WELLINGTON COUNTY MIRAC E.

FRIDAY, May 19th, 1893.

A much better feeling prevailed on the local stock market this morning, which was aided and sustained by encouraging reports from London and New York. Money was easier, and the tone of all the markets was more satisfactory than has been seen for some time. The outlook for the immediate future is also much better, and accordingly both brokers and speculators were more cheerful. Pacific was the feature of the day's trading, advancing from 76 at the opening to 77 1/2, at which figure it closed.

Gas weakened to 106, and Cable, which sold at 142 during the morning, fell back to 141 at the close, the same as yesterday. Bank of Montreal sold at 223 ex-dividend, and the cotton stocks were stronger.

Money is easier here and in New York, call loans being quoted locally at 6 per cent and in New York at 2 per cent.

The tone of the New York stock market was firm on a better feeling in London. There was no pressure, except on D. C. F., which appeared to be with purpose of buying. A special to Lamontagne, Clarke & Co., on the New York money market, says: Brokers have no confidence that the slightly easier tone in short sterling is permanent and the efflux of gold to London, it is believed, will be continued to a greater or less degree according to the requirements of the mitters, until grain exports are resumed on a more liberal scale.

New York Stocks. Messrs. Lamontagne, Clarke & Co., Temple Building, 183 St. James Street, Montreal, have received the following:

Private wire from New York. A more settled tone in London, backed by fair buying orders by the local operators responsible for present rise, gave prices a further improvement this morning, led by St. Paul, the Burlington (which recovered its dividend of 14 per cent.), Atchison, General Electric and Sugar. Distillers came in for some hard knocks on the suit brought by the Illinois Attorney General to annul its charter. The stock broke at first to 144, but resumed in demand and rapidly recovered the full loss. Western houses were the principal traders in the certificates. At this low level we look for the stock to steady and gradually improve, as the affairs of the two bull leaders has discouraged shorts sales, and in the absence of liquidation, it remains easy work to lift prices.

The buyers are not accumulating very large lines, however, and do not appear bent on so doing, but rather to the contrary. The early afternoon was quiet with prices maintained, but no vigor or snap to trade. Money market responds to good news, fairly well, we think, but is very sensitive and may respond any day to news that might develop still more easily.

Friday, May 19th. The general wheat situation is considerably firmer to-day, and advances were seen both in the Chicago and New York markets.

A special telegram received by a member of the Corn Exchange today, had the following: "Wheat shows firmness on continuation, had crop reports from winter wheat states, especially Kansas, where it is reported a calamity."

Grain freights in New York are slow. Charter reported of 96,000 bush. c.f.o. at 25 1/2 June.

The U. S. Government report on the foreign situation regarding wheat, says: The spring crops are at a standstill and in danger from extreme drought. The winter crops are in fairly good condition, although suffering from drought.

Total exports to-day from all Atlantic ports were: Wheat, 35,000 bush; flour, 54,000 bbls.

The New York market showed up better to-day. June wheat opened unchanged at 77c, but July opened 1/2 better at 78 1/2, while Aug. also opened 1/2 better at 80 1/2, and gradually went up to 80 1/2. Sept. started at 81 1/2 and was quoted 82 1/2 later. December showed a gain of 1/2, July, early opened at 40 1/2, and after several advances and declines, the opening figure was again quoted. Both August and Sept. were stronger.

In Chicago wheat opened steady, chiefly apparently because cables were not as weak as expected. Counselman sold about 100,000 bush. Logan took 1/2. Trade started light; provisions were stronger, on the light hogs; meats, corn and oats steady.

Red winter dropped 1/2 in Liverpool to-day, also 1/2 in London and showed slight declines.

The public cable from Liverpool said: Wheat, steady; demand poor; holders offered moderately. Corn, easy; demand moderate. Receipts, wheat past three days, 101,000 cwt., including 47,000 cwt. (American). Corn, same time, 90,000 cwt.

Canadian peas were quoted 1/4 lower by Beerholm, other grades were also generally lower. The cable said: Cargoes off coast, wheat, very dull; corn, steady; flour, passage and shipment, wheat and corn, rather easier. Mark Lane English and foreign wheat, very slow. The news from crops both foreign and domestic have been exceedingly bullish in tone and in a short time we expect to see the effect of these bad reports. The clique in wheat have been trying, we think, to break wheat down to their present price, 79 1/2, as they have been able to do so often here and buy if they can get the price down again and buy

Friday, May 19th. This is what we are looking for and is the reason for our advising our clients to keep in wheat all the time. We are believers in it, and would buy it freely on all such breaks as the present one, and if we sold any, it would be only a part of our holdings.

The export, from all Atlantic ports, was 500,000 bushels, making a total since April 1st of 2,700,000 bushels, against 6,100,000 bushels last year.

The imports into the United Kingdom last week were equal to 1,430,000 bushels wheat and 192,000 bbls. of flour. These, with the English farmers' deliveries, made a decrease in their visible supply of 390,000 bushels.

Bradstreet's statement on Wednesday, showed for both coast a decrease of 1,186,000 bushels. The visible supply on Monday was a very great disappointment, and was generally expected that decrease of 2,000,000 bushels would be shown, but when it came out showing only 390,000 bushels decrease, everybody was surprised.

The more level-headed men thought there was some error in the statement and we are rather inclined to agree with them, and think the corrected figures will show next week. The total supply of wheat in America, as given by Bradstreet's, is 84,727,000 bushels, and the total foreign supply, 73,144,000 bushels, making a total of 157,871,000 bushels. The shipments of wheat and flour from America, Canada, Russia, India, Australasia and the Argentine to Europe since January 1st are 84,620,000 bushels, against 83,360,000 bushels last year for the same period.
