Lower Canada Agricultural and Industrial EXHIBITION.

To the Public of Lower Canada.

THE BOARD of AGRICULTURE for LOWER CANADA having resolved that the next GRAND PROVINCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION shall be held at QUEBEC, on the 12th, 13th, 14th and 15th of SEPTEMBER, 1854; the Local Committee appointed to carry out the intentions of the Board are desirous of making such decision generally known to the Inhabitants, and more especially to the Agriculturists, Manufacturers and Mechanics of the Province.

The importance of such Exhibitions, as tending to develop the Agricultural and other Industrial resources of the country, and to call forth and keep in active exercise the intellectual energies and practical skill and ingenuity of the Artisan and the Agriculturist, have now become so self-evident, and are so universally acknowledged, that the Committee cannot but rely with hopeful confidence upon the zealous and liberal co-operation of all classes of the Community, in assisting them to realize to their fullest extent, such beneficial results and advantages upon the present occasion.

The Committee are extremely desirous that the forthcoming Exhibition should afford a fair representation of the industry, skill and enterprise of all classes; but in order to attain that object, it is manifestly necessary that their pecuniary resources should be such as to enable them to offer premiums, the number, variety and amount of which shall prove a sufficient inducement to extensive and general competition; in addition, therefore, to the liberal aid which will, it is hoped, be received from the Provincial Government, through the Board of Agriculture, the Committee would respectfully invoke the generous support of the Public, on which so much of the success of their endeavours must depend; and in making this appeal the Committee confidently trust that all persons throughout the Province will so interest themselves in the matter, as to render this Exhibition worthy of the important objects for which it has been undertaken, and, at the same time, worthy of Canada.

The Committee have much satisfaction in being able to state by AUTHORITY that the QUEBEC and RICHMOND section of the GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY will be in OPERATION during the month of AUGUST, an accommodation which will no doubt very materially increase the number of Visitors to the Exhibition from all parts south of the River St. Lawrence, but more especially from the Eastern Townships; many of whose inhabitants have hitherto, from the want of proper means of communication, been prevented from visiting the ancient Capital of Canada.

The Prize lists will shortly be published in the Farmer's Journal, and will also be printed for general circulation, in pamphlet form, in French and English.

From late English papers.

THE WAR IN THE EAST.

AN ENGLISH WAR STEAMER, the Varna, on the 30th—Sir George Brown has returned in the Fury, in which vessel he entered the harbour of Sebastopol in the night, and remained till day. The Fury was fired at, both with shot and shell, but she suffered no damage. Sir George Brown is supposed to have advised immediate action, and orders were, in consequence, at once despatched which have occasioned the movements of the transports. Varna is quite full of vessels; they are wedged together in hundreds. Cholera was subsiding in the English camp; the deaths do not exceed six daily. Preparations are being made for an immediate advance of the allied troops. Vessels from Varna are subjected to a quarantine of five days at Constantinople.

EXPEdition of the CRIMEA CONFIRMED.—The last despatches received in Paris from Constantinople fully confirm the fact of the expedition to the Crimea, which had already left Beltschik.

RETREAT of the RUSSIANS.—On the 1st of August the Russians retired from Bucharest, after having broken up the road between that city and Galatz. The Russian army is in a retreat to Bucharest, requiring lodging and provisions for 12,000 men inside the city, and rations for 20,000 outside the walls. Before leaving Bucharest Prince Gortschakoff assembled the Boyards and thanked them for the manner in which they had treated the Russian troops during their stay in Bucharest. The General added, that strategic reasons induced him to quit the city, but that it was not improbable he might return at an early period.

BUCHAREST, July 14.—On leaving Ouraitchen, several Russian corps marched upon Ibratia, for which point the corps of General Luder was already on the march. The artillery and engineering material and baggage followed the beaten routes. The rest of the army marched across the steppes. Besides the epidemic, which severely attacked the men, the horses were affected with an epizootic disease. Between Ouraitchen and Ohleschtz 21 villages had been converted into hospitals.

SAILING of the TURKISH FLEET.—"CONSTANTINOPLE," July 30.—The Turkish Fleet has sailed for Varna with the pontoons and all the transports. Salina is burnt.

OFFICIAL NOTIFICATION of the EVACUATION of the PRINCIPALITIES.—The Russian Envoy has announced to the Cabinet of Vienna that the Emperor Nicholas has just ordered the complete evacuation of the Principalities of Wallachia and of Moldavia. Notwithstanding this declaration Count Buel exchanged notes with Baron Bourquency and Lord Westmoreland on the 8th instant, from which it results that Austria agrees with England as to the measures to be required from Russia, in order to preclude the return of the complications which have troubled the repose of Europe, and engages not to treat with Russia, unless she obtains these guarantees, until the re-establishment of general peace.

Private telegraphic advices from Berlin, based on authentic information, state that it is the intended situation of the Crimea and the other maritime provinces of southern Russia, and that along with this has induced the Czar to withdraw his troops from the Principalities. The Russian regiments in Bessarabia and Kloron are to move in all possible haste to the Crimea, while those in Moldavia march to occupy their places. The greater part of General Ouskakoff's division had crossed the Pruth on the 4th.

In reference to this announcement the London Times makes the following observations:—The declaration which has recently been made by the Russian minister at Vienna expresses all doubt as to the fact that the Russian army is proceeding to evacuate Moldavia as well as Wallachia, with the least possible delay; and that, as we hinted yesterday, the first of the just demands of Turkey and the Allied Powers will speedily be obtained by the surrender of that "material guarantee" which the Emperor Nicholas is unable to hold.

Had this concession been made some months ago in obedience to the summons of the Western Powers, it would have removed the principal cause of the war, and Russia would have escaped that series of failures and reverses which have now equally compromised the reputation of her policy and the lustre of her arms. But at the present moment, and in the present state of affairs, there can be no doubt that the retreat of the Russians behind the Pruth is an inadequate satisfaction for the exigent Powers—(1) it affords no sufficient basis for the negotiation of peace, and that it gives no security for the future.

That these are the opinions of the British and French governments are already well known from the language of her Majesty's Ministers in Parliament, but an official declaration published by the *Monitor* of yesterday enables us to add with certainty that the Austrian Government has formally, and since the evacuation of the Principalities has been effected, expressed its concurrence in the views entertained by France and England as to the conditions on which alone peace can be restored. Diplomatic notes, constituting a preliminary engagement to this effect, were exchanged between the Austrian, British, and French Ministers on the 5th inst., and the Cabinet of Vienna further announced its determination not to treat separately with the Cabinet of St. Petersburg until those guarantees for the future shall have been obtained which are regarded as indispensable by the three Powers. The Allied Governments have wisely resisted the pressure applied by unwise adherents or by unfair opponents to extort from them a declaration of the conditions on which they conceive that peace may hereafter be made. The only answer to be given to such questions is, that the conditions of peace depend upon the fortune of war, and must be regulated by successes or defeats, over which no human power can pretend to exercise an absolute control. But, without attempting to describe with precision the terms on which peace may be
