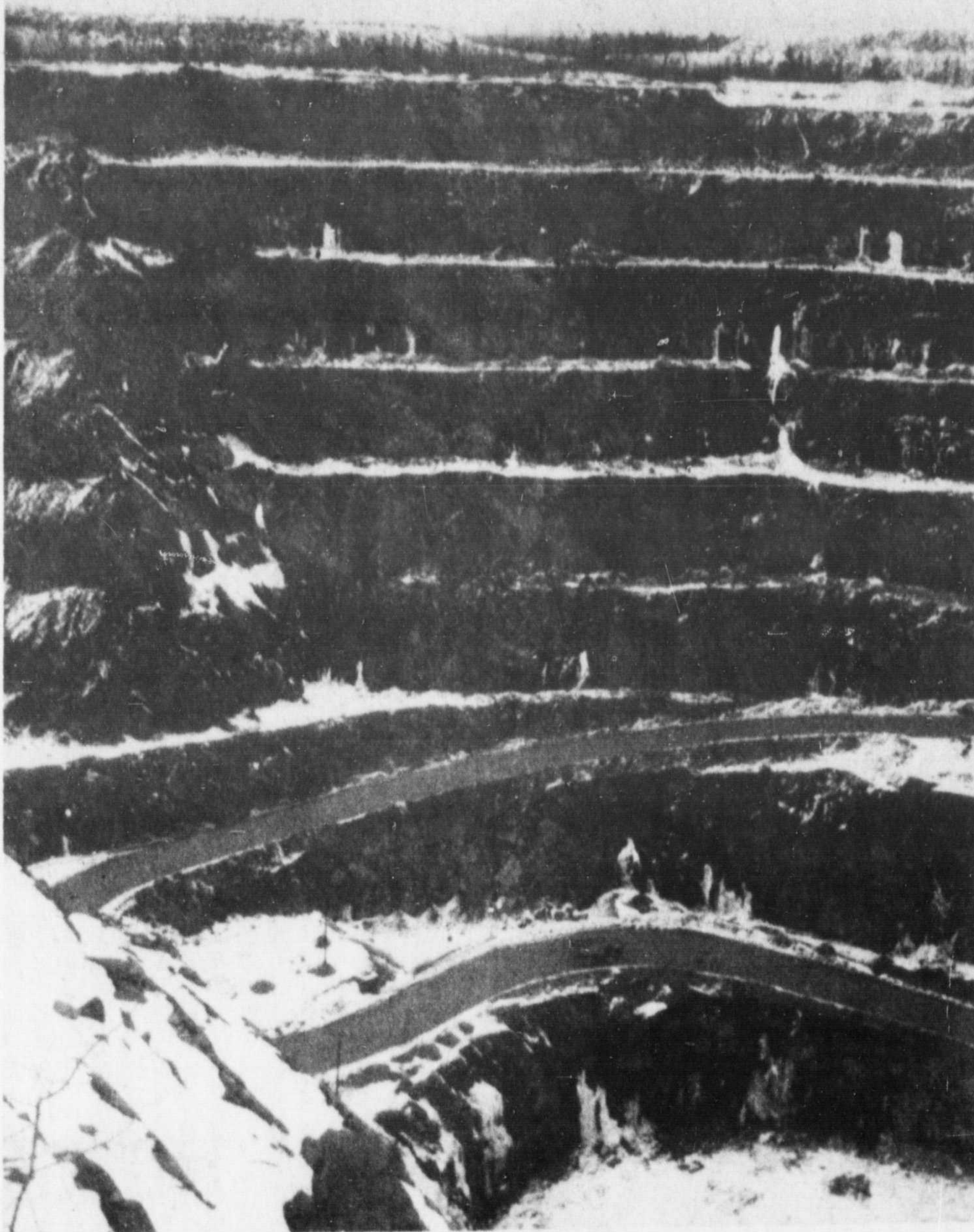
Over the years large fields of waste have accumulated, covering hundreds of acres ranging in depth from 80 to 150 feet. In conformity with environmental requirements much of this area has been planted to trees, sweet clover and other forms of vegetation. With a small amount of earth and fertilizer added the results are astonishing. In the summer months the former rocky waste area presents a vista of rich green as far as the eye can see. In fact cattle will be seen pasturing on much of it in a few weeks. This vegetation, from year to year, with falling leaves and decaying stems will provide its own humus, thus perpetuating the cycle.

We were greatly indebted to foreman Albert Bertrand for showing us around and explaining pit operation as well as giving us a chance to view the program of restoring vast waste areas into what will eventually become a high plateau of trees and green grass.

Some say that production at Hilton Mines will come to a halt in a year or two. Maybe so, but if and when it does finally run out the people of Pontiac will have reason to pause and reflect on the effect that the mine has had on the economy over the past 20 years.

First the building of the railway from Wyman to the mine in 1956 (the second such railway to be built there in the course of history). The moving of a village, the building of the plant and all that goes with it. Then the employment of some 350 persons for a score of years.

The output of some 900 thousand tons of pellets a year shipped to different places in Canada and the United States has contributed mightily to the economy of this county. And it all started in the pit.



**Grist and miscellaneous items**

A while back we noted, and published the fact, that the CSSSO was thinking about closing down the Brookdale Farm at Farm Point. Now they are having second thoughts. Good. Another item they have been talking about is fluoridation of waters in the area. We hope they can have second thoughts about this too, and drop the whole notion.

The Quyon show on New Faces (CJOH Channel 13) will be aired at 7 o'clock on the evening of next Thursday, April 24th, not the 23rd as we were first told. So everyone who wants to see their Quyon friends and neighbours on TV should tune in on Thursday.

A meeting in the Fort Coulonge parish hall on Wednesday, April 23rd at 8 p.m. should be of interest to everyone in Pontiac. We'll be surprised if half a dozen people turn out, most of them coming from Hull to talk among themselves about how nobody in Pontiac ever comes out to meetings. But we could be wrong. The meeting is supposed to be a congregation of socio-economic organizations (service clubs, church groups etc ...) of the region, to form boards of directors for the various establishments for health and social services in Pontiac County. That's what the notice we got says, in French of course.

The Pontiac Agricultural Society Division A is going to have a dance and midnight smorgasbord May 10th. Phil Thompson, Dalton Hodgins and Bob Younge are on the organizing committee. Contact the secretary-treasurer Everett McDowell for tickets.

**Subsidy payment on potatoes**

The Federal Department of Agriculture will pay a subsidy of \$1.67 per 100 pounds for Canada No 1 potatoes sold on or after April 1, 1975 and up to the end of the season.

Potatoes must be inspected and a request for inspection must be made 24 hours before shipped.

#### SPECIAL HOUSING ASSISTANCE MEASURE FOR VETERANS:

Some low or modest income veterans now have needs in the area of housing. In relation to the provisions of the National Housing Act, the following program has been designed to assist veterans in respect to those needs:

#### THE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS WILL NOW:

Provide a capital grant of 10% (in addition to the benefits provided by the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation) to non-profit organizations such as the Legion, to assist in the building of low-rental projects for the housing of veterans.

Provide a cash subsidy of \$600 annually to veterans as defines in the Veterans Land Act. The cash will be made available to those who obtain loans from Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation or from approved lenders for the construction or purchase of new houses and who meet the income and child dependency criteria of the Assisted Home Ownership Program (AHOP).

Provide an annual interest reduction of up to \$600 to veterans who obtain N.H.A. loans from approved lenders for the purchase of existing homes and who:

-would be eligible under the AHOP plan except for the child dependency or new house requirement; and

-have not owned a home in the preceding three years.

These new measures will be administered by the CMHC with support from the Department of Veterans Affairs. The additional funding required for subsidy purposes will be disbursed by CMHC from resources provided by Veterans Affairs.

Not all of the administrative and financial requirements have yet been completed. However, it is hoped that all necessary arrangements will be completed soon in order that action to implement the measures may be initiated at the earliest possible date.

### Local History Lore

James Prendergast of Clarendon- continued

In October 1828, James travelled to Quebec and on the 13th, he wrote a letter to Sir James Kempt, Administrator of the Government of Lower Canada, asking to be paid the outstanding expenses of the survey of Clarendon because "in consequence of orders issued from the Executive Council's office the 18th December last the settling of land has been put a stop to and your Petitioner thereby deprived of the only means of reimbursing himself the expenses of the said Survey". He appended his account showing a net balance of 227 pounds, 19 shillings, 4 pence after deducting the 94 pounds, 18 shillings, 8 pence paid to him by the 64 settlers of Clarendon.

He was in a difficult situation. He had contracted to settle the Township at his own expense, collecting the cost of the Survey from the settlers and getting his 5% commission in land, not cash. Then, when he had spent his money, some of which he had to borrow, notable from Capt Radford of Clarendon, the Government pulled the rug from under him by terminating the granting of free land.

James was told that there were no funds available to pay him but that he could have in land, in Clarendon, one half the amount outstanding on his Survey expense account. He was instructed to choose the vacant lots he wanted and patents would issue. Before leaving Quebec to work out this new situation, on Oct 15, 1828, he requested that patents issue for 30 settlers who had completed their settlers' duties. He also requested that they be granted the other half of each lot, making a total of 200 acres per settler. On Nov. 12th, the Council agreed to this.

While there they visited the RCMP Barracks guided by Constable Brian Sparrow. They were greatly impressed by the Queen's horse, "Centennial" and "Harp", Brian's horse which he rides in the "Musical Ride".

After a short visit to the Museum of Science and Technology they went to the Ice Capades.

Then on April 2 Brian visited the school and spent the day showing the film made for the T.V. program, "The Nature of Things", called, "Friends of Man". The film showed the difficult maneuvers of the Mounties and their horses.

The children will long remember Brian for his kindness to them. Now they will be able to continue the projects they started before their trip.
