TWO CONSTITUTIONS COMPARED. Yesterday, the second of December, witnessed, in Washington, the opening of the first session of the fifty-fourth Congress of the United States.

THE CROWN LANDS DEPARTMENT. The latest edition of the 1894-95 report of the Honorable Commissioner of Crown Lands of the Province of Quebec, containing the maps by Mr. H. O'SULLIVAN of the newly surveyed branches of the Notaw river, explored by him, has just been distributed.

Two very important facts in connection with the new era of magazines are illustrated in the December "Chronicle." Probably no stronger array of fiction has ever been presented in any magazine—money could not buy better. Moreover, the cost of the artist and authors who appear is divided among 400,000 copies, bringing the cost per copy proportionally low. The "Chronicle" thinks that the best magazine, bringing, as it does, the best art and literature into all classes, is an educational movement second in importance only to that of the public schools.

It is gratifying to learn from the report that the number of game licenses issued to American sportsmen was larger in 1894-5 than for any previous year, and the Province may rest assured that only a proper system of fish and game protection is necessary to a still very much greater increase in the number of monied men who will spend their vacation season in the Lake St. John, St. Maurice, Ottawa and Temiscouata regions. In this connection it is gratifying, too, to learn of the good results expected from the establishment of the Laurentides National Park, and that there is reason to believe that next year, when the organization of the park is completed, fishermen and sportsmen will resort there, and the Department will begin to receive a revenue from this source in the shape of game and fishing licenses, which will probably suffice to pay its expenses. There is a great deal of interesting information in the report respecting mines, but this must form the subject of a subsequent article. It may be here remarked, however, that the Hon. Mr. FLYNN has good reason to be proud of the admirable result of his administration of his important Department during the fiscal year 1894-95.

the country to govern its affairs. In the meantime, the Government has been carried on by the former members and by a President and Ministers whose views, principles and policy, have been so energetically repudiated by the people. The worst of it is that, even now, and for another year, public opinion and Congress cannot be brought into harmony. The three great representative units, as created by the Constitution, are wide apart. The President is of one mind, the House of Representatives, of another, the Senate, of a third. In the United States, the members of the House of Representatives are elected every two years. Those of the fifty-fourth Congress were chosen in November last year. But the members of the American Senate are selected by the State Legislatures, for a term of six years. The elections of the Senators alternate every two years, a third of the total number being chosen at each biennial election. Last year, the revulsion of public feeling, operating on the broad areas of the electoral struggle over the entire territory of the States, was more than sufficiently strong to substitute a powerful Republican majority to the Democratic one in the House of Representatives. But it could not have the same result for the Senate, whose membership was only submitted for a third to the crucial test of an election by State Legislatures. Though increased in number, the Republicans were still left in a minority in the Senate. It was not until the next fifteen months, the Executive and Legislative authorities of the Republic, the President, his Ministers, and Congress, were rival in their efforts to check the progress of the Democratic course. The natural consequence will inevitably be that those great instruments of power, the Presidency and Congress, will continue, till March, 1897, the abortive existence which they have led since the re-election of Mr. Cleveland, three years ago.
