SIX YEARS IN PRISON. INTEREST IN MRS. MAYBRICK AGAIN REVIVED. Convicted of Murdering Her Husband by Administering Arsenic—Her Unhappy Married Life—Her Trial and Sentence—Persistent Efforts in Her Behalf.

THE ANNOUNCEMENT THAT MRS. FLORENCE MAYBRICK was to be released from the prison in Essex and where she is serving a life sentence created a great interest in the United States.

MRS. MAYBRICK is the daughter of a Mobile banker (deceased), and the grandchild of Justice Campbell of the United States Supreme Court. She was highly educated, beautiful and accomplished.

FOUR CHILDREN were born, and then the young wife and mother died. Her husband was making another woman a regular allowance. At this juncture Mrs. Maybrick made the acquaintance of a young man, who was from his sympathy and advice, but there was not a particle of evidence that their relations were of an immoral character.

IN MARCH, 1880, there was a violent quarrel between Mrs. Maybrick and her husband, which time he made a violent assault upon her. She consulted a lawyer and decided upon a separation, but there was a reconciliation. He was continually drinking and in April, 1880, made a will unfavorable to her.

SHORTLY BEFORE HIS DEATH Mr. Maybrick received by post a bottle of medicine which he had bought from a chemist, and which was bought by a female servant. The following day he became ill, but he got up, attended a horse race, and died with a friend.
