Daylight Saving

ANNUAL CONFUSION AT HAND

The annual battle of the clocks, which brings broad smiles to the faces of city-dwellers and adds a frown to that of the farmers, got under way at 2 a.m. Sunday.

Known officially as Daylight Saving Time, but called sundry unmentionables by farmers whose cows can't or won't get used to being milked an hour earlier, the clock-switching will, if it lives up to the experiences of previous years, result in a lot of downright confusion.

There's really nothing to cause all the confusion. All you do is move the hands of your clocks and watches forward one hour and life goes the same as before—or nearly the same.

The obvious difference, of course, will show up in households where all members, alert to the necessity of changing the clock, do so on their own, without consulting the other members of the family.

For the railways, life will go on just as it has before. The railways remain on standard time and maintain that they are right and everybody else is out of step. Railway employees will find life somewhat different since they work at the hours set by their bosses and they'll be moving around an hour later than the rest of us. Or is it an hour earlier?

New railway timetables were effective Sunday, all on standard time with the exception of local runs such as to Hamilton and Owen Sound, where schedules have been changed to fit in with the localities they serve.

Life goes on just the same for TTC and Gray Coach Lines, except that street cars operate an hour longer Sunday morning to take care of those who get sandwiched by the time change. Gray Coach buses will operate on the new time.

While the change in time can easily become a favorite indoor sport for those who have only a few clocks and watches to worry about, at least two men in Toronto will have just cause for joining the farmers in their opposition to the change.

They are E. Lynch and W. J. Wathen of Toronto's property department, who started about midnight Saturday to take care of the 12 big clocks in as many towers scattered throughout the city. They had to beat the 2 a.m. deadline and be reasonably sure of finishing the job by 8 a.m. Sunday.

In past years it has taken about half an hour to change the little clocks in the firehall towers, but the city hall clock and the one in St. James' Cathedral ran close to the 90-minute mark by the time they climbed the towers, wrestled with machinery to turn the clocks ahead and then spent about an hour adjusting the machinery so the chimes would catch up to the new time.

The Toronto area is a daylight saving blanket, with residents of all communities given an equal opportunity of being an hour early or an hour late for church or other Sunday engagements. The blanket extends as far west as Windsor, whose council, in their wisdom, have decided to remain on standard time and let their neighbors be confused.

First province to leap out of the standard time fold was New Brunswick, followed by Quebec. Prince Edward Island and Alberta forbid any changes. Daylight time is province-wide in British Columbia under a government order based on a 1952 plebiscite, favoring putting the clock ahead.

There seems to be little agreement as to who should go down in history as the father of daylight saving.

The desire to save candles is given as the reason that motivated Benjamin Franklin when he introduced the idea in England more than 150 years ago. Franklin reasoned that if all work started an hour earlier there would be a great saving in lighting and accordingly less candles would be burned.

There's no official record of the reaction to Franklin's idea or how long it survived, but the modern age of daylight saving appears to have had its birth in the mind of William Willett, an architect or builder in Chelsea, England.

It seems the idea came to Mr. Willett as he walked to work one sunny summer morning in 1907 and thought of the waste of the bright and early hours, while daylight ended all too soon at the end of the day. His theory became fact in 1916, when Britain introduced daylight saving as a wartime measure, but Mr. Willett was not around to test public enthusiasm or otherwise. He passed away in 1915.

Who gets the nod as the first exponent of daylight saving in Canada seems to be a matter of taking your choice.

One authority has it that John F. Hewitson, a Port Arthur construction man and an enthusiastic sports supporter came up with the idea in 1904. Others credit the late Judge E. N. Lewis, of Goderich, Conservative

Paul Bunyan

With our local sawmills now in full swing, here are a few tall stories about Paul Bunyan.

Paul is the patron saint of all woodsmen and lovers of outdoors. America's legendary hero.

Paul's parents used an old lumber wagon for a baby carriage. His feet dangled over the end of the wagon, tearing up the roads. In school Paul used a slab of lime stone for a slate and a big white pine tree for a pencil. The teacher's inability to read Paul's huge script discouraged him and he decided to become a logger.

The 10,000 lakes in this state are the footprints of Paul's gigantic Blue Ox, Babe, who measured forty-two ax handles wide between the eyes. He hauled a whole section, 640 acres of timber at one time. Paul then would cut the timber and Babe would haul another section. Everytime Babe was to be shod, Paul opened a new iron mine. Babe ate in one day as much food as one crew could tote to camp in six months.

One extremely cold winter, baseball submerged even the tall-blue snow-flakes as big as a est trees. Paul had to tie a red stag jacket on Babe, his color being exactly like the snow. So cold it was that Paul's coffee pot froze solid to the back of the stove. When the blue snow melted Babe's footprints were filled with blue water. Then Paul called his playground, "The Land of Sky Blue Water."

Johnny Inkslinger, Paul's book-keeper, was about his size. He was a whiz at figures and efficiency. His fountain pen was connected by a hose to a barrel of ink. By not dotting "i's" and crossing "t's" he saved nine barrels of ink on the payroll alone

member for West Huron, who introduced his Daylight Time bill in 1909. All he got for his trouble was laughter from his fellow members and the plan was pigeonholed with a special committee.

Strictly speaking, Mr. Hewitson's suggestion wasn't known as daylight saving, but it served the same purpose, locally. Since Port Arthur was in the Central Time zone, why not have the city adopt Eastern Time for the summer giving it an hour longer daylight than its neighbors?

The suggestion was picked up in 1906 by Port Arthur's council, which passed a bylaw putting the city on the new time for the summer months. The next year Fort William followed suit and the experiment of lengthening the days proved to be so acceptable both Port Arthur and Fort William adopted and moved over into the Eastern Time zone for the whole year.

Ontario communities may suit themselves as to just how they wish to be confused but those who find themselves in a state of confusion may derive some satisfaction by considering it a preliminary bout in the turn-the-clock-back battle which will be upon us next September.

WORDS ARE DEADLY

On my way to the living room, for a few rubbers of bridge after dinner, I noticed a sign tacked on one of the doors in my friends' house.

It was their 11-year-old son's bedroom, and the sign proclaimed ominously: "Enterers Who Do Not Knock Will Be" and here a word was scratched out, followed by the grim capitals "KILLED."

When the lad later came in to say good night to us, his mother asked casually, "Steven, isn't it a little extreme to kill people who enter without knocking?"

"I know," he admitted, shuffling his feet in embarrassment, "but I couldn't spell 'Prosecuted'."

Well, we all laughed and agreed it was a fine kid story, but a while later I was set two tricks on an easy four-spade contract, because I was musing about the gown-up implications of this incident.

How often do we say "killed" when we mean "prosecuted," simply because it's easier and we can't bother to spell out the meaning of the exact word we should use?

How many times do we abuse the word 'love' when we mean 'like' or 'admire' or 'appreciate?' And more dangerously, how many times do we say 'hate' when we mean 'dislike' or 'disapprove' or 'disagree?'

It is not true that sticks and stones have more power to hurt us than words do. The wrong word, the hasty, cruel, indiscriminating word can wound beyond the force of any material object. Because, if used often enough, the word becomes the thing, and God's real world becomes wrapped in a diabolic haze of prejudice, inaccuracy and ignorance.

We laugh at long and pompous legal terms, and often they obscure more than clarify their subject. But the idea behind them is just and benevolent to explore all the meanings of a term and to understand precisely what it includes and what it leaves out.

When these distinctions become blurred, as they do unconsciously in our everyday speech and consciously in the mouths of demagogues, we run the very great risk of giving words more power than they legitimately possess—of, for instance, turning the temperature word "Prosecute" into the terrible word "Kill."

Election Costs Up In All Canada

This year's federal election will be the most expensive in Canadian history—and one of the most illegal, according to Blair Fraser. In an article in Maclean's Magazine, Fraser says that "the great majority of our lawmakers become lawbreakers in the very act of being elected to make the laws."

Most politicians would rather risk a \$2,000 fine and two years in jail by disregarding the Canada Elections Act than publish a true statement of their campaign expenses, the Maclean's article charges. They won't acknowledge the secret dollars that pad the paychecks of so-called "volunteer" party workers who demand more money for each campaign.

"Election costs are rising in all parts of Canada," Fraser writes. "In 1935 a party leader's national tour could be run for \$1,200. In 1948 one leader's tour cost nearly twenty thousand. The cost of living hasn't risen that much."

living hasn't risen that much."

Where's the money coming from? Fraser says big sums are donated by companies who expect concrete returns in the form of government contracts. But, he adds, officials deny that Ottawa plays favorites. He quotes one veteran politician as saying, "Anybody who gives money to the federal party and hopes to get it back is a fool."

Party organizers admit that political machines are expensive and corrupt, especially in Quebec and the Maritimes. Blair Fraser suggests Canadians aren't so rich that they can afford to throw money down the election

campaign drain.

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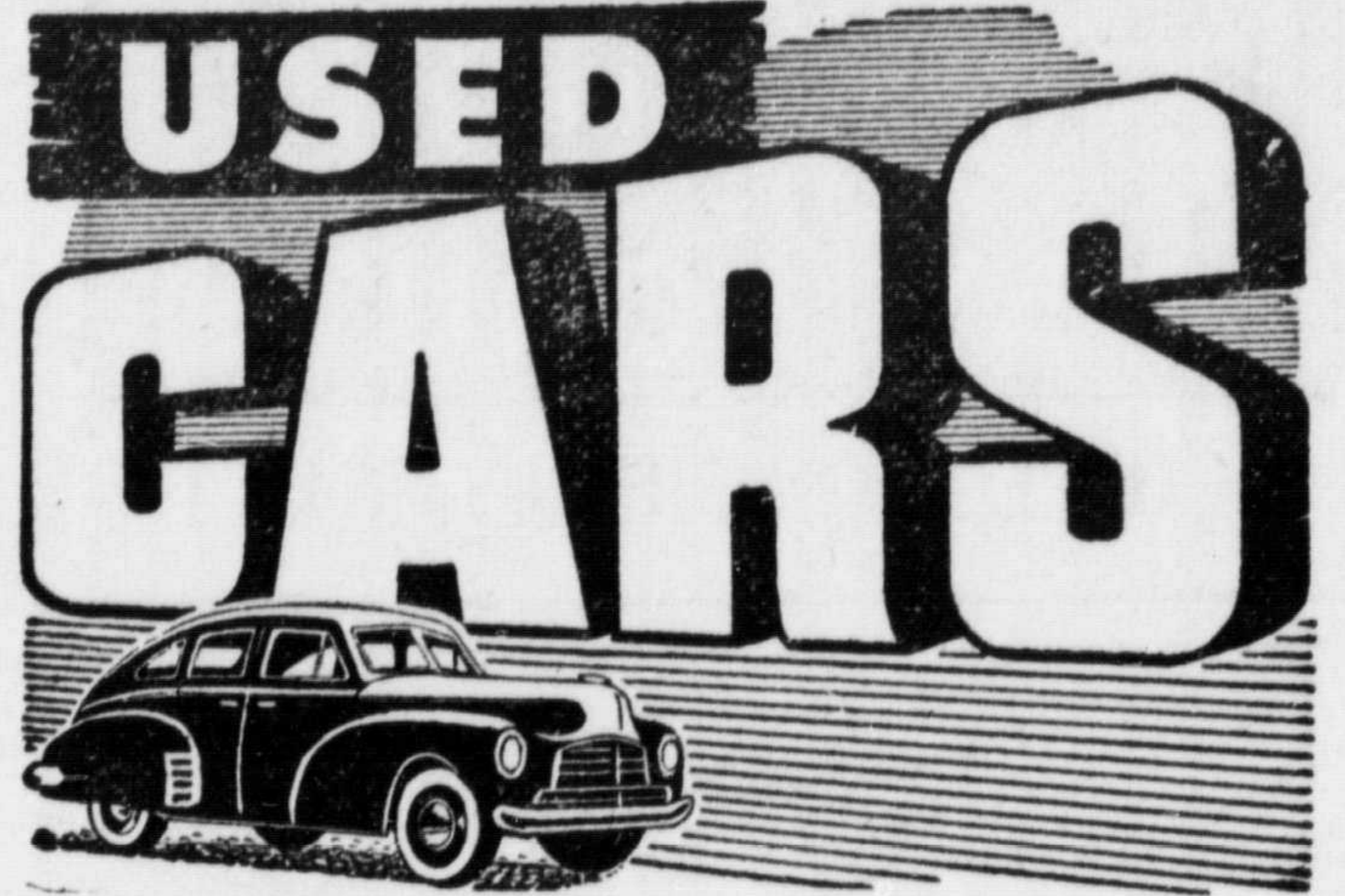

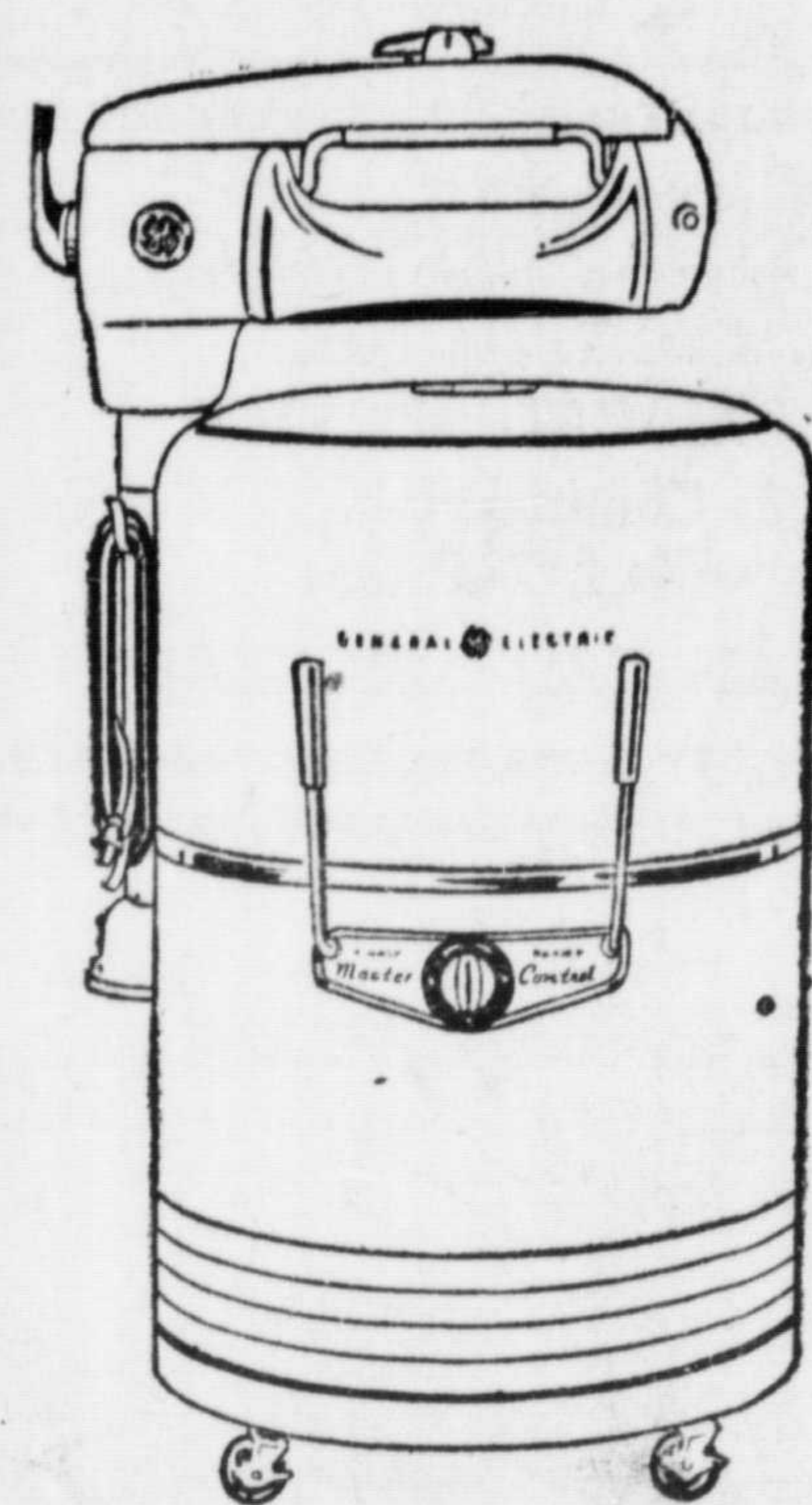

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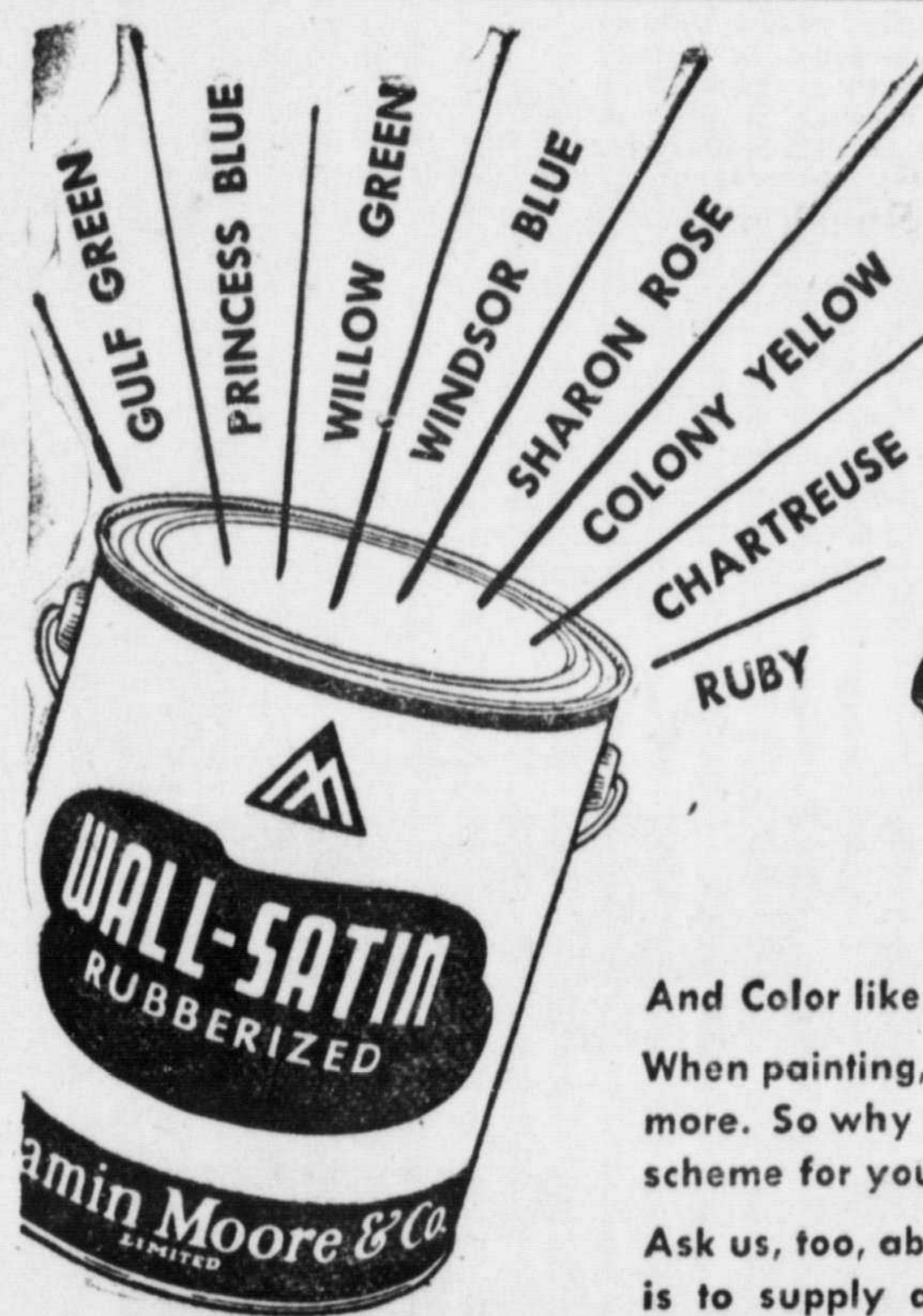

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Your pullets need real growth if they are to be in tip-top shape next Fall to produce large eggs early, during the high price season, and keep on laying steadily.

To get that real growth the pullets must be fed a good balanced ration. It is not good enough to raise pullets just on pasture and grain. They will not lay as many eggs during the following year nor will they produce large eggs as early as balanced—fed.

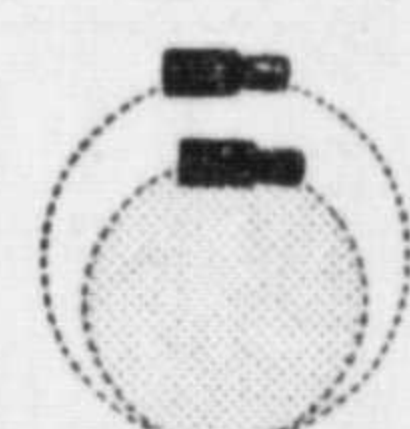

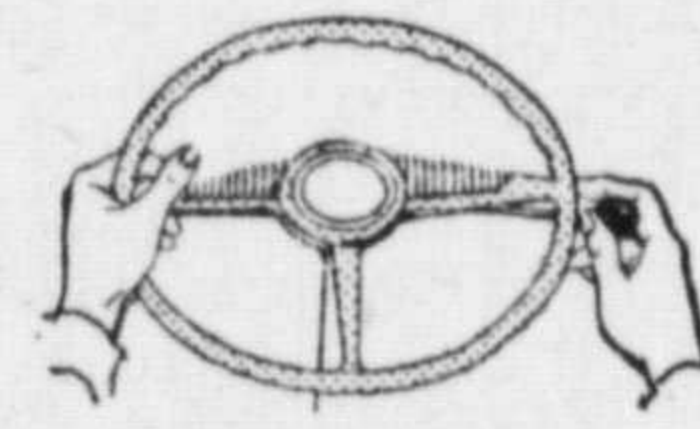
