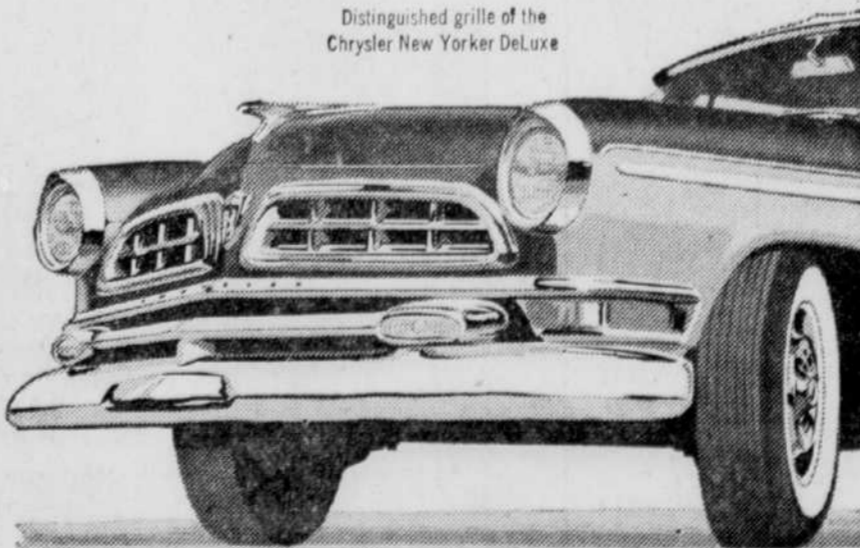

Marks 75th Anniversary

Butterfield Plant Key To Boundary Prosperity



The tremendous growth of the Union Twist Drill Co., Butterfield Division, since it was first established in Rock Island in 1880, is indicated by the contrast between the upper photograph showing the first plant, and the lower showing the plant as it exists today.

Rock Island — The Union Twist Drill Co., Butterfield Division, at the Boundary Villages of Rock Island and Derby Line this year celebrates 75 years of growth and expansion.

The plant which today employs 558, started in 1880, when Lewis Young, a bright young Rock Island man invented an axle cutter. This led to the building of a first factory on Foundry Hill in Rock Island by Mr. Young and Col. R. D. Butterfield of Derby Line. Later John Hay and George Reece joined the two men and they manufactured axle cutters and a line of blacksmith stocks and dies which included all threading sizes from one-eighth of an inch to two inches. This was the start of the Butterfield inclusive line of cutting tools.

By 1887, production and distribution had grown enough to warrant a catalog. Subsequent catalogs were issued in 1903, 1906 and 1911, with other editions printed thereafter every three or four years.

About the time the first catalog was printed, Reece invented what still is known and manufactured as "Reece screw plates," one of the most efficient screw plates ever put on the market. This invention required further financing and H. S. Haskell of Derby Line was added to the organization.

Ten years later, Mr. Haskell retired. General F. G. Butterfield joined his older brother and the partnership was incorporated in 1897 as "Butterfield and Company." The officers were president, Col. F. D. Butterfield; vice-president, Gen. F. G. Butterfield; treasurer, B. F. Butterfield, and directors were Miss Esther Butterfield, Miss Charlotte Butterfield and Miss Ellen Butterfield.

The initial structure, consisting of a two-story building 60 x 49 feet, was built about one third of a mile from the site of the first factory and employed from eight to 10 men.

The business grew until in 1913 the Union Twist Drill Co. of Athol, Mass., bought out the entire stock of both the American and Canadian plants. This change came about during World War I and the plant contributed to the war effort by manufacturing drills, taps, dies,

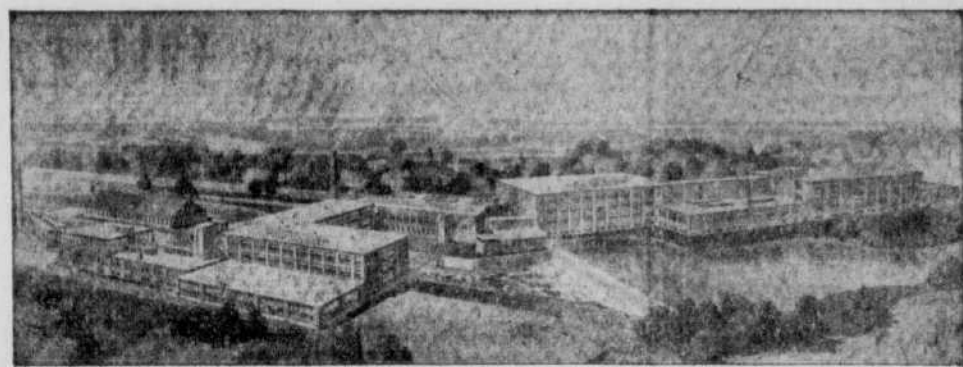

milling cutters and numerous other small tools.

In 1890 a new two-story factory was completed on the Canadian side. The Lay Whip Co. of Rock Island occupied the West end of the second floor until their factory was built in Upper Rock Island. After they vacated, Butterfields used this section and gave it the classification of "tool room" where repairs of their own factory was done under the foremanship of Frank Stewart. (He was the father of Ben Stewart, of Florida, formerly of Rock Island).

About 1893 a U.S. factory was built across the yard to the south of the Canadian plant and in 1900 an additional U.S. factory was built on the property of the Boston and Maine Railroad, east of the present Quebec Central R.R. freight shed. This building was later destroyed by fire.

A three storey main building, 175 by 70 feet, was built on the Canadian side in 1917 and the former machine plant renovated for an office and shipping room. New buildings were also started on the American side and these were completed in the 1920's. During World War II, both Canadian and American

plants operated on a 24-hour basis. With so many men in the service, many women were hired.

About this same time, three new buildings were erected on the American side and a large extension added to the Canadian plant, nearly doubling its capacity.

In 1945 a metallurgical laboratory was added for the purpose of chemical analysis and micro-photo inspection of steel and finished tools.

Power was first derived from the Tomifobia River, first at the Foundry Hill plant via the canal, then at the second factory, which

was built on lower ground, direct from the river itself.

In 1908, the water wheel was taken out of the original shop and installed in the lower U.S. shop. The penstock was extended for the purpose of achieving a greater head of water. This was used to generate electricity as the water was gradually weakening as the trees were cut off along the river sides.

When the main plant was built, electric power was used throughout for the operations of the machinery in the various departments. This power was purchased from the Sherbrooke Railway and Power Co., and was delivered to the plant at a voltage of 22,000 and transformed to a voltage of 550 and 110 for power and lighting respectively.
