A HOTEL HOLOCAUST.

Six Lives Lost in a Fire at Gloversville, N. Y.

Gloversville, N. Y., February 2.—One of the old landmarks of Gloversville, the Alford House, the largest hotel in Fulton County, was destroyed by fire yesterday. The fire started about 10 o'clock, and an hour later the hotel was a mass of ruins.

SCORCHED AND DRY.

Australia Suffering From Another Excessive Heated Spell.

Vancouver, February 2.—Advices from Australia by S.S. Warrimoo are to the effect that the colonies are again suffering from intense heat and drought. In many places the thermometer registered a hundred and twenty-four degrees in the shade, and the lowest registration was a hundred and ten degrees in the shade. Fires from spontaneous combustion were very numerous and bush fires did terrible damage.

AN ART TREASURE.

Quebec, February 2.—Another very beautiful work of art has been added to the collection of the artist, the artist of La Bonne Ste. Anne de Beaupre. The old wooden communion railings have been replaced by a new set of railings, beautifully carved marble, the work of an eminent Belgian sculptor. Colored marbles form the steps of the railings and the artist has placed the railings on the highest level in relief and open work sculpture out of solid white marble and represents a number of sacred scenes, such as the Agony in the Garden, the Descent from the Cross, the preparation for the sacrifice of Isaac, the institution of the Holy Eucharist, the miracle of turning the water into wine, etc. The Redeemer, the Fathers in charge of the church paid \$2,800 in duties alone upon the work.

VICTIMS OF THE COLD.

St. Hyacinthe, February 2.—At the parish church, last Sunday, the officiating priest stated that the cold spell which was being experienced was very trying to the poorer portion of the population. He stated that many of the poor were in a destitute condition, and unless something was done to relieve them at once, the consequences would be appalling. He urged the parishioners to help in any way they could, and stated that he would very gratefully receive the names of those who helped in any way.

ST. HYACINTHE ELECTION.

St. Hyacinthe, February 2.—The municipal election, last Sunday, was a hotly contested and resulted in the election to the City Council of Mr. Joseph Ledoux, who is wanted in Montreal for the purpose of his arrest. The members of the Tribunal were very surprised by his election. Mr. Denis himself did not take any part in the election, being confined to his house by illness. For some reason or other, Mr. Ledoux received the bulk of the labor vote and was elected by a large majority.

THE MOROCCO CONFLICT.

London, February 2.—Additional advices from Tangier confirm the first reports of the fighting between the British steamer Tourmaline and the Moroccan steamer Hassan, on the coast of Morocco. It appears that 5000 Moroccan troops were seen in conjunction with the Hassan to prevent the Tourmaline landing her cargo. Several Moros were killed by the Tourmaline's guns, and the Hassan was reported to have been damaged.

SUDDEN DEATH AT ST. BAR-NABE.

St. Hyacinthe, February 2.—On Saturday last, Heloise Girouard, wife of Alexis Chapdelaine, of St. Barnebe, suddenly expired at her home. She was 44 years of age and very corpulent. Coroner Blanchard held an inquest on the 30th ult., and the verdict rendered was that she died from a stroke of apoplexy. Mrs. Chapdelaine had enjoyed splendid health until the day of her death.

AN OLD MILL BURNT.

Sherbrooke, February 2.—The old woolen mills at Ways Mills, was totally destroyed by fire Monday. Soon after starting the fire in the morning, flames were seen burning through the roof. 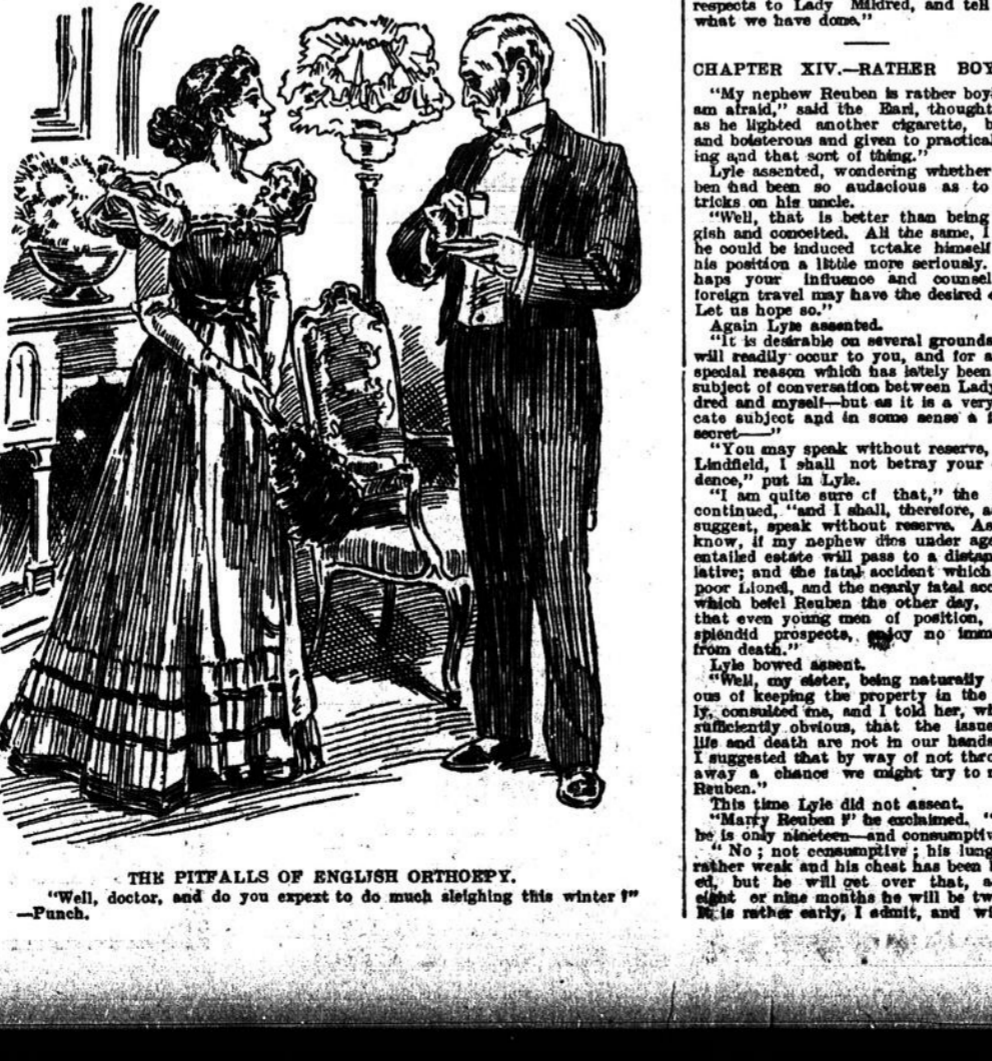
