CONTRADICTION REPORTS AS TO RESULT OF AERIAL RAIDS

Attackers Claim Destruction of Military Transport and Equipment, While Defenders Report Slight Casualties to Civilians and Damage to Property. Another Raid is Anticipated. Ten Battleships Shell Turkish Camp at Enos in Aegean Sea. Greece Making Overtures to Relinquish Neutrality.

London, April 17.—(Special)—The Allies on one side and Germany on the other are to-day taking inventories of the injuries inflicted by the recent aerial operations, and with the usual contradictory results. The attackers claim that their assaults from the air have resulted in the destruction of military transport and equipment, while the defenders report that the only tangible effects of these operations have been casualties to civilians and slight damage to property.

The people of England, under the influence of their recent experiences, are to-day looking for a repetition of an aerial attack from German Zeppelins or Taubes. Up to noon no such fresh occurrence had been reported.

BATTLESHIPS SHELL TURKISH CAMP AT ENOS.

Mytilene, April 17.—(Special)—It is reported from Imbros that ten battleships approached Enos, two of which entered the bay and shelled and destroyed the Turkish camp there. The long-talked-of occupations of Mytilene and Scios are stated to be imminent.

Enos is a Turkish port at the mouth of the Mæretza River, east of the Gulf of Saros in the Aegean Sea. Mytilene and Scios are Turkish islands of the Grecian Archipelago.

FRENCH BOMBARD-FORTIFIED TOWN IN EGYPT.

Paris, April 17.—(Special)—The Ministry of Marine to-day gave out an official communication reading as follows:—

"During the day of April 16 a French cruiser, supporting a reconnaissance made by aeroplanes, effectively bombarded the fortifications of El Arish, a fortified town in Egypt near the boundary of Egypt and Palestine, as well as certain detachments of Turkish troops who had concentrated near El Arish."

GREEK MAKING OVERTURES TO RELINQUISH NEUTRALITY.

London, April 17.—(Special)—The Daily News' Athens correspondent telegraphs:

"Prince George of Greece returns to Paris to-morrow. His journey is thought to have a bearing on the political situation. The journal Hestia indicates that the Government is making overtures to relinquish neutrality. These overtures are understood to be well advanced."

BELIEF IS AUSTRIA WILL MAKE SUDDEN ATTACK ON ITALY.

Paris, April 17.—(Special)—The belief is becoming general in Rome that Austria will make a sudden attack upon Italy as soon as she becomes convinced that the latter country has determined to intervene in the war, according to a despatch to the Matin from its correspondent in the Italian capital. This prospect is said to be causing no alarm, however, because of the concentration of large forces of Italian troops on the Austrian frontier.

GRAND DUKE'S STRATEGY IS TO REACH BERLIN BY WAY OF VIENNA

Petrograd, April 17.—Military experts of the Russian press are divided in opinion regarding the true meaning of the present operations. The official military organ, Russky Invalid, for over a month has been presenting its readers with the idea that as the German operations develop and when Hungary has been invaded, the Russians will drive forward in irresistible force upon the direct road to Berlin from Warsaw. The Novoye Vremya expert doubts this idea resolutely, and points out that the Grand Duke's strategy has had one consistent aim from the outset of the war, namely, to reach Berlin by way of Vienna.

The expert shows that the combined enemy forces are now arrayed from the Baltic to the frontiers of Rumania, and are not under 2,500,000 men. Moreover, the disposition of forces has changed during the last couple of months. Some Austrians were with the Germans in the Niemen and Vistula raid. Between the Lower Vistula and the Duna, a tributary of the Upper Vistula, the Austrians are now in the majority and the Germans mainly represented by a disproportionately large artillery force, are concentrated especially on the northern sections of this front, chiefly on the Bzura, and generally against Warsaw.

GERMAN WAR PLANS UPSET

The Grand Duke's strategy aims at the occupation of the rich plains of Hungary, with the double object of waging the war at the enemy's expense, and assisting to starve Germany, who has been deriving large supplies from Hungary, instead of striking at the German frontiers which have been rendered as impen-

ITALY WILL BE WITH ALLIES

Austria Has Made Offers Which Cannot Be Accepted

INTERVENTION OF ITALY IN THE WAR IS THE GREATEST PRE-OCCUPATION OF GER-

MANY TO-DAY.
London, April 17.—(Special)—The Daily Telegraph publishes a despatch from Dr. E. J. Dillon, its special correspondent at Rome, regarding the probable outcome of the negotiations between Italy and Austria-Hungary. The latter, he says, has made certain conditional offers, but these are accompanied by important reservations.

Meanwhile the financial and economic strain of the situation created in Italy by her military preparations is very severe, and Dr. Willon maintains the belief he has held from the outset, that within a short time Italy will intervene in the war on the side of the Allies.

GERMANY CONCERNED OVER ITALY'S ATTITUDE.

London, April 17.—(Special)—The correspondent of the Morning Post at Rome says: "A special correspondent of the Stampau, summing up opinions after an extensive tour through Germany, states that the intervention of Italy is the greatest preoccupation of Germany to-day."

GERMAN SHELLS FELL ON SWISS TERRITORY

Delemont, Switzerland, April 17.—(Special)—German shells fell on Swiss territory Tuesday for the third time since the outbreak of the war, says the newspaper Democrite.

The Germans were trying to destroy a French observation post at Epfetter-Hausen, but the gunners' aim was bad and the projectiles overshot their target, dropping around the town of Bournevesin.

An investigation was made the following day by Swiss authorities, who took fragments of the shells to Porrentruy for examination by an expert.

NORWEGIAN SHIPS TO SAIL UNDER BRITISH CONTROL

Copenhagen, April 17.—(Special)—The Berliner Tageblatt states that an agreement has been reached between Norway and Britain whereby Norwegian ships will sail practically under British control, in order to save time going to Kirkwall and other British harbors.

SEVEN KILLED BY AVIATORS OF ENEMY AT AMIENS

Amiens, France, April 17.—(Special)—Seven persons were killed and eight were wounded by bombs dropped by two German aeroplanes which flew over the city yesterday, one in the morning and one in the evening. The cathedral apparently was the target for missiles, but it was not damaged.

ALASKA DOG TEAM RACE

CONTEST IN 42-MILE RACE IS ONE OF ENDURANCE BETWEEN TWO LEADING TEAMS.

Nome, Alaska, April 17.—(Special)—With the leaders less than a hundred miles from the finish line at Nome, the 42-mile All-Alaska Sweepstake dog team race has developed into a contest of skill between Leonard Seppala and A. A. (Scotty) Allan, and of endurance between Seppala's sixteen Siberian wolves and the Allan-Darling team of sixteen malamutes.

LARGER WHEAT CROP.

London, April 17.—(Through Reuters' Ottawa Agency)—A special despatch from Simla, India, says that the Government forecast of the wheat harvest in the months of April and May is 10,250,000 tons compared with 8,750,000 tons last year. Some authorities consider the harvest has been underestimated. It is hoped two millions will be available for export under Government control. Whereas crops are coming into the markets, prices are showing a distinct tendency to fall.

U. S. AWAITING INFORMATION

Officials Place No Credence in Report That Japan Had Naval Base at Turtle Bay

PRESENCE OF JAPANESE WARSHIPS DUE TO EFFORT TO REFLOAT CRUISER ASAMA.

Washington, April 17.—(Special)—The United States Government to-day awaited official advice as to whether or not Japan had established a naval base at Turtle Bay, Lower California, as has been reported. Although officials are not inclined to place any credence in the reports, they have sought to ascertain through American consuls for what use the Japanese and British vessels were making of Mexican territory waters.

Officials are certain that there is no foundation for the reports because of the fact that their colleagues were assisting the Japanese warships. Unofficial advice said that the presence of Japanese warships in Turtle Bay was due to the fact that they were engaged in attempts to refloat the cruiser Asama, recently grounded there.

CALL ON NEUTRALS TO END WAR

Central Federated Unions Send Resolution to President Wilson to Call Conference

SUGGESTED THAT NEUTRAL NATIONS STOP SUPPLYING BELLIGERENTS WITH WAR MATERIAL.

New York, April 17.—(Special)—Resolutions urging President Wilson to call an international congress of neutral nations with a view to ending the war, adopted last night by the Central Federated Unions here, were forwarded to Washington to-day.

The resolutions suggested that the war might be stopped by neutral nations if they placed an embargo on the shipment of munitions of war and foodstuffs to the belligerents.

THAW ORDERED BACK TO ASYLUM

New York Supreme Court Denies Motion Made For His Return to New Hampshire

ORIGINAL ORDER COMMITTING HIM TO MATTEWAN HELD TO BE STILL VALID.

New York, April 17.—Harry Kendall Thaw was yesterday ordered back to the State Hospital for the Criminal Insane at Matteawan by the Appellate Division of New York Supreme Court. In an opinion concurred in by all the justices, the court affirmed the denial by Supreme Court Justice Page of a motion to return Thaw to the jurisdiction of the State of New Hampshire, whence he was extradited to stand trial for conspiring to escape from the asylum, and ruled that the original order committing him to the institution was still valid. Five days must elapse before the order becomes effective. Plans are now being formulated to take the case to the State Court of Appeals.

BRITISH OFFICERS IMPRISONED

STORY OF REPRISALS CONFIRMED BY U. S. AMBASSADOR AT BERLIN.

London, April 17.—The Foreign Office was told yesterday by Ambassador Page that Ambassador Gerard at Berlin had forwarded to Washington confirmation of press reports to the effect that Germany had imprisoned thirty-nine British officers in military detention barracks. This action was taken in retaliation for the decision of the British Government to refuse honors of war to crews of captured German submarines.

Mr. Page's communication to the Foreign Office follows previous interchanges between Germany and Great Britain on this subject through the U. S. Government.

LIEUT. EPPES INCAPACITATED.

London, April 17.—Lieut. Douglas Eppes, formerly with the Canadian division and recently with the Suffolk Regiment, returns to Canada this week permanently incapacitated by ill health. He is a well known newspaper man of Toronto.

125,000 WAGE EARNERS AFFECTED

Lock-Out of 16,000 Carpenters in Chicago Has Assumed Serious Proportions

OPERATIONS ON 4,000 BUILDINGS VALUED AT \$30,000,000 HAVE BEEN SUSPENDED.

Chicago, Ill., April 17.—(Special)—The lockout of 16,000 union carpenters assumed serious proportions to-day, tying up operations valued at more than \$30,000,000 on 4,000 buildings in Chicago, and throwing out of employment 125,000 wage-earners, thousands of whom had no connection with the building industry itself.

Union leaders and officials of the Building Construction Employers Association, which declared the lockout, asserted that they expected little assistance from the Conference of the State Board of Arbitration, which will meet on Monday to offer its services in the interest of industrial peace.

SHERBROOKE CLEANING-UP

Board of Trade Committees Meet to Discuss Matter

ALSO URGE TREE PLANTING AND GARDEN MAKING.

A joint meeting of the Public Health and Civic Improvement Committees of the Sherbrooke Board of Trade was held last night for the purpose of discussing plans for Sherbrooke's annual clean-up week. It was pointed out that owing to the scavenging system which the city had adopted, there would not be so much cleaning up to be done this year, but it was also pointed out that there would be all the more reason for arousing public interest and public pride in the city's cleanliness, for there was still a great deal of room for improvement.

TREE PLANTING.

The citizens will find an opportunity for a great deal of activity in the tree planting campaign which is to be inaugurated. The Board of Trade will prepare complete instructions as to where to secure the trees, how to transfer them, and what trees are most likely to thrive, and any other information which might be of service to the public. The local newspapers will be asked to co-operate in every way, posters will be put up throughout the city, and the merchants and public institutions will be asked to give a helping hand in enlisting the interest and support of the public.

HOME GARDEN CAMPAIGN.

Probably the feature of this year's campaign under the direction of the two committees of the Board of Trade will be a movement to encourage backyard gardens in the city. It was felt that a great many more people would go in for gardening were they convinced that they could make a success of it. Simple instruction will be prepared by the Board of Trade from authentic sources, arrangements will be made to have the required implements put on the market at the lowest possible cost, and everything possible will be done to make it easy for individuals to start their little gardens. This will be a means of beautifying the city, and will also be a practical step along the lines of Patriotism-Production which are being so strongly promoted by the Department of Agriculture. It is hoped that these three movements of clean-up, tree planting and backyard gardens will prove a great success.

CONSISTORY AT VATICAN

WILL BE HELD NEXT MONTH TO APPOINT CHANCELLOR OF CATHOLIC CHURCH.

Rome, April 17.—(Special)—Arrangements are being made at the Vatican for the holding of a consistory, which may occur in the month of May, or later. The announced reason for the holding of the consistory is to secure the appointment of a new chancellor of the Catholic Church, which post has been vacant since the death of Cardinal Agliardi on March 19. This post can only be filled by appointment in a consistory.

HUERTA DECLARES HE GAVE NO CONCESSIONS

New York, April 17.—(Special)—Victoriano Huerta, former provisional president of Mexico, declares in a statement published by the Herald to-day that he had never given Japan or any other foreign government rights or concessions on the coast of Lower California.

STRIKES TO FORCE ITALY INTO WAR

Labour Trouble Expected With a View to Coerce the Italian Government

DEEP IMPRESSION MADE UPON PEOPLE BY TELEGRAM FROM GRAND DUKE NICHOLAS.

Rome, April 17.—The Idea Nazionale says a probable general strike will break out in Italian ports to force the Government to go to war. Telegrams sent by M. Sazonoff, the Russian foreign minister, and Grand Duke Nicholas to a Russian journalist in Rome are published here. Sazonoff says:

"Several times Russia has extended an invitation to Italy to intervene in the war. If that does not happen, the responsibility for the consequences must rest with Russia and her Allies."

Grand Duke Nicholas says:

"I hope that soon the gallant Italian army will take the field with us."

The telegrams have made a deep impression on the public. The fact that Germans holding important positions in Italian financial institutions are leaving Italy is regarded as symptomatic.

The Presario police yesterday arrested a twenty-year-old Austrian girl, Vada Tezuga, who was a student at a local conservatory, on the charge of espionage. The police found the girl was interested in Italian military affairs.

The Genoa police report that Germans attempted to buy land near an important railway bridge. The owners of the land refused to sell, and the Germans disappeared.

News has been received from the province of Udine that more than five hundred persons have been arrested at the border town of Cormons while smuggling rice and flour into Austria.

RETALIATE ON BRITISH OFFICERS

Ten Prisoners of War Placed in Solitary Confinement by the Germans

MEASURE OF REPRISAL FOR TREATMENT BY BRITAIN OF CREWS OF GERMAN SUBMARINES.

Halle-on-the-Saale, Germany, April 17.—(Special)—Ten British officers, prisoners of the Germans, have been taken from the local camp of prisoners of war and placed in solitary confinement in Magdeburg. This is a measure of reprisal for the treatment by Great Britain of the crews of German submarines held prisoners in England.

The ten officers referred to include the son of a former British Ambassador in Berlin. The name of this officer, however, is not given.

HEADLESS BODY OF WOMAN FOUND IN LAKE ONTARIO

Watertown, N.Y., April 17.—(Special)—The headless body of a woman was found on the shore of Lake Ontario at Sackett's Harbor last night. One foot and one hand were also missing. The body showed signs of having been somewhat burned. An investigation is in progress by the authorities.

HOLLAND URGED TO DRAW SWORD

Press of Netherlands Manifests Indignation Over the Katwyk Outrage

SUBMARINE ATTACKS CALLED THE WORK OF ASSASSINS EMPLOYED BY GERMAN GOVERNMENT

Amsterdam, April 17.—The whole press manifests indignation and resentment over the Katwyk outrage. The Telegram even calls it the work of assassins, and says that should Holland be involved in the war the moment should be chosen by the Dutch Government, and not by the Government that has these cowardly assassins as its accomplices.

The Handelsblad denounces the sinking of the steamer as "an unfriendly act, giving us the full right to draw the sword and join the enemies of Germany. The German Government," it continues, "must be under the firm conviction that whatever may happen and whatever it does, so long as it respects Dutch territory, Holland will maintain neutrality. It is certain to be regretted that out sincere wish to remain out of the war has had this effect on our German neighbors. We are certain that the German Government has misconceived Dutch policy. We wish to remain outside the war, but there is a limit to sacrifices to that end. If neighboring countries should get the impression that Holland was being humiliated and her rights violated without protest, peace might be purchased at too high a price. This theory proves that our ancestors seldom regretted having fought for their rights, and that the consequences of tamely enduring attacks never failed to be disastrous."

DEAD LETTER OFFICE ALIVE

Must be Busiest Place in Canada Just Now

100 LETTERS SENT ON FROM SHERBROOKE TELEGRAM FROM DEPARTMENT.

The post office at Sherbrooke has sent thus far about 100 letters on to the dead letter office because of failure of senders to affix extra stamp required by war tax order. These letters were mailed in Sherbrooke, and as the senders' names did not appear on the outside there was no option but to send them to the dead letter office under the instructions.

The acting postmaster received yesterday the following telegram from the deputy postmaster-general, Ottawa:

"Has been decided that postage stamp upon which war tax has been printed may be accepted for prepayment of postage. Amend instructions and proceed accordingly. Under no circumstances are inland Revenue stamps to be accepted on letters, postal cards, postal notes or post office money orders."

DEAD LETTER OFFICE OVERWHELMED.

Despatches from Ottawa indicate that the dead letter office is the busiest place in the country to-day. Thousands of letters are pouring in because of absence of war stamp. Public indignation is being expressed that the department should not have given a few days of grace for the public to get used to the new order.

\$65,000,000 WAR CONTRACT FROM RUSSIA.

New York, April 17.—The American Locomotive Company has closed a contract for \$65,000,000 worth of war material, principally shrapnel. It is understood the order came from the Russian government.

MR. J. R. BALL OF WATERVILLE, WRITES FROM WEST FLORIDA. Mr. J. R. Ball of Waterville, who spent the winter in West Florida, writing from Lynn Haven, Florida, says:

"This is the center of the production of naval stores. Many thousands of acres are covered with the long-leaved pines, from which turpentine and rosin are produced. Cotton and cereals do very well here and with the exception of an occasional freeze the citrus trees produce very well.

"To a person from the north, the main attraction is the climate. That one can go through the months of December, January, February, without seeing any snow or ice, and with the mercury averaging 50 to 60 degrees seems very desirable.

"I am of the opinion that a person who is not strong in health or who is on the down hill side of life would be benefitted by coming here. One pretty good indication of the opinion of the medical profession on the subject is the fact that there are in this city more superannuated doctors than men of any other calling, or profession, and they are all firm in the belief that life is lengthened by coming to this climate. There are here remarkable cases of people who have come here, given up by physicians as incurable, and who have the appearance of being now quite well.

"The shore line of the bay, including bays and lagoons is over 500 miles in extent. To a person from the Townships the land seems exceedingly level. The city of Lynn Haven is only about fifteen feet above the level of the bay, the tide rarely exceeding two feet. I remember being at St. John, N.B., and seeing the tide creep up 30 feet. If by any means the tide of the Bay of Fundy should set in here, our homes, churches and beautiful flower gardens would lie fifteen feet under water. But so stable are the habits of Mother Nature that we do not expect such a catastrophe to occur.

"Personally, one of the great attractions to me, is the constant presence all winter of our northern birds. We have around us robins, bluebirds, flickers, warblers, and other varieties more or less rare in the north, are quite plentiful here. The beautiful cardinal, and the ever-present mocking bird, are always around. High in the air, taking observations, like a German aeroplane, is the turkey buzzard, sailing around in wide circles on set wings.

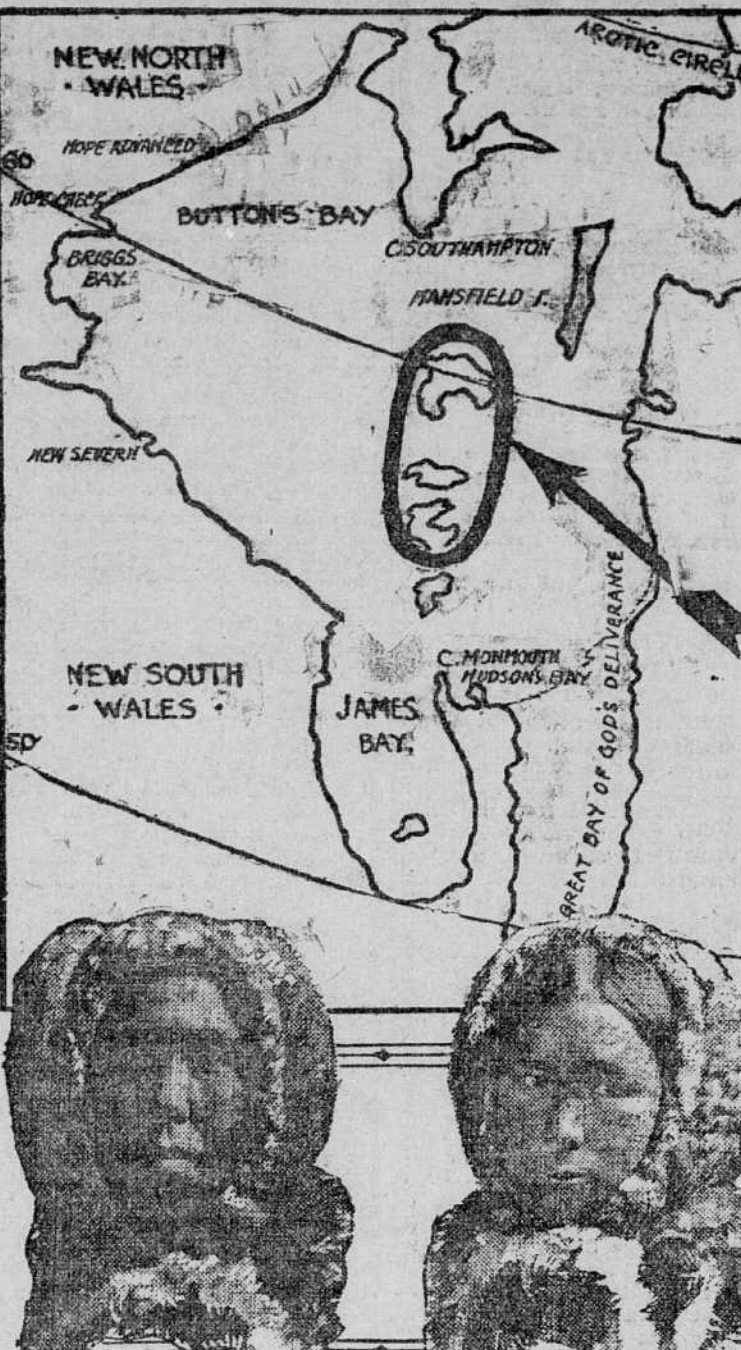

The map shows the islands as Hudson believed them to be, and the

is non-existent. The dotted line shows the approximately correct
position of the coast line. Mr. Flaherty thinks that the islands in
question are also incorrectly shown on Hudson's map. He believes
the larger islands to be long and narrow, lying parallel to one another
along lines running north and south.

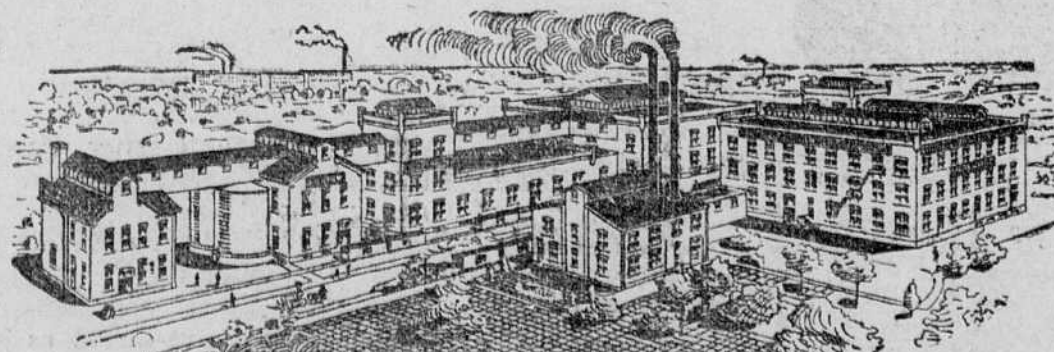

BEDFORD TOWN
AND DISTRICT

Opinion of Attorney is That Sew-
er System Cannot be Installed
at Present

AMOUNT REQUIRED WOULD EX-
CEED BORROWING POWERS
OF THE MUNICIPALITY.

Bedford, April 17.—(Special)—An
adjourned meeting of the Council was
held in the Town Hall on Wednesday
evening at 8 o'clock when there were
present His Worship the Mayor Mar-
vin Smith, Councillors Gordon Hul-
burd and Nap. Richeleau, Centre
Ward; W. Pendlebury, North Ward;
Jasper Oruller and S. Ewing, South
Ward, and A. T. Gould, Secretary-
Treasurer. There was a good attend-
ance of the general public.

NO LICENSE IN CENTRE WARD.
The Secretary-Treasurer then read
a petition presented by Father La-
moureux, P.P., Pastor A. J. Ward,
and W. Fare, in which municipal elec-
tors to the number of 98 in sub-divi-
sion No. 2 of the Centre Ward, re-
quested the Council not to grant a
license certificate to any applicant
for a liquor license, from the first
day of May, 1915, to the 30th day
of April, 1916. Accompanying the pe-
tition were affidavits sworn before
F. C. Saunders, Justice of the Peace,
to the effect that the signatures were
those of duly qualified electors, and
further, that the number of electors
eligible to vote was 133, which showed
that more than the needed majority
signed the No-License petition.

On motion by Councillor Richeleau,
seconded by Councillor Pendlebury,
it was moved, "That the petition be
agreed to and that no license certifi-
cate be granted for that sub-divi-
sion."

On being put to the vote Councillors
Pendlebury, Richeleau, Ewing and
Oruller voted yea; Councillor G.
Hulburd voted nay.

The Mayor declared the motion
carried.

ROAD WORK DISCUSSED.
A letter was read, signed by four-
teen of the residents alongside the
road leading from the town towards
Mystic, stating that the condition of
the road was such that an additional
light was very badly needed and re-
quested the Council to give instruc-
tions for the same to be installed.

On motion by Councillors Ewing
and Oruller the application was re-
ferred to the Light Committee.

A discussion took place respecting
the carrying out of certain road work
by the North and Centre Wards on
the Centre and South Wards respec-
tively, and an exchange was agreed
upon. The North Ward to repair the
Centre Ward road from the North
Ward boundary to the bridge, and
the Centre Ward to repair from their
limit to the boundary of the town.

Attention having been drawn to the
condition of many of the chimneys
within the town and the danger from
fire owing to same, Councillor Hul-
burd gave notice of motion to
amend the By-laws at next meeting
to enable the Council to deal with
the matter.

CLEAN-UP OF PREMISES.
On motion by Councillors Hulburd
and Richeleau, it was decided to en-
force the By-law respecting the effec-
tive clearance of all premises of rub-
bish, etc., and that W. J. Gall should
visit and report, and further give any
residents he might deem to need it,
instructions to carry out the by-law
by May 1st, or be fined for non-
compliance with same.

TERMS OF ROAD GRANT.
A circular letter was read from the
Department of Public Roads, draw-
ing the attention of the Council to
the fact that no work for which that
department would be expected to pro-
vide funds, was to be undertaken un-
til and unless the work had been
sanctioned by an inspector from that
department.

It was reported that no money had
been received towards the purchase of
any machinery or material and that
the funds of the corporation had been
drawn upon for the purpose of meet-
ing those liabilities.

It was thereupon decided on motion
by Councillors Hulburd and Oruller,
"That the Mayor and Secretary-Tre-
asurer should after consultation with
the representative to the Legislature
J. J. Gosselin, M.L.A., if neces-
sary, proceed to Quebec to interview
the department respecting the letter
under discussion and submit to them
the position the Council had assum-
ed and urge for an immediate grant
to enable them to discharge their in-
debtedness. Further, they should, if
deemed needful, associate one or two
others with themselves to go to Que-
bec and were empowered to sign any

The adjourned regular meeting of the Eastern Townships Graduate Nurses' Association was held yesterday afternoon in the Y. W. C. A. parlors, Miss Elizabeth V. O. Orford, the President, in the chair.

Miss Orford expressed her satisfaction at the contribution made by the Graduate Nurses' Association to the Red Cross Fund, but thought that their efforts in that connection should be continued. She laid a project before the meeting of giving 360 bangles every month, the requisite funds to be raised by small individual contributions.
The proposal was received with approval and the motion put was carried unanimously. The Secretary was instructed to send pledge cards to each member in order to simplify the collection of the subscriptions.

A discussion followed upon the future place of meeting, as the Girl Guides Club Room would not be longer available, and it was decided to accept the offer of the Y. W. C. A. of the use of the Assembly Hall for the ten meetings of the year at a small remuneration.
Dr. W. A. Farwell, the lecturer of the afternoon, was then introduced. He spoke of the nurse's vocation in general, and said that he thought that nurses might be divided into two classes—those who looked upon their work as a means of livelihood and those to whom it was a serious profession, a consecrated duty adopted from a desire to be of use in the world. He was bound to say that his experience had been very fortunate and that he had the greatest respect for trained nurses, whose assistance is invaluable to a physician and without whom he is seriously handicapped.

As an eye specialist, he said, many cases of blindness might have been prevented, and the faithful intelligent care of a nurse would do more to save a patient's sight than the work of the doctor.
Dr. Farwell was cordially thanked for his address.

Miss Mackenzie, Chief Superintendent of the Victorian Order of Nurses who is visiting the various districts throughout the country, was then cordially received, and proceeded to give a characteristic and remarkably interesting address on the Victorian Order and nursing in general.

RETURN PARCELS TO THE SENDERS.

Chitasso, via Paris, April 16.—Several thousand parcel post packages mailed from Germany to the United States, after being delayed here for some time, have been returned to the senders by the postal authorities because the British and French Governments have given notification that parcels addressed to German citizens in the U.S. will be seized whenever they are found on ship-board.

THE ONLOOKER COMMENTS

Agricultural Exhibitions Should Be Held As Usual.

A press report states that there is a possibility that the Quebec, Three Rivers and Sherbrooke Fairs will not be held this year, and that the Provincial Government, which has always so generously supported these institutions, is inclined to favor the idea of a year's recess in the matter of these three chief agricultural shows of the Province.

There is reason to believe that a suspension of these exhibitions would not be looked upon with favor by the general public. One cannot here speak for the sentiment which may prevail at Three Rivers or Quebec, but one may pretty accurately estimate the public feeling in the Eastern Townships with regard to the matter.

It would seem that agriculture is the last industry which we can afford to go back on at the present time, and to close the great agricultural fairs would certainly be a retrogressive step. It might be reasonable to require this year that they be made more agricultural than they have been in the past; that, for instance, a little less prominence be given to vaudeville and more to matters purely agricultural. There may very likely be opportunity and reason, in these strenuous days, to alter the plan of these exhibitions to some extent, and even to some extent to curtail expenditures, but to close any of the agricultural exhibitions in this year when the great call is for increased and improved production would seem to be a great mistake.

The Government, in the opinion of the public, there is reason to believe, will be fully justified in continuing its support of these institutions which have done so much to advance the cause of agriculture. So far as the Eastern Townships is concerned, the Sherbrooke Exhibition and the various county fairs could not be discontinued without distinct loss to this agricultural section of the province.

It must not be. The public will expect the various fair associations to go ahead with their programmes and will support the Government in according the usual support.

Modern French Valor Demonstrated.

One of the striking features of the great struggle that is going on along the 250-mile battle-line from the North Sea to the frontier of Switzerland is the splendid manner in which the French soldiers are fighting.

One hundred years ago, when the great Napoleon led the legions of France across Europe, and won triumph after triumph, it was demonstrated that under capable leadership the French soldier was the best fighter on the continent. The great battle of Austerlitz was won with 80,000 Frenchmen against 120,000 Austrians and Russians. Prussia was crushed in the battle of Jena when the invincible French army swept away in utter rout the numerically stronger forces of the enemy. In 1870, under incapable leaders, the French failed, and the world wondered if the soldier of modern France was of the same quality as those who marched to victory under the banners of Napoleon.

Every day of the present war is reaffirming the prowess of the defenders of La Belle France. Although outnumbered, they have held back the German hordes along their long battle-line. Britishers must remember that of the 250-mile front the French army defends alone and absolutely fully 200 miles of it. There are great leaders to-day. To this fact is added a just cause which calls upon every patriot to fight for the defence of his country against a ruthless enemy.

The French army to-day is living up to its great traditions, and the world, either of allies or neutrals, looks on in admiration at the splendid spectacle.

The Iron Cross.

A great many stories have been told of the Iron Cross which is so generously bestowed by the Kaiser upon his brave soldiers, but the most significant and touching is told by an American writer who visited the German trenches and one of the German hospitals. An officer passing through the wards was distributing the Iron Cross to those wounded ones who had been conspicuous for bravery. Finally he came to the bed of a soldier whose legs had had to be amputated just below the hips. He had been a long-distance runner. White and faint, he lay in his bed when the officer came and handed him the Iron Cross, for valor. The man took it, held it a second, then stretched out his hand and let it slip to the floor. What was an Iron Cross to a long-distance runner who would never run, and probably never walk, again? Such is the irony of war.

"Made In Canada" or "Made In The Empire."

We hear a good deal nowadays of the "Made in Canada" campaign and the appeal to Canadians to buy only Canadian-made goods.

It develops that this campaign has created a somewhat unfavorable impression among certain manufacturers in the Old Country. In a circular letter received in Sherbrooke from one of these manufacturers this week, referring to an article on "Made in Canada" which he had read in a Canadian publication, he adds: "From the figures, etc., it appeared that one of the chief 'foreign' countries aimed at was Great Britain."

The conclusion of the manufacturer in question is obviously wrong, though it is quite conceivable that the Canadian appeal to patronize home industry might appear to have been directed against goods made in other parts of the Empire, as well as of foreign countries.

This leads to the suggestion that the slogan "Made in Canada" is perhaps not wisely chosen, that it is narrow, and that "Made in the Empire" would sound better and more correctly represent public sentiment, as there is absolutely no desire to discriminate against the products of any part of the British Empire.

"Made in the Empire" sounds rather well, and it better interprets public sentiment.

Germany Will Pay The Final Price.

All of the fighting nations in Europe are paying dearly, in lives and money, for the present war. The casualties are reckoned by the thousands. France alone estimates her losses in killed, wounded and missing, up to February 15, at 750,000 men. Millions of men, friend and foe, have been counted out in the battles and desultory fighting that have taken place in France, on or near the German frontier, since the opening of hostilities.

The highest price, however, has been paid by three of the countries engaged, if we grant Poland the right of being called a country. The invaded countries have borne the brunt of the war. Belgium and France, and the unfortunate, divided Poland, have not only had their soldiers killed or disabled, but have seen countryside desolated, civilians attacked, homes destroyed, families separated, and even women and little children treated mercilessly. Their harvest fields have been turned into burying grounds. The horrors of the war waged in Belgium, in Galicia, in Northern France, are fresh in our minds.

Russia and Germany, save on the frontier, have not had to endure invasion. England has still the barrier of the sea between her island and her foes on the continent. These three countries may, with some hope, look forward to a harvest. Even Germany, with all her reverses, has been able to keep her land practically free from invasion. Should the German Government make peace at this time the troops of the German Empire would withdraw through countries despoiled by themselves into their own unravaged land.

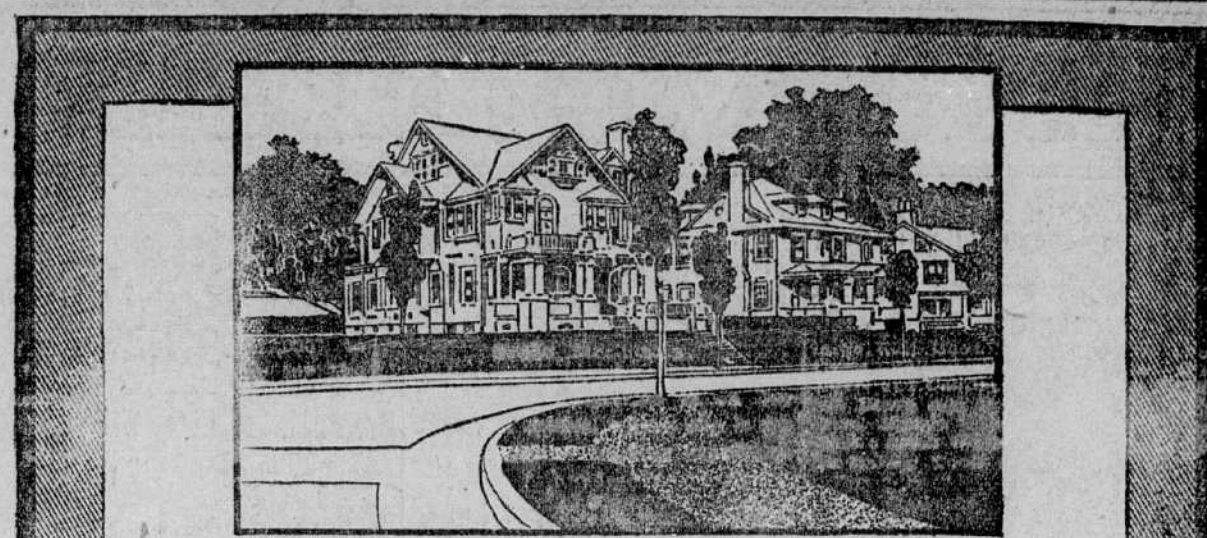
The invaded countries have been the ones to suffer most. France is the power that now holds Germany from England. The German no longer aims for Paris, but at London. He could almost love the Frenchman if the latter would open a way to England. But the German can reach England only by way of a conquered France. And France remembers 1870, and fights doggedly on.

When war first broke out, England came to the aid of Belgium as a violated neutral, and of France as an ally. As the war has progressed, England finds herself fighting as necessarily for her own existence as Belgium did for her right as a neutral. France, on her own soil, fights for her life. Germany, in France and Belgium, fights England. Up to the present undoubtedly the highest price paid has been by these invaded countries, Belgium, France and Poland. Within their borders nearly all the warfare has been waged, and they have furnished the battlefields for Germany, Russia and England.

It is not strange that the allied nations insist that peace can only come when German militarism has been crushed and when this arch-enemy of human liberty has been brought to final reckoning.

The Mounted Soldiers.

If the men of the First Contingent were mounted on many steeds like those sold by the truthful if unpatriotic farmers of another province, it is no wonder that some of them are still on the way to the front. The public has exclaimed over stories of poor boots furnished the soldiers, but it may fairly gasp at the revelations of horse-buying in the early days of equipping our army. When asked if he did not realize that the lives of the men depended on these horses, one man coolly replied that their lives would not depend on them

against the better judgment of the doctor, the public insistence has forced a trial of this method. The doctors persist that this treatment in ordinary practice is impractical and even dangerous, and can be followed only in institutions where great watchfulness prevails. But the public has been fed up on newspaper and magazine articles until the medical profession is forced, by continual pressure, to adopt methods which have been generally employed only by experienced specialists in another country.

The members of the medical profession seem anxious enough to experiment without having an eager public urging them to it. Influenced by stories of Dr. Friedman, an excited public went crazy over turtle serum. In its turn comes the "twilight sleep," discussed and advocated in reputable magazines and journals. Again the public is agitated, as well as interested. But, as only the wealthy or occasional fortunate individual can benefit thereby, why embarrass the physician and disappoint a patient by widely and vigorously advocating a method that does not admit of general adoption? —Onlooker.

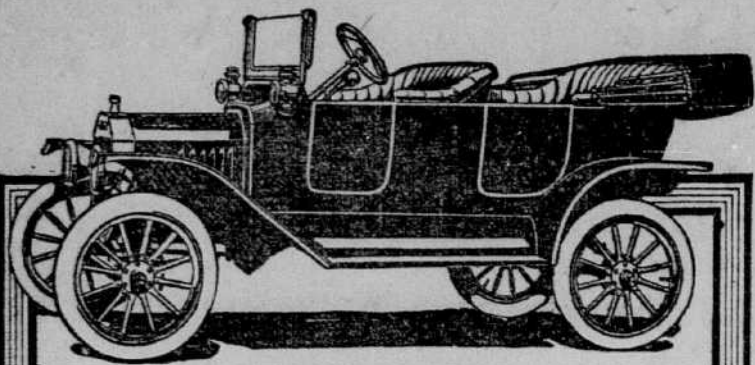

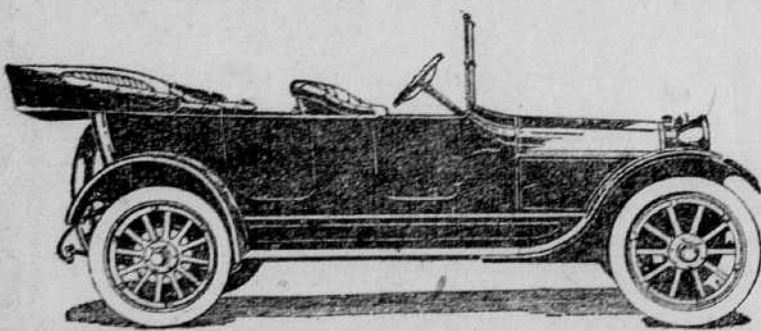

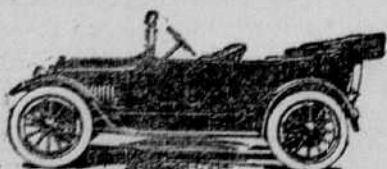

FIRST WOMAN JITNEY DRIVER

Winnipeg, Man., April 17.—(Special)—This city's first woman jitney driver is Mrs. Leonard T. Snitzel, 395 Banning St., who has recently joined in the popular movement to relieve street car congestion with a new Ford automobile. It is significant to show that not only are women invading practically all of the occupations which men used to monopolize but the newest ones as well. It also shows another field where the automobile is proving its usefulness.

In the eastern cities jitney buses have been popular for some time, the people believing that they would help solve the transportation problem, and now the sentiment is sweeping westward. In some quarters street car corporations have become alarmed and are endeavoring by various ways to discourage the new idea.

The use of automobiles for public service over city routes has opened a new field of employment for many people. Whether or not it is practical and therefore likely to be permanent depends very largely on the cost of operating. The expense is the big item. The taxi companies in some cities pay an average of three cents a mile for tire insurance, and in addition to that have to buy gasoline and oil. It would seem, therefore, that the problem of profitable jitney service will be solved only by the use of cars of low initial cost and minimum cost of operation.

—\$3,000 FIRE AT CANTERBURY

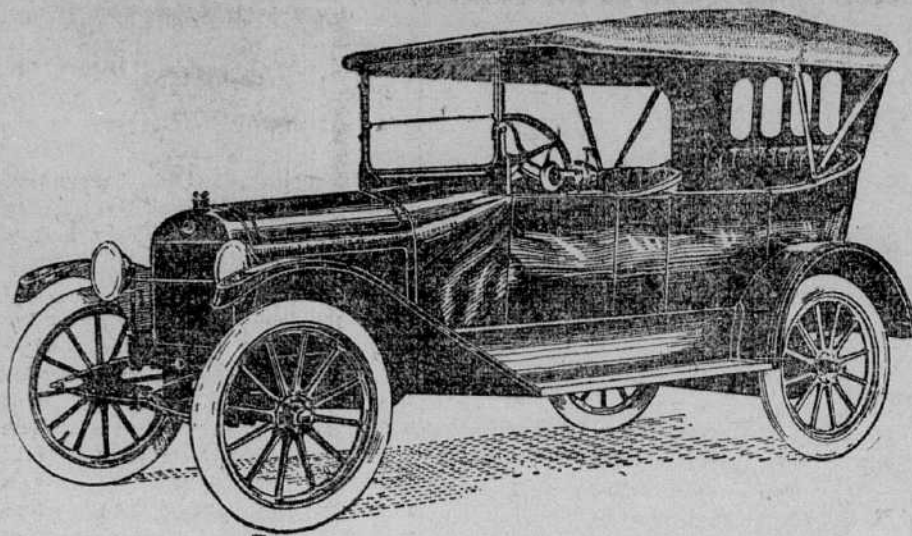

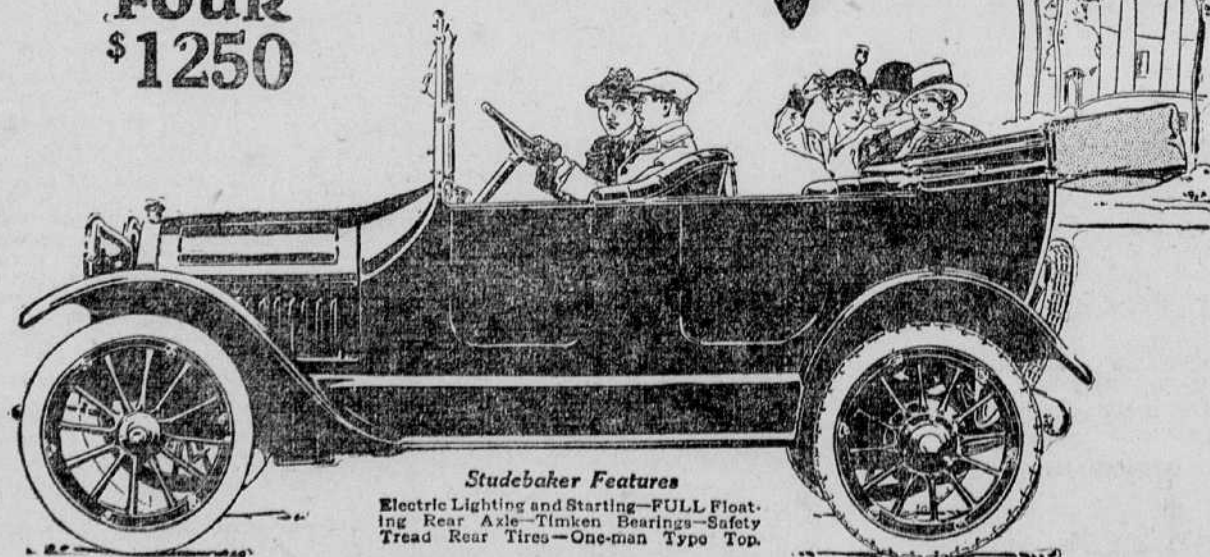

N. H. REJECTS BOSTON & MAINE BILL

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
VOTED DOWN BILL FOR RE-ORGANIZATION OF ROAD.

Concord, N.H., April 16.—By a vote of 123 to 161 the New Hampshire House of Representatives yesterday defeated the bill for the reorganization of the Boston & Maine Railroad, giving that corporation power to consolidate with the New Hampshire leased lines. The question was on substitution of the minority report of the Judiciary Committee.

"ought to pass" for the majority report, inexpedient to legislate. The result was the outcome of a long fight which resulted in the framing of a bill favorable to the Boston & Maine but allowing the consolidation of the leased lines on a vote of two-thirds of the stockholders of the combining companies. The vote came suddenly after the previous question had been moved after a day of debate.

SELL CHINESE EGGS IN BOSTON
Boston, April 16.—Chinese eggs were placed on sale in the Boston dairy market yesterday for the first time. Two carloads of 400 cases each, with 30 dozen eggs to the

case, were received by rail from the Pacific coast by a Commercial street firm, and were sold at eighteen and nineteen cents a dozen. The eggs, slightly smaller than the domestic variety, arrived in good condition. They were about six weeks on the way.

ANOTHER BRITISH SHIP TORPEDOED.

London, April 16.—The British steamship Ptarmigan of the General Steam Navigation Company was torpedoed by a German submarine in the North Sea yesterday. Advice received here at noon stated that eleven members of her crew, which numbered twenty-two, were saved.

LETTERS FROM E. T. SOLDIERS WITH OVERSEAS CONTINGENT

CAPT. KENNEDY OF SHERBROOKE WRITES FROM FRANCE

Hatley, April 17—(Special)—A letter dated March 26 which was received on April 13 by Mrs. Hetherington, from her nephew, Capt. K. E. Kennedy of Sherbrooke, who accompanied the First Canadian Expeditionary Force, contains much of interest. The writer says:

"I am sorry that I cannot give you the story of my last trip. It has given me a most profound respect for H. M. Royal Navy and the work it is doing. I am reminded of what Sir William Blackstone wrote in seventeen something, 'The Royal Navy of England hath ever been its greatest defence and ornament.' I have heard that some who 'stay at home' to defend their country have been wondering 'what the navy was doing' I wish they could but see what I have seen, and that is such a small glimpse, too. When one thinks of the hundreds of ships that are navigating the waters included in the 'German blockade,' which during the time since the declaration of war, have sunk so few vessels of any kind, with their vaunted navy that was waiting for 'Der Tag,' their submarines and their mines, with which they have broken practically every rule of warfare, I don't think there will be any question as to what the Navy is doing.

The city of Salisbury had become quite like a second home, and it seemed like parting with old friends when I said good-bye to many who had shown me such true English hospitality, throwing open their homes, and by their cordial reception making one feel like one of the family. However, enthusiastic receptions awaited us everywhere in la belle France and those of us who cannot speak French within a short time must needs be stupid indeed. Incidentally, you should hear 'Tipperary' French version. As one enters the Canadian Division's area, such signs as 'Chateau Frontenac,' 'King Edward Hotel,' 'Hillier House,' 'The Alexandria,' etc., meet me on all sides. Each little dugout lays claim to be the first and foremost, and one need not ask what unit holds a particular portion of the line, if one is familiar with the principal Canadian hotels. Some of these subterranean hostilities are quite dry and comfortable, except for the fear of, if not actual presence of, unwelcome guests. One loses interest in such distant questions as, 'Is the moon inhabited?' when compelled to face the very near question—too often there is no room for a question—'Am I inhabited?'

"When I think of the way the men endure the conditions they have to work under—the cheery uncomplaining, all-pervading good humor that permeates throughout all branches of the service, I feel that every able-bodied person, who is not doing their single-hearted utmost to help, is unworthy to be allowed to live. How able adult men can remain at home now passes comprehension. If we had a sufficient force when wanted, a great part of the immense sacrifice that is being made, would be obviated. If these stay-at-home church-parade soldiers could see the piles of ruins that were once towns, the ditched and scarred fields that were once farms, the long lines of refugees waiting for their dose of bread, or the still sadder sight of a few old

people, and perhaps a few children, creeping along the roadway with a look of blank despair on their faces, their homes but a few blackened spars, often marking the resting place of a father, husband or son who had attempted to withstand the wanton destruction, with no place to go forward to, and nothing, or worse, behind, perhaps they would—well, join the Home Guard. If by any means they should take a chance of getting within hearing of the enemy, well, then they don't belong to the class I'm 'sore' at. However, they don't have to come if they don't want to, at least under the present law. I heard about an 'awfully patriotic man' the other day. He 'just three himself out' dancing at some affair, held in aid of some fund or other, to buy powder puffs for the soldiers. We seem to have many heroes of that ilk helping us. Recently saw two 'yepes' that were out hunting for widows and children, turn and run from one of our 'planes. They are real bashful! The men have the guns all named, and often an animated argument will arise as to whether 'George' or 'Christopher' 'spoke' at a certain time. 'Rain-in-the-Face' is a gun that has been so effectively hidden that our own people have difficulty in finding it. I'm enclosing a bit of paper dated Buckingham Palace—gift from Mary R. and the Women of the Empire, 1914, which came with one of the Queen's gifts—socks this time. One of the men says that while its mighty good of Queen Mary to think of him, there's no getting round the fact that she can't knit like his wife.

"Seldom see anyone from near home. Everybody from that way seems to be left in England, probably to come with second outfit."

"P. S.—By the way, the clipping from 'The Record' you enclosed, 'The Boys of the Eastern Townships' by M. H. Bowen, of Sherbrooke, took the fancy of the Rev. Davis, and he has 'appropriated' it."

THETFORD BOY IN FIRING LINE. Thetford Mines, April 17.—(Special)—Mr. James Briggs has received a letter from his son Tracy, who was formerly a clerk in the Bank of Montreal and is now at the front in France. The writer is not yet 18 years of age and was chosen to be a sniper as he is a splendid shot, inherited no doubt from his father, who is a good hunter.

I have just came out of the trenches again for a rest, we have been in the trenches now five times so we are getting to be old soldiers. I got the parcel the first time I was out and I was glad to get it for I was good and hungry at the time and I had no money. They only give us 3 dollars every two weeks. I also got the socks and three or four letters one addressed to France and the others to Tidworth. I am in Y. M. C. A. now about 40 minutes walk from the firing line. When we are in the trenches you can hear the Germans shouting over at us. And the last time we were in the trenches they shouted over and said "Are you the 14th and they shouted back and said "yes" and they shouted back and said "you are no good you fire too much why don't you do the same as the Scoties don't fire and they would do the same thing." The Scoties are in the trenches when we are out, the English soldiers were playing football with them at Xmas day. We have now been in the firing line over a month. Tom Stanley he should enlist in the 3 contingent. Well he good and write. Tracy.

TRENCHES NOT SO BAD. In a letter to his friend Fred Russell, another Thetford boy who was left in England with the 12th battalion, Private Briggs says, "I am still living and well. The trenches are not so bad as you think they are and we have not been shelled much, we have not lost many men. They read all the letters so I can't tell you where I am. When do you expect to come out? When you write home, tell them you heard from me, I have received no letters at all."

BROMPTON BOY AT THE FRONT. Brompton, April 17.—(Special)—The following is a letter received from William Knapp, son of Alfred Knapp of Brompton, who is with the Patricias at the front:—"March 22, 1915:—

"We have certainly seen our share of the scrap since we landed here; it is supposed to be the hardest position on the British line.

"We had a sad loss a few days ago. Col. Farquhar, our commanding officer, was shot and died soon after. He was very much thought of by all the men.

"I fairly devoured the 'Courier' and 'Record' you sent. Thought I had read it all, so used some pages to wrap grub for the trenches. There I read it and found some things I had missed. We had two little falls of what we would call 'sugar snow' but it went during the day. The buildings where we are quartered were built in 1615 so they are some old.

"I got a blue letter from —. He thinks he is in a hole. I wish he could see a little of this ruined country, he would think he was well above ground. Canada is certainly in for a big boom soon after this war is over."

NINE FUNERALS IN ONE. Detroit, Mich., April 17.—Nine funerals will be merged into one next Monday to take care of nine of the 15 victims of last night's accident when a crowded street car was run down by a Detroit, Toledo and Ironton freight train on a railroad crossing in the western part of the city. All of the nine were parishioners of St. John's Cantius Roman Catholic Church, where the funerals will be held.

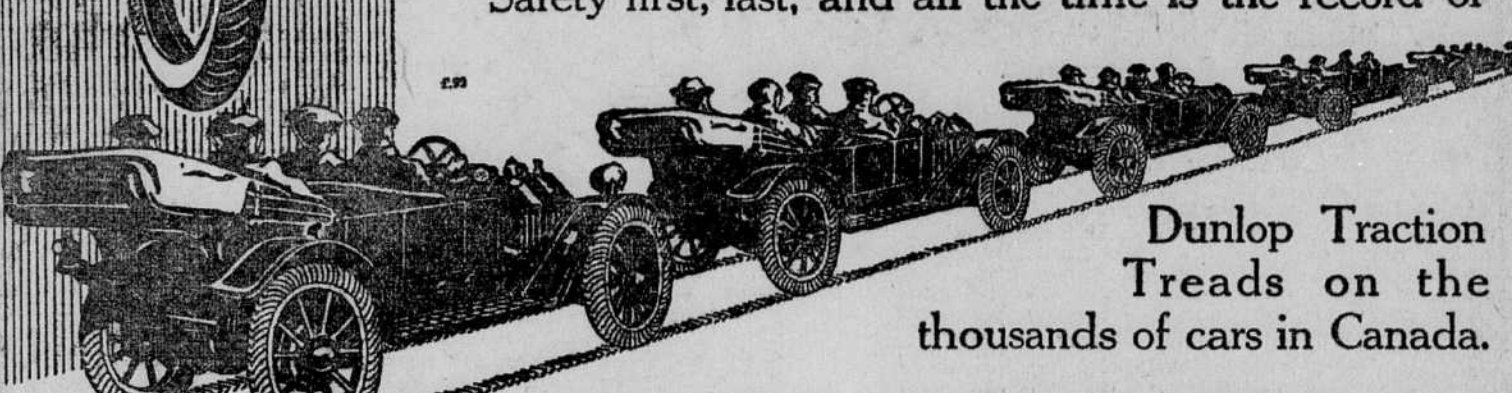

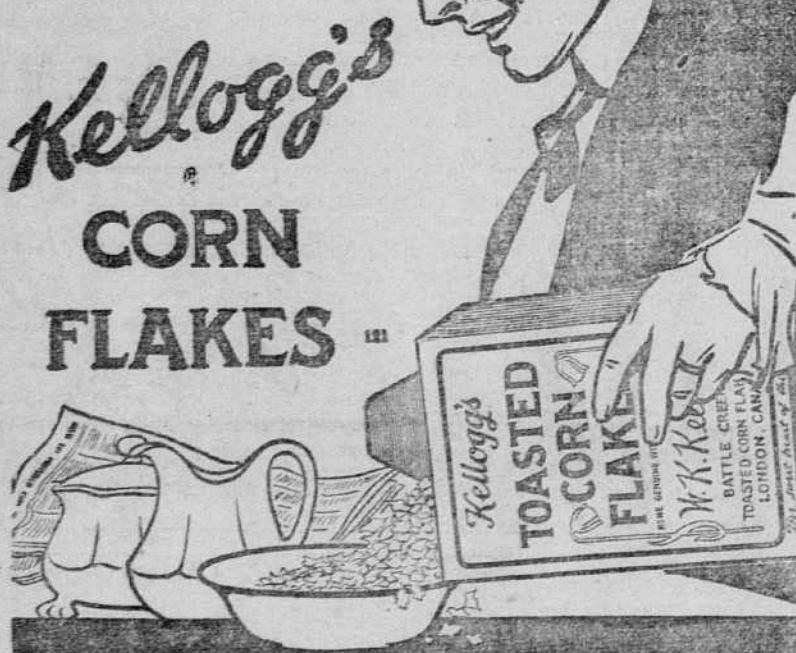

DEAD AND DYING NATIONS

Some of the thinkers of the day—and they are not only those from whom the war has cruelly snatched their household idols—seem to believe that the war must be a fight to a finish; that England supposedly victorious, will put the entire population of her deadly enemy to the sword. I am convinced such will not be. No nation was ever exterminated by such means only, since the beginning of national life on the earth. One by one we read the history of the dead nations of the past. When Babylon, Egypt, Greece and Rome tottered to their fall, it was not because of a dearth of wisdom, power, riches or military prowess. No nation was ever taxed out of existence. They died because of the vices of their people. Babylon was drunk when warned by the "hand writing on the wall." Greece was a nation of carousers. Roman gentry fell from their seats and rolled under the tables at their feasts, intoxicated. In the vices that destroyed the dead nations, liquor-drinking stands pre-eminent. At the time of the Boer War, the British Government, startled to find that only a small percentage of recruits measured up to the standard of the War Office, ordered a searching, scientific investigation. Unmistakable and appalling signs of national decay were revealed. Out of fifty-seven children of inebriate parents, fifty were abnormal—idiotic, epileptic, insane, crippled, etc. When we know how large a percentage of the people of England have been beer drinkers in the whole of her past, we no longer wonder at the number of times the standard of the war office has had to be lowered since the war began until now the height is only five feet one. We would think a Canadian woman understood whose inches were no greater than that!

The attitude of the English government today towards the liquor question is, to my mind, one of the most hopeful signs possible with regard to the ultimate success of her arms. That such men as Lord Kitchener and David Lloyd-George have openly declared that the drink is a greater foe to England than the armed legions of Germany is very good proof that the traffic is now seen in its true colors. That drink has hindered the preparation of munitions of war; that drunken soldiers are no credit; that a drinking soldiery is insubordinate and inefficient; that alcohol is no help on the march; all this the war has proved. Who knows but that the struggle must continue, in the nature of the Divine plan for humanity, until England and France have, like Russia, banished the iniquitous traffic forever? Let us remember that in the great world-cycle of events, the drunken nation has not long been a free nation. Between drunkenness and those nations which pertain to law and order there can be no peace until one or the other goes under. Some have said—and it may be the truth—that we who are British-born are being scourged for our national sins.

Be this as it may, it is a preposterous insult to a just and righteous God to pretend to believe and pray that He will continue to bless and shield a nation which harbors and nurses a national system of destruction of human souls and bodies—a destruction so shameful that death on the battlefield is glory compared with it. If God is on the side of the righteous cause it is for England, yes, and Canada too, to "get busy" making her cause as righteous and clean as she can, by the elimination of whatever is offensive to Him whose help we so much need in our country's crisis. Napoleon said: "God is on the side of the strongest battalions." He was wrong and events

proved him so. And those who are saying that England will win because she has more men and more money and a stronger navy are wrong, too. England will win if her cause is the cleaner of the two. We believe it is. Whether she will win sooner or later depends on how much sacrifice of ease and pleasure and indulgence in demoralizing habits she is willing to make. A ditch may be dug with a dull shovel, but it takes longer than it should take given a proper tool to work with. England's sword will be the sharper, have aim the truer, her heart more dauntless, when she has put her "inside enemy," the liquor habit, under her feet.

WHAT DOES THE W. C. T. U. STAND FOR?

Forty years ago a band of consecrated women, of whom Frances Willard was the Secretary, formulated the following Declaration of Principles at the first convention held in Cleveland, Ohio.

Delegates from eighteen States were gathered there. They were not speakers. Few understood parliamentary procedure, but the presence of the Lord was among them and they recognized their Leader and put themselves unreservedly under his guidance.

This is the Declaration:—"To educate the young in principles of temperance and morality; to form a better public sentiment upon all subjects of reform; to seek by religious, ethical and scientific means the reformation of the drinking classes; to seek the transforming power of Divine grace for ourselves, and all for whom we work, that they and we may willfully transcend no law of pure and wholesome living; and finally to labor and to pray that all these principles founded upon the Gospel of Christ may be worked out into the customs of society and the laws of the land."

The passing years have brought no better wisdom.

The White Ribbon badge was adopted as emblematic of purity and peace.

The motto, "For God and Home and Native Land" was considered sufficient for the time, until in 1883 at Detroit the World's Christian Temperance Union was formed and the motto was broadened out to "For God and Home and all Lands."

The first resolution passed by Miss Willard was this:—"Resolved, that, recognizing that it is and will be combatted by mighty, determined and relentless forces, we will, trusting in Him Who is the Prince of Peace, meet argument with argument, misjudgment with patience, denunciation with kindness, and all our dangers and difficulties with prayer."

The history of the W. C. T. U. plainly shows that in so far as the leaders followed these principles and kept close touch with the Master's hand, so far have they prospered.

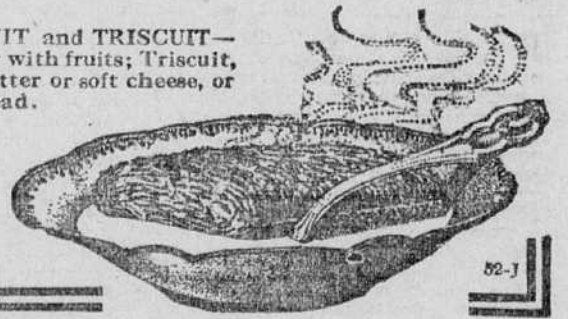

PATRIOTIC WORK **IN SHERBROOKE**

What the Purple Cross Service Is Doing at the Battle Front

MR. J. F. McLEOD OF BURY DONATES \$50 TO INSTALL BED IN CANADIAN HOSPITAL.

Among the many branches of Patriotic work which have been so enthusiastically taken up in Sherbrooke, that of the Purple Cross or the Service of looking after the horses on the battlefield, has as yet not come under the attention of the various committees.

This society has offices in London, Paris, and New York, and a splendid

body of men are looking after the work of this most humane society.

WHAT THE PURPLE CROSS SERVICE DOES.

It can almost be said that what the Red Cross is to our wounded soldiers so is the Purple Cross Society in connection with the suffering horses on the battlefield.

It maintains a staff of veterinary surgeons, assistants and grooms, with the object of relieving the terrible suffering of wounded and sick army horses. Veterinary Hospitals have been opened at Verdun and at Bordeaux. Arrangements are being made for the establishment of a third hospital, and for as many hospitals as the funds of the Society will permit.

Ambulances, surgical instruments, drugs, chloroform, veterinary appliances and stable requisites have been sent from England, and the sanitary and practical working of the hospitals has been carefully studied.

The plight of these poor wounded animals in such a contest as this can be well imagined, but the following extract from a letter from a correspondent at the front will help to bring before our eyes the suffering of the poor animals who so willingly serve us in peace and war—

"These are bad times for horses as well as for men. The unhappy creatures must work until they fall dead of fatigue. Then they are hurriedly extricated, cast by the roadside, and the war-masters pass on. The track of an army is strewn with dead horses. I cannot get out of my mind the memory of one poor brute that I saw this morning in a field near Hewanston. He had been there for a long time. In his agonies he had clung with his hoofs an almost perfectly regular circle in the hard earth. He lay on his side, now unable to move, panting and emitting short groans. As I watched, his wandering eye caught mine with a glance of absolutely human anguish. I think this humaneness of horses, and their sympathy with and understanding of men, combined with their utter lack of control over their destiny, that strikes at one's heart. I hope it does not seem absurd to write about the woes of horses who men are suffering so much. But there was something grim and fantastic in this lonely and miserable scene that still oppresses my mind. I had no weapon with which to help the horse, and must pass on, leaving him where he lay."

A letter and a copy of a resolution relating to the enforced allotment of soldiers' pay and reduction of fund relief were then placed before the meeting, and after considerable discussion were held over for consideration.

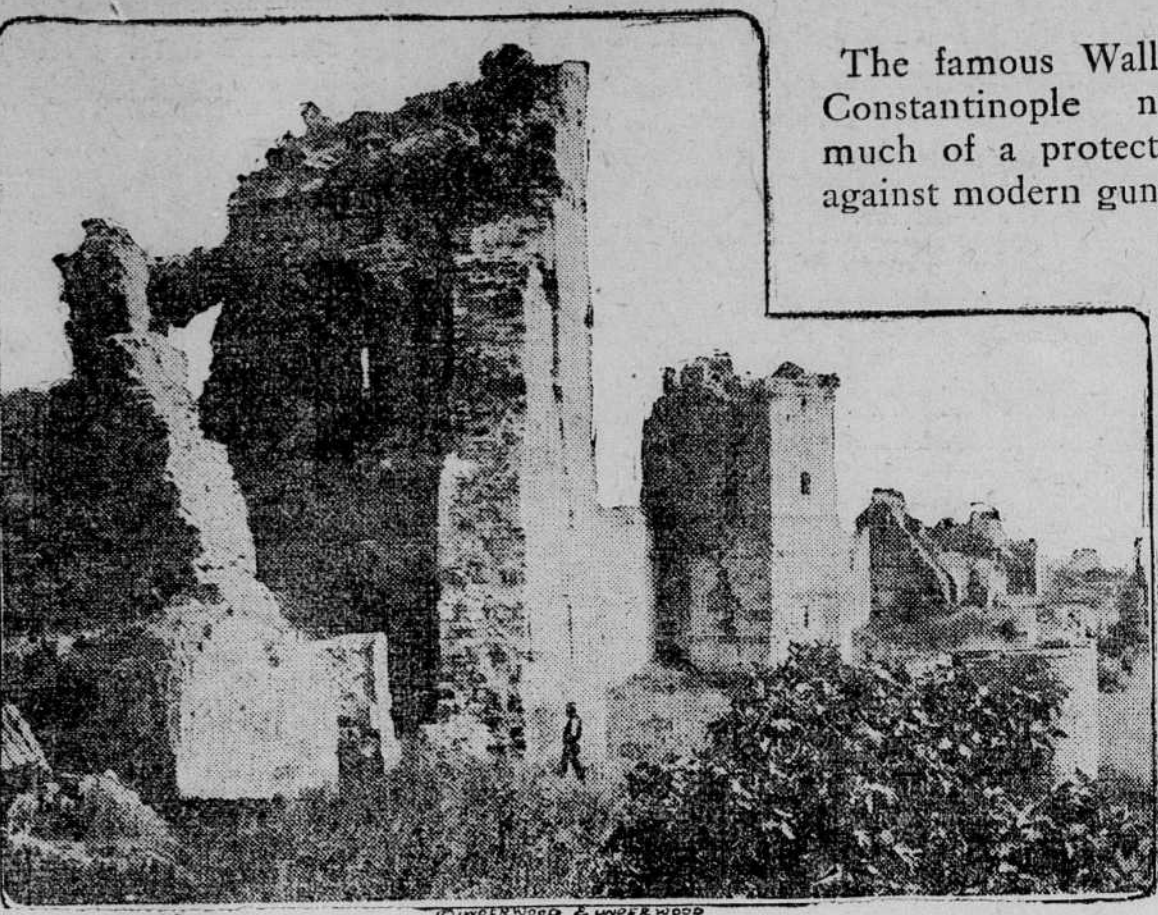
