TEN TAXPAYERS PAY LESS

Reddy Hospital Given High Rate By U.S. College

The Reddy Memorial Hospital—only hospital in the Montreal area to have a medical record micro-filing system—has received a 100 per cent rating from the American College of Surgeons for the quality of its work in the record room, it is announced.

The announcement was made on the opening day of the Reddy Memorial's 1953 annual fund campaign to raise \$200,000 in the next two weeks to offset a 1952 operating deficit and provide funds for much-needed capital equipment.

Foremost among the many advantages of the new technique of photographing medical records in miniature is the saving of valuable consulting time for the attending physician.

As a space saver, it is as versatile as the cupboard room in a modern apartment. As many as 10,000 record films may be stored in a steel filing cabinet, three feet, six inches by 18 inches in dimension, fireproof and containing a special humidifier to prevent deterioration and to preserve the records permanently.

Space Saver

Under the previous system of storing bulky charts and folders, the space needed was so great that the records had to be placed in a vault.

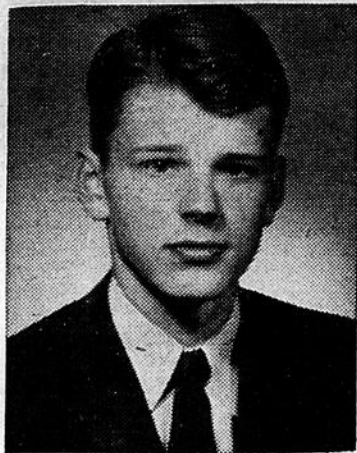
Yet another advantage of micro-filing medical records is that the films in the record room are easily accessible at all times, Miss J. Brockington, the medical record librarian, explained.

"The envelopes containing the films are plainly stamped with the case number and filed numerically," she said.

"The individual strips of film are placed in the compact viewing box, located at the side of the filing cabinet, and a whole case history can be viewed in minutes."

An alphabetical card index system, contained in an adjoining steel cabinet, is synchronized with the medical record system. Bearing the case number, the index card makes

Protests Upheld By City Council

Ten happy taxpayers of Westmount have been notified by A. W. D. Swan, secretary-treasurer, that their appeals against their assessments have been accepted by the city councillors.

The council Monday studied 20 appeals.

Of 11 applications for a reduction in annual rental values, the basis for water tax, eight were accepted and three were rejected.

Of nine applications for a reduction in capital valuation set by the assessors on buildings and land, seven were rejected while two were granted reductions.

\$71,271,800 Total

Mr. Swan yesterday said that the council had approved its 1953-54 valuation roll at \$71,271,800 the highest since 1933 when the figure stood at \$71,809,655.

Last year's roll was \$69,932,000 and in 1951 the figure was \$67,356,200.

The valuation roll represents the assessed capital value of all buildings and land in the municipality which is prepared for tax purposes by a group of assessors and approved or rejected by the city council.

Within the next two months the members of council will set a tax rate based on the estimated revenues and expenditures of the city.

Despite Dollar Exchange Problem Canada - New Zealand Trade High

Even though expansion of trade with Canada at present is hindered by dollar exchange problems, New Zealand imported nearly \$19 million worth of commodities from Canada last year, N.S. Mountain, New Zealand Trade Commissioner to Canada, told a meeting of the Westmount Rotary Club Wednesday.

Canada has long been a traditional source for many of New Zealand's requirements, the chief ones being paper, asbestos, copper and aluminum products, automotive spares, lumber and various types of machinery.

"With the rapid development of secondary industries in New Zealand and its complete dependency on overseas sources for raw material requirements, there is an ever increasing demand for additional supplies of those materials with which Canada is so richly endowed," he continued.

"To meet this demand, New Zealand must, of necessity, increase her dollar earnings and, with her low cost structure, and the incidence of the height of her primary production season coinciding with the winter months, New Zealand appears ideally situated to meet the increasing demand for dairy and meat products resulting from Canada's rapidly expanding economy," he said.

Speaking on sports in the country, Mr. Mountain said that rugby, racing and wrestling were the three largest. The ambition of every New Zealander, whether Maori or Pakeha, is to become an "All black," the name given to members of the New Zealand representative rugby team.

"Racing is carried on throughout the year and there are few centers in New Zealand without their own race course. Wrestling enjoys universal popularity and

fans of all ages and both sexes are to be found in New Zealand.

"Although New Zealand has no indigenous animals, deer, pigs, rabbits, hare, pheasant and quail have been imported and provide excellent sport for a weekend hunting trip and while there is a definite season for pheasant, duck and swan, the rest can be had any time. In addition New Zealand has some of the finest fishing in the world, ranging from swordfish and striped marlin and marko shark in the waters around the Bay of Islands in the extreme north, to salmon in the Rangitata in the south island.

"For those who prefer fly fishing, brown and rainbow trout are plentiful in the rivers and lake of both islands," he said.

In dealing with the geography of the land, Mr. Mountain said that New Zealand existed, in rough proportions, of one-third sown pasture and crops, one-third in marginal land used for run stock and commercial afforestation and third almost useless for farming because of its mountainous nature.

"The quality of the land varies throughout the country and because they are largely pastoral, farms tend to become bigger holdings than in other countries. In contrast with Canadian conditions, grass grows almost constantly throughout the year, livestock winter in the open, and the average farm carries one cow or six sheep to two acres."

He concluded by drawing a mental picture of New Zealand that described the country as a "small evergreen fertile land, extremely high in productive potential, enjoying a high standard of living, free from racial problems, with virtually no unemployment, a sportsman's paradise, populated by a race of people of two totally distinct origins.

Elements Refuse To Cooperate For Westmount's 9th Star Night

There was a moon over Westmount Wednesday night — but a low overcast made it difficult for members of the Royal Astronomical Society, their friends and acquaintances, to see it.

However, the annual star-gazing night was a great success despite the refusal of the heavenly bodies to co-operate.

The ninth annual star night at Westmount Park drew a crowd of more than 500 and 20 telescopes were trained in vain on the heavens.

So instead of seeing the stars perform, the guests of the society watched three movies on astronomy provided on an outdoor screen.

Henry F. Hall, dean of Sir George Williams College, and secretary of the Montreal centre of the society, conducted a question and answer period. Frank J. DeKinder conducted the restricted observation program and Dr. D. E. Douglas was master of ceremonies.

One of the items of interest to the guests was the fact that some of the 20 telescopes were made by their owners — but many of the children in attendance were somewhat disappointed to see murk when they looked through the business end of the contraptions.

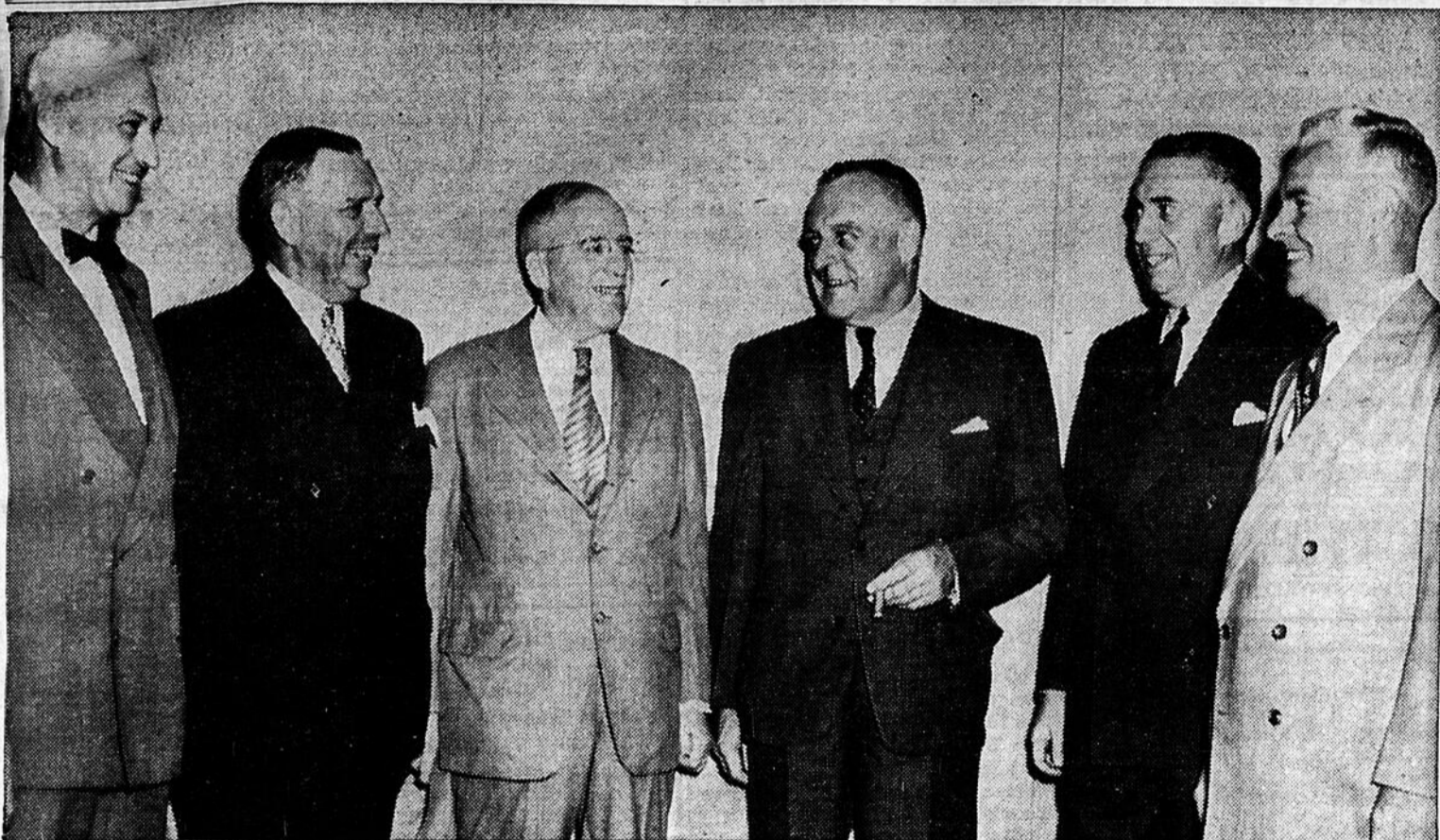

It is easier to locate the required films under their numerical filing. Among details the records contain can be found anything from the number of admissions and types of cases treated to the number of operations, births and deaths and government statistics.

To facilitate the work of the doctor or the surgeon and to save precious time, there is also a cross indexing of diseases.

\$200,000 Objective
The Reddy Memorial Hospital is seeking \$200,000 in the next two weeks to meet a 1952 operating deficit of \$115,000 and funds for urgently needed capital equipment totalling \$85,000.

The deficit was caused by the large amount of free or less than cost care provided by the Reddy Memorial during the year in its various departments.

The campaign, which opens today and will continue until September 28, needs the support of all Montrealers if it is to succeed, A. E. Cadman, chairman of the 1953 Reddy Memorial drive said.

"Our policy of never refusing to aid a person in medical need during the past 81 years, whether he or she could afford to pay all costs, only part or not at all, requires the financial assistance of the citizens of the Montreal area if this priceless work of mercy is to be continued," Mr. Cadman said.

"If we reach our 1953 objective of \$200,000 the Reddy Memorial Hospital will be able to save \$40,000 per year in operating expenses. This, in itself, is an objective worthy of being attained, and well worth the purpose behind every donation, large or small, we receive."

Blessing In Disguise

French Strike May Hammer Home Dangers of Inflation

The recently-ended French general strike, generally regarded as economic disaster, may prove to be blessing in disguise. Events may yet serve to hammer home the fact that when a government allows inflation to penetrate every segment of the economy by acceding to demands of every pressure group for public spending, only chaos, hardship and distress can follow.

Successive French governments since end of World War II have done little but surrender to the demands of industry, labor and agriculture for bigger handouts. Subsidies to exporters and alcohol distillers alone take nine per cent of national budget; 26 per cent more goes for government investment in all sorts of both nationalized and private industry. French nationalized industries, including railways, electricity, gas, coal mines, merchant marine and a host of other enter-

prises employ more than 20 per cent of country's non-agricultural labor force.

The social security program, consuming 12 per cent of France's budget expenditure, has further aggravated the inflation which brought the country to the edge of bankruptcy.

The policy of Premier Laniel's government has been to arrest plunge towards national ruin through the curbing of excessive public spending, encouragement of greater freedom of competition and increasing output and productivity.

The deflation policies of the Laniel regime, essential if France is to survive, have been attacked most vigorously by organized labor which, in France as elsewhere, favors continuing doses of inflation.

On The Cuff

Canadian Buying Goods Mostly On Installment Basis

Canada's prosperity, much discussed during election campaign, seems to be largely on the cuff. The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports that in the first three months of the current year, cash sales in Canadian department stores were up 1.5 per cent from corresponding period of 1952. Charge sales were up 2.9 per cent, and installment sales 93.2 per cent.

Dollar figures are revealing. Cash sales in department stores came to \$132 million in first quarter of 1953; charge and installment sales of \$71 million. In other words, more than a third of all merchandise bought was charged against future income.

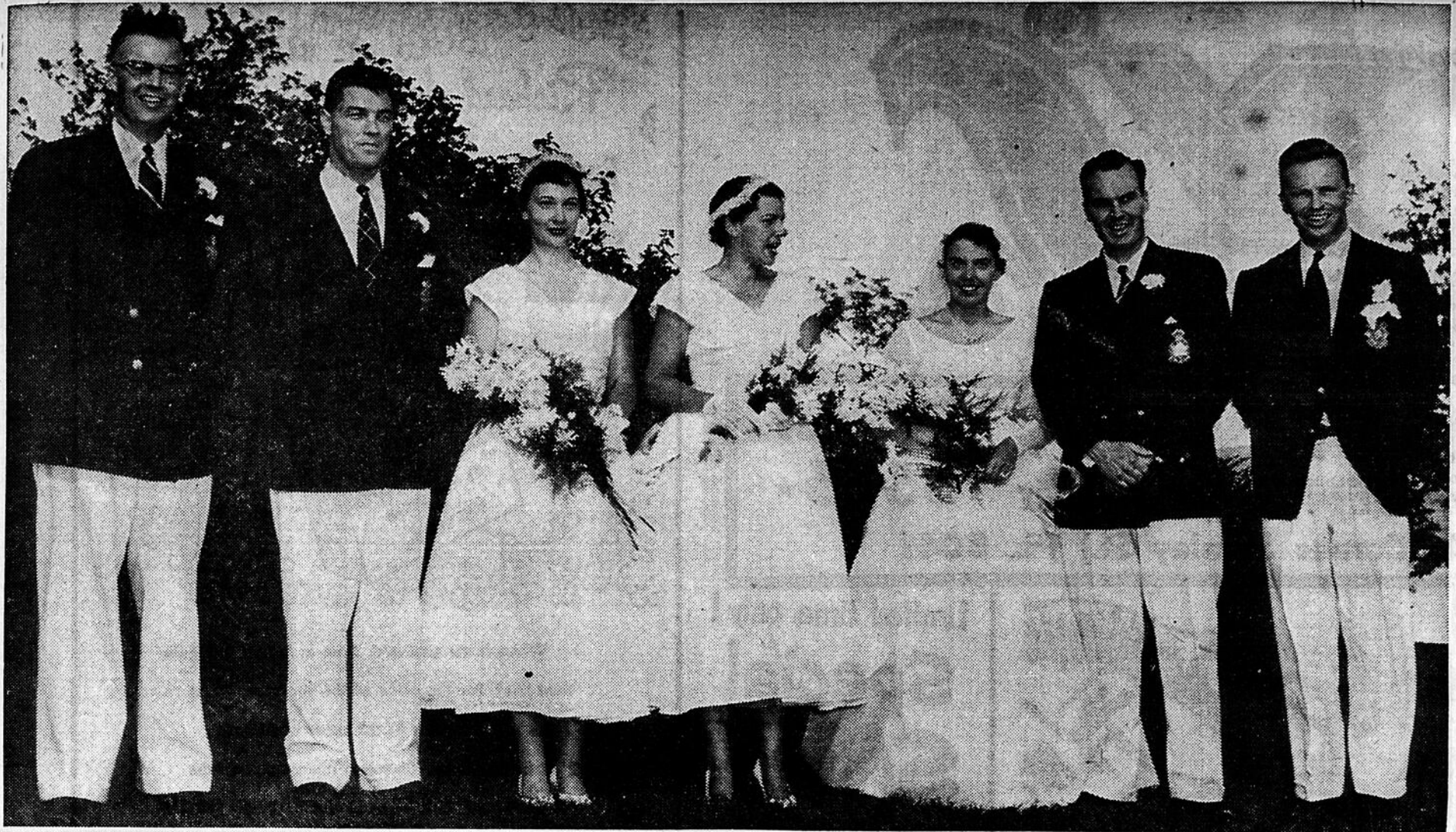

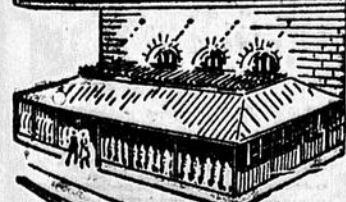

401 Squadron To Take Part

Members of Westmount's 401 Reserve Squadron will play an important role in Air Force events here over the weekend.

In the fly pass 6 Vampires will be led by WC. H. J. Everard and 9 Harvards by SL. T. W. Dowbiggin.

In addition the 401 Pipe Band will lead three bands participating in ceremonies at half time at the McGill-U.B.C. Paraplegic Bowl rugby game at Molson Stadium.

'Packet' Freighter Carries Paratroops Or Stretcher Cases

One of the latest aircraft types to be flown by the RCAF is the C-119 "Packet". This huge twin-engined, twin-boomed freighter and para-dropping aircraft is capable of carrying more than 64 fully loaded para-troops or 35 stretcher cases and four attendants.

It can carry up to 13,000 lbs. for 1700 miles at a normal cruising speed of 200 mph. Already two RCAF transport squadrons are using the Packets, No. 435 squadron at Edmonton and 436 squadron at Lachine, P.Q.

The RCAF is using the C-119 to replace the work-horse of all air forces the Dakota C-47. The Packet can carry a larger and for bulkier load as well as twice the number of para-troops, than can the Dakota. Its rear opening doors permit lengthy or bulky loads to be loaded with a minimum of time and effort. It has a wing span of 109 feet with an overall length of 85 feet and a height of 26 feet.

Benevolent Fund Of R.C.A.F. Sets Service Record

Some 200 field committees, all voluntary, have now been established by the R.C.A.F. Benevolent Fund to receive applications from those requiring help. Their job is to investigate the requests and then forward them to the head office in Ottawa with their recommendation. They are adjudicated upon daily by the central claims committee and the decisions advised direct to the committees from which they originated.

A number of these committees, largely based upon the population in the areas served, are provided with imprest accounts which enable them to render immediate relief where this is considered necessary, reporting same to the head office.

The main object in granting assistance is to re-establish to family concerned by relieving it of unforeseen difficulties that do and can arise in all families. In considering problems, the first object of the fund is to see that the applicant is receiving the assistance to which he may be entitled through DVA and so forth.

In order to assist student veterans the fund has set up a University Loan Fund with special committees at nearly all the Canadian universities. This fund comes into operation in cases where students, through sickness or some other unavoidable misfortune, have failed in their year at the university and consequently have to repeat the year at their own expense before they can be reinstated under DVA.

Modern Aircraft, Truck Rodeo, To Be Featured In Day-Long Show

A mammoth air show will be staged by the RCAF on Saturday at Dorval to mark Air Force Day across Canada.

The field will be thrown open to the public, who will have an opportunity to see Canada's most modern military aircraft on the ground and in the air.

The gates will open at 1:30 p.m. and close at approximately 5:00 p.m. RCAF detachments from Lachine and St. Hubert, as well as Auxiliary squadrons, will take part in the show. An extensive program has been arranged as follows:-

Willey was even with Clark in their singles match when he pulled an arm muscle in the third game of the first set. After the match, he couldn't even carry his tennis raquets, but still made the local papers cut this fact out of the tennis stories.

Along with Willey, he forms one of the brighter spots on the horizon of Canadian tennis.

The last day's matches against the United States drew 385 people to the Mount Royal Tennis Club, whose plush galleries are capable of seating 2910. If the site of the Cup ties is moved, it will be very understandable in view of these circumstances.

The teams will play Canadian rules except that unlimited blocking will be allowed. Coach Vic Obeck of the Redmen has not drilled his boys in any special plays to take advantage of this however, as he has seven other games to worry about, all under full Canadian rules. This exception was injected as UBC up to now have played only under the American code. The game will give Obeck a good indication as to how his team shapes up for their intercollegiate opener against McMaster Marauders the following week.

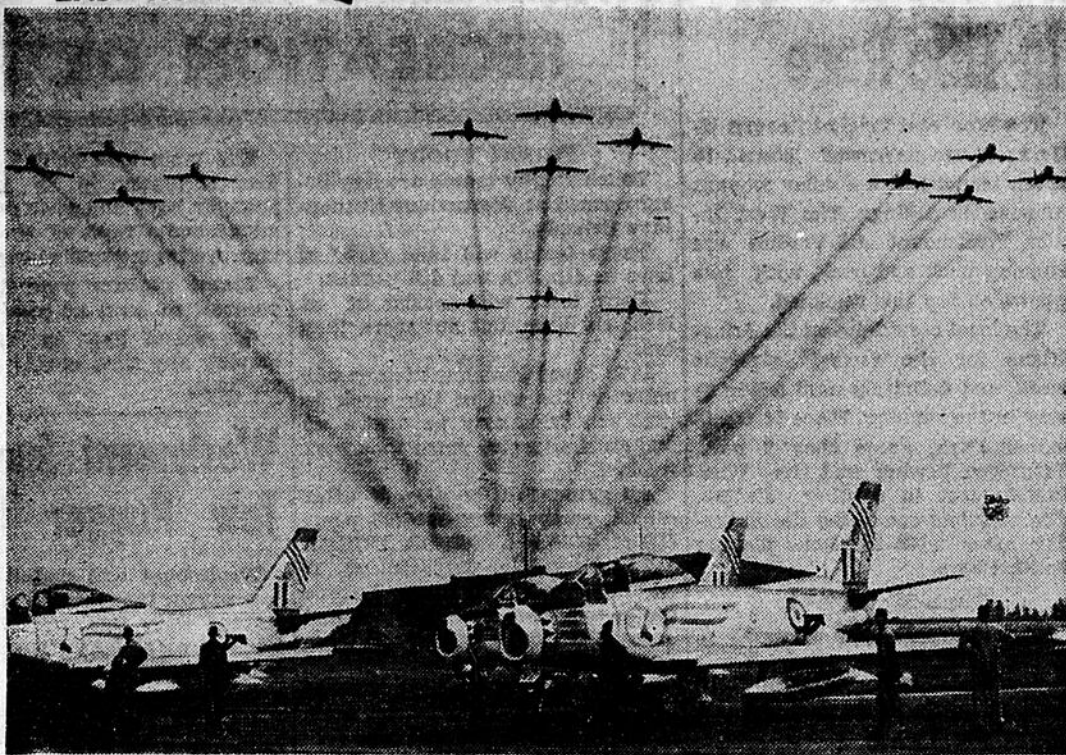
