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THE FARM.

Value of Clover.

The roots of a well set acre of clover are said to contain 185 pounds of nitrogen, 240 pounds of lime, 45 pounds of magnesia, 75 pounds of potash, 19 pounds of soda, 14 pounds of sulphur, and 70 pounds of phosphoric acid.

Cure of Pastures.

The pasture is almost always the most neglected part of the farm, and partly for the reason that the farmer does not see it, the land will still not be so productive as in some other crop.

Cure of Farm Tools.

Axes, shovels, ploughs and other implements need not for use this winter, should be cleaned by scouring, or, if rusty, by vigorous rubbing with kerosene oil.

Color in Shepherds.

There is a prejudice, and really it is nothing more, against the color of the sheep, and it may be well to humiliate this fancy, as it pays; but farmers who grow stock for the market can often get animals of unfashionable color at prices so reasonable as to make it an object.

Lime and Salt as Fertilizers.

Western farmers are now becoming interested in the use of lime and salt as fertilizers. This mixture had quite a run in some localities last year, especially as a manure for wheat.

Warm Quarters for Stock.

With the beginning of cold weather fattening stock need warmer quarters or they will gain slowly. Hogs, if fattened sufficiently, may now be more profitably killed than kept to a later period.

Apple Pomace.

Apple pomace kills vegetation where it is applied, but by composting it, adding plenty of lime to neutralize the acid it contains, it makes very good top-dressing for grass.

Storing Roots.

All kinds of roots keep better in cellars if slightly covered with dry earth. This is especially true of turnips, which, unless so covered, soon become stringy and nearly worthless.

Underdrainage.

When the ground is in good shape for digging, making underdrains may be continued until late in the fall or in open weather during the winter.

Decayed Potatoes.

Partially rotten potatoes are not good for much cows. They are unwholesome, they impart a disagreeable flavor to the milk and injure the stringy and also that of the butter made from it.

Management of Swine.

When pigs are fed plentifully with soft corn, as is common at this season, it sours on their stomachs, and charcoal should be given as a corrective. It will be greedily eaten, and will enable the pigs to dispose of more corn and with better prospect of gain.

Impure Drinking Water.

Some Minnesota farmers have lost cattle by poisoning from drinking the waters of a lake which is covered with a greenish scum. This covering is a fungus plant found in Europe and that has proved poisonous to stock drinking water containing it.
