Dominion Parliament. MINISTER OF INTERIOR STRONGLY DEFENDS DEPARTMENT Immigration to Canada Will be Looked After by Canadian Inspectors—Ottawa Valley Railway Bill Thrown Out.

Ottawa, July 14.—Parliament heard of the resignation of a minister today. The announcement was made in both Houses. It came first in the Senate, when Hon. Mr. Scott, in reply to the leader of the Opposition then said: "I have to announce that Hon. Mr. Blair has resigned his portfolio."

When he did get possession of the floor his performance was brief and pointed. Without preliminaries he said: "I have to announce that Hon. Mr. Blair has resigned his portfolio and his seat in the Cabinet and that the Governor-General, having been made acquainted with the facts he has pleased to accept the resignation. The ministerial explanation will be made later, probably on Thursday."

AN ANNUAL CRITICISM. One of the annual events of the year is the criticism of the immigration policy. Mr. Wilson has been heard on this matter in hand for several years, he undertook the task again today. The government is not in the opinion of Mr. Wilson, exercising sufficient care in examining diseased and undesirable immigrants. He held up the United States as a model in this respect.

United States officials said foreigners excluded from the United States, made an effort to get by first settling in Canada. This is the regular route of the diseased foreigner who wanted to get into the United States. The result was that many of these persons remained in Canada. Mr. Watcson, an American official said his men were kept busy turning back the undesirable immigrants. In 1896 there were 6,042 immigrants for the United States, passed through Canada. Last season the number had increased to 61,906. The increase showed that the foreign agents thought of the ease of working the Canadian railway. The American inspector at Quebec, Dr. Billings, detained fifty-four immigrants as unfit for entrance to the United States. Seven men died and two escaped because of inadequate detention facilities.

MR. WILSON LAYS CHARGES. Mr. Wilson objects to the agent method of getting immigrants. He said the commission paying system in his opinion is bad. He charged general extravagance in the administration of the immigration department. Dr. Roche, of Halifax, said he had the best possible opportunities for examining himself with the condition of immigrants when he landed at Halifax where most of the Galicians first touched shore, he saw every man, woman and child before they landed from the ship. It was impossible, under the present Canadian regulation, for the country to be invaded by anything like the number of undesirable Mr. Wilson stated were found here. Canadian official vigilance was well known in Hamburg and German doctors declined to permit any physically unfit immigrants to go on board ship. The chief reason they knew that they would only be returned at the expense of a little political assage. He asked that the bill be referred back to committee for more discussion. He declared the committee had been directed this morning by the Hon. Mr. Prefontaine and that gentleman was influenced by personal prejudice against Mr. Armstrong. NO FAITH IN PORTE'S PROMISES. Macedonian Bulgarians Want Nothing Less than Autonomous Government. (Special to The Montreal Herald.) Sofia, July 13.—The Turkish commissaire has informed the Bulgarian Government that the Porte has decided to dismiss some of the troops in the European provinces of Turkey, restore the rights of the Bulgarian provinces which the Bulgarians enjoyed before the rebellion, and allow the Bulgarian population to participate in all branches of the administrative rights. The Macedonian Bulgarians maintain that they will cease the rebellion only when they see the application of the Berlin Treaty in its entirety, prescribing autonomous government.

ONTARIO LOST IN APPEAL

Wall Street is all agog over the rumor that J. D. Rockefeller is trying to break J. P. Morgan. The statement is true, according to the steady and mysterious decline in Stock Exchange values.

Walter Wellman writes from New York to the Chicago-Record Herald. I am told by a man who is in position to know what he speaks that Mr. Rockefeller has never approved of Morgan's promotion enterprises.

But this is quite a different thing from a desire on Mr. Rockefeller's part to "break" Mr. Morgan, and this part of the story will be dismissed for want of both evidence and inherent probability.

ANOTHER BREAK IN STOCKS; WALL ST. ATTACKS C.P.R. ON A CIRCULAR PREDICTING \$90 FOR IT

Local stocks broke again this morning, with Pacific, Twins, Coal and Powder the leaders in point of weakness.

The volume of trading was greater than it was yesterday, but apart from the liquidation there was no particular character to it and a good many of the transactions were again chalked up to the credit of the room traders.

Wall Street prices being off still further, local brokers are more convinced than ever that there are some factors at work down there that the general public knows nothing about.

Some are of the belief that there is a strong gambling party out after Mr. J. P. Morgan, and that they will make it hot for him before they are through.

However, a multitude of rumors are about and it is difficult to discriminate between them.

Respecting the decline in Pacific a local broker re-arranged Wall Street about it this morning and got the following reply:

The stock does not act as if it were heavily overvalued, and again the object of a circular by a prominent banker, who predicts that it will sell at 90.00.

It is the circular in question, C. P. R. stock is quoted at an abnormally high price. It should not sell any higher than stocks like Northern Securities, S. R. pfd. or Atchafalyp pfd.

C. P. R. ought to talk with confidence and they will. Railroad experts consider \$90 a very fair price for it.

Low prices here this morning were: Pacific, 118 1/2; Coal, 82 1/2; Powder, 76 1/2; Twins, 55; Richardson, 54; Toronto, 35 1/2.

The sharp rally in prices at London at 2 p.m. and the aid of support in the New York market at the opening prices prevented anything like utter demoralization.

L. J. Forget & Co.'s London cable quoted Grand Trunk first at 112 1/2, second at 98 1/2, third at 49 1/2; Canadian Pacific at 123 1/2; Amoco at 4 1/2; and Hudson Bay at 3 1/2.

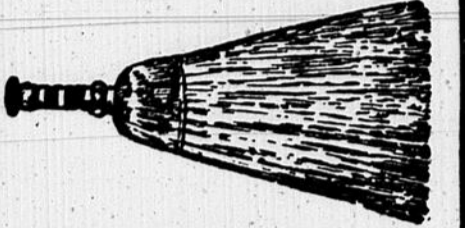
